ABOUT OUR VILLAGE

Since this team is not often the object of public view, we decided to interview the Chief Safety Control Officer, Matt Madsen, to shed some light and provide a thumbnail:

CV Times January 2004

Organization

The Village is divided into 4 areas—with an Area Safety Officer responsible for each. Each Area has Block Safety Officers to cover 10-15 homes. An operational CB system provides internal communications capability.

Ongoing Operations

Identify safety hazards, e.g., propane storage, overgrown brush areas, etc. Devise evacuation strategies and develop procedures.
Be prepared.

Administration

A computerized system to provide current resident information, i.e., residents within each Block and their vital information, e.g., handicaps, other.

The Team will present a comprehensive status report to the board at the January 21st meeting. We strongly recommend your attendance.

There's a metaphor here. When we were little kids, generations ago, Bristol Meyers (a leading pharmaceuticals company) erected a lofty neon sign atop their plant in Newark Bay, a short ferry ride from New York City.

Getting To Know... Jacob Duran

Jacob, better known in these parts as "Jake", came to the Village 14 years ago from far away Valley Center.

Jake was the pastor at the Grandview Church there and remained as pastor for three years after moving here.

A couple of weeks after arriving in the Village, Jake was asked to pastor the Vespers here which he has continued to do for 14 years except for one and a half years, while he held evening meetings in Valley Center.

Golf is a great interest for him and as a result he began marshaling and being a starter at the Welk Golf Courses. When he gave it up to continue his work as a pastor, he was told that he could come back anytime.

Jake is a former Marine. He was an enlisted man for three years and while serving in Korea was sent to OCS where he received his commission. He returned to Korea for a second tour as an advisor to the Korean Marine Corps.

It was while he was in Korea that Jake proudly states, "The Lord spoke to my heart." He resigned his commission after serving over ten years and went back to college at La Sierra, a Seventh Day Adventist school, to become a minister. He loaded his schedule and graduated in three years while also working forty hours a week.

His first stop as a new minister was in San Diego at the Broadway Church and spent the next 17 years teaching the bible in Christian schools and doing

Youth Pastor work. He says it was his privilege to have traveled in Mexico, all over the US and Canada as a youth speaker. Then for two years he was a pastor in Palm Springs and San Diego.

After nineteen years, through studies and other circumstances he became an independent minister. He re-married and he says his wife, Marilyn, is the best thing next to the Lord that has happened to him. They have been married 22 years and have 6 kids, 12 grand-children and one great grandchild.

As an independent minister, he worked in small churches for about four years. He was, then invited to pastor in Sanger, California which is near Fresno, and then to Valley Center.

Four years ago, he became interim pastor of the Meadowlark Community Church in San Marcos for a year. Afterwards, he went back to marshaling and doing things here.

Two years ago at age 72 (Do the math and you'll know how old he is.) he was invited back to Meadowlark Community Church to be Youth Assistant Pastor. It began as part time and now it is full time. Jake is very pleased at the increase in attendance which has gone from 4 to 22. He had to give up his Thursday Bible Class because he now has a Youth meeting. However, he still takes time to Pastor the Vespers and to conduct memorials and an occasional wedding here.

Marilyn and Jake like the good life here and would move but there is nothing better to be had.

The switches are available at Pinetree Lumber in Escondido. When you need hot water, it takes only about 10-15 minutes to heat enough water for two showers! You can save 12-15% on your electric bill.
