## WELL CHECK

If you or your family are concerned about the well being of one of our residents, please call the non-emergency Sheriff number (736-2140) and ask for a "Well Check".



**We will install...**a smoke alarm in every bedroom, in compliance with the State of California Building Code, if you do not already have one.

**We will inspect...**your existing battery-operated smoke alarm, and replace it if it is older than ten years.

**We will replace...**9-volt alkaline batteries with ten-year rated lithium batteries.

Testing, installation and battery replacement take approximately twenty minutes. There is absolutely *no charge* for this service, and donations *are not* solicited.

**This is a Senior Mobile Home Park offer.**

Due to liability concerns, we do not climb ladders. We cannot accommodate newer homes with ten to twelve foot high ceilings. Our standard ceiling height maximum is eight feet. We also cannot extend this courtesy to real estate agents nor home inspectors. The resident *must* be present to sign a liability release form.



It was a fun, successful tour that raised \$450 for the Care and Concern Committees.



## **HISTORY OF THE FRONT (WEST) GATE**

We are a gated community here in Champagne Village, but the gate didn't happen until the mid 1980's. Before the conversion from Welk to Champagne Village, there wasn't even an entrance road. Everyone entered through the Welk entrance. The old CV Club House (the building directly outside the North Gate which also housed the Village pool, four motel rooms, a pool hall and a snack bar) was vacated and the new Village Hall was built in its current location. Then, finally, the current West gate went in.

There was a very positive reaction to becoming a gated community. "It was such a wonderful thing," says Doris Wright who has lived in CV since 1967. "Before that we had people driving around the Village all the time. Then the gate went in and we were finally cut off from the Welk Resort. It was a very good change and everybody loved their privacy." One of the first residents to work in the kiosk was current CV resident Ruth Williams. She worked for many years and remembered, "It was such fun. Everyone was so jolly and everyone knew one another."

### **THE CURRENT KIOSK EMPLOYEES**

The current kiosk employees are residents **Karen Resch, Jane Fischer, Anna Marie Montoya, Barbara Houg, Bill Peltin and Donna Kirk**. Their main role is one of traffic control. They log in as many as 100 vehicles on any given day. A great many of the visitors are in the wrong place; they are looking for something else, usually the Welk Resort, a casino, a winery, or the road to Hidden Meadows. It's a challenge to get them all turned around without causing a traffic jam. A majority of the visitors need a map to find their destination as there is nothing very logical about the numbering system within our Village.

### **WHAT THEY CAN'T DO**

They cannot let visitors in without permission. If you haven't emailed or called in a request or if you can't be reached at home, they will turn the car away. They also cannot accept and store packages for you that are being delivered. And remember that they are not the ones who have the codes or gate openers. You always need to put your phone number into the gate system at the CV Office. They are able, however, to make phone calls for the mail carrier, if he requires a signature so that you can meet him at the mail box.

### **WHY WE NEED THEM**

There is no doubt how much safer the Village is because we have a manned gate. There are so many deceiving attempts to enter the Village, so many who try to zoom in without permission. It is the role of these people to prevent their entrance. It is especially helpful that we have residents who are manning the gate; residents who team up with the Office personnel to keep the Village safe. We are targeted by all sorts of cagey and clever solicitors because we are seniors. The gate keepers watch out for us and they watch out for the gates. They know how to open and close them during power outages and for emergency vehicles.

### **HOW CAN YOU HELP?**

The majority of CV residents use the gate correctly. Please remember these simple things:

- **EMAIL (cvfrontgate@gmail.com) OR CALL (760-749-7723) THE KIOSK FOR EVERY VISITOR YOU ARE EXPECTING**
- **DON'T LET PEOPLE FOLLOW YOU THROUGH THE NORTH OR WEST GATES**
- **REGISTER YOURSELF AT THE CV OFFICE AS SOON AS YOU MOVE IN (RENTERSTOO).**
- **HAVE YOUR TRANSPONDER OUT AND READY BEFORE YOU APPROACH THE ARM OF THE GATE.**
- **SLOW DOWN AS YOU ENTER INTO OR EXIT FROM THE VILLAGE.**
- **TELL YOUR AFTER-HOUR GUESTS TO USE THE KEYPAD TO CALL YOU.**
- **LEARN RIGHT NOW HOW TO USE THE KEYPAD IF YOU DON'T KNOW HOW!**

## KINDNESS

## WEBSITE OF THE MONTH: OPower

A few months back, SDGE started a pilot program called OPower, which provides great tips and tools for how to monitor your electric usage and save money on your bill. Every other month, OPower provides a report that shows how your electric usage compares with homes in the area similar to yours (based on the square footage and type of house you enter).

These are pretty helpful tips, so if you're looking to save \$\$, this is a great place to start! You can register FREE at [sdge.opower.com](http://sdge.opower.com) to receive these reports. You can register over the phone by calling (800) 411-7343.

When you register, it's important to enter the necessary information about your home. Otherwise, the reports will be inaccurate. The information you enter is completely secure.

## CLEANING UP!

Just because you fill your washing machine with laundry detergent doesn't mean it's keeping itself clean! Newer HE (high efficiency) machines are especially prone to developing mold and mildew if not cleaned regularly. You could buy those commercial machine cleaners, but using white vinegar or bleach is often just as effective.

If your machine doesn't have a cleaning cycle, the best method is to choose the longest hot cycle, adding about three cups of white vinegar. Pause the cycle once the machine is filled with water, let it sit there for about an hour, then resume the cycle. Doing this about once a month should keep things clean. Most manufacturers also recommend keeping the washer door open between uses, to reduce the risk of mildew buildup.

## MARTIN LUTHER KING JR. DAY

Monday, January 16



Martin Luther King Jr. was the chief spokesman for nonviolent activism in the Civil Rights Movement, which successfully protested racial discrimination in federal and state law. The campaign for a federal holiday in King's honor began soon after his assassination in 1968. President Ronald Reagan signed the holiday into law in 1983, and it was first observed three years later.

King was such a gifted student that he skipped grades nine and 12 before enrolling in 1944 at Morehouse College, the alma mater of his father and maternal grandfather. Although he was the son, grandson and great-grandson of Baptist ministers, King did not intend to follow the family vocation until Morehouse president Benjamin E. Mays, a noted theologian, convinced him otherwise. King was ordained before graduating college with a degree in sociology.

George Washington is the only other American to have had his birthday observed as a national holiday.



## HEALTH INSURANCE NEWS

With the new administration about to take us into new territory, there are bound to be many changes in the next couple of years for all types of health insurance. There are already changes on the books for 2017 for Medicare.

For those on Medicare we have a Part B (Medical) premium increase. If you are on a Supplemental plan or an Advantage plan that covers this premium then you will not notice the difference. Those who had a \$104 premium prior to 2016 will increase to \$109 (about \$5). If you signed up in 2016 your premium is \$121.80 and it is increasing to \$127. All new enrollees in 2017 will have a premium of \$134 for Part B.

Another increase for Medicare Part B is the deductible. The deductible for 2016 was raised to \$166 and it will raise again in 2017 to \$183. Part A (inpatient hospital) deductible will increase \$28, totaling \$1,316 per period for 2017.

Most seniors have their Part B premium deducted from their Social Security check. So the October announcement of a cost of living increase of 0.3% for Social Security beneficiaries (averaging about \$5 per person) will not show up in your check as the health insurance increases overall are greater. Got to love the system that puts money in one pocket and takes it out of the other!

- Welk's education was cut short when he suffered acute appendicitis at 10 years of age. Prolonged recovery and subsequent peritonitis caused him to abandon school and focus on farming and fur trapping.
