

TURN OFF IRRIGATION SYSTEMS WHEN IT RAINS

Lawns can go weeks without water after a drenching storm.

Recent rains mean it's a great time to turn off irrigation systems and take advantage of free water provided by Mother Nature. A few rainy days can provide enough water for lawns to survive for weeks without irrigation, and they provide a valuable chance to save stored water supplies for next summer.

After storms pass, don't begin watering again until the top one to two inches of soil are dry. Lawns that lose their lush green luster will rejuvenate with the next rain.

Outdoor watering accounts for more than half of a typical household's water use in California. The San Diego County Water Authority estimates that widespread participation in a voluntary two-week hiatus from using landscape watering systems across the region this month could save more than 5,500 acre-feet of water, enough to serve about 11,000 families of four for a year.

Scam Alert: IRS Won't Call You Out of the Blue

One of the more nefarious scams around is the IRS scam as it preys on citizens who fear getting behind on their taxes and incurring penalties and fines. Callers claim to be IRS employees, but they are not. They use fake names and bogus IRS badge numbers and they may have information about their targets such as the last four digits of their Social Security Number, address and phone number. They alter the caller ID to make it look as if the IRS is calling. This is easily accomplished through voice calls over an Internet connection. These con artists could be calling from anywhere in the world, regardless of the area code victims see when they pick up the phone.

One way they attempt to scam the victim is to tell them that they are entitled to an IRS refund, but require the victim to reveal personal information that can be used to steal their money or gain access to their accounts. Another, more common and intimidating way is for the scammers to tell the victims that they owe the IRS money. The callers are often hostile and insulting, demanding that the victims pay immediately through a debit card or wire transfer. Those who ask questions are deemed uncooperative and threatened with arrest, deportation, loss of a driver's license or business license.

Sometimes fake IRS emails are sent to the victims to support the sham calls. After the callers threaten the victims, they hang up and others call back pretending to be from the police or DMV, and the caller ID supports their claim. Some scammers working San Diego County have had victims meet them at their bank to get the money.

The IRS will NOT:

1. Call to demand immediate payment; they would mail you a bill first.
2. Demand that you pay taxes without allowing you to question or appeal.
3. Ask you to pay an IRS debt by using a prepaid debit card.
4. Require credit card information over the phone.
5. Threaten to have you arrested.

If you are called from someone claiming to be from the IRS and asking for money and you know or think you might owe taxes, call the IRS at (800) 829-1040. If you do not owe taxes, report the incident to the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration (TIGTA) at (800) 366-4484 or at www.tigta.gov.

COMMON TACTICS OF SCAMMERS

Excerpt from The Aging & Independence Services newsletter

1. Scammers buy lists of potential victims from other scammers.
2. They'll offer free investment seminars at high-end restaurants.
3. They want to make a home appointment. They'll talk in circles to confuse you and almost always they'll leave with a check.
4. They are always critical of your current investment plan.
5. They tell you to act now or you'll lose your chance for this great deal. What they don't tell you is that there are consequences to changing your insurance plan or investments, such as surrender fees.
6. Phony guarantees. A couple defrauded nearly 400 older adults with a phony in-home services plan. More than \$3 million was taken. The DA's Office prosecuted them and the pair is now in prison.

Some general tips:

- An agent must give 24 hours notice before visiting you.
- Never sign anything on the spot, including forms and especially blank forms.
- Avoid home visits.
- Never meet a salesperson alone. Have a trusted advisor with you.
- Remember that a salesperson is not a friend. He/she is trying to appear to be a friend, however.
- Never sign or pay on the day a "deal" is presented.
- Demand copies of everything.
- Document all promises/guarantees in writing.

HEALTH INSURANCE NEWS

Wow, here we are in a new year. The second for Covered California, our state version of The Affordable Care Act exchange initiated by President Obama.

There are changes on several levels for this year. The enrollment period ends sooner (Feb 15) and the costs are higher. The rates vary but the average is 8% increase over last year. The tables for qualifying for help have also been changed so someone may or may not qualify for the same help as they did last year.

The penalties are also higher for 2015. If you do not have insurance that meets the government standards, it will cost 2% of your household income or \$325 per adult, whichever is higher. That is for annual incomes over \$19,650. In 2016 it goes up to \$695 per person. If you are uninsured for only part of the year, then the penalty is calculated by the month. These penalties will be paid on your 2016 tax return.

Insurance companies are adding some doctors back into their networks as the dust begins to settle from all the changes made last year. Hospitals and doctor networks are not the same as previous ACA years. In the past PPO plans meant you could go to any doctor you wanted. That has changed as doctors have become selective to the plans they will accept. Many people have to choose between the insurance company, their doctor, or the plan that they want. The situation is improving but one has to be very careful choosing a plan if they want to keep their doctor.

A note for Medicare Advantage members who want to make a change. January 1 through February 14 you are allowed to disenroll and return only to original Medicare and purchase a drug plan. If you want to purchase a Medigap (supplemental) plan you will need to coordinate it carefully to make certain you can purchase without underwriting which could raise your rates.

This is a matter of privacy protection.

There are a variety of ways persons will try to scam you on the internet or the phone. One of the most reliable sources for information on these scams is the Federal Trade Commission website: <http://www.consumer.ftc.gov/>

SNOPES.COM

Many of the email forwards we get are not true. The website, snopes.com, is a fact-checking site that can help you distinguish fact and fiction. It has a search function that lets you put in key words to check on an email in question.
