Space Heater Dangers with our Colder Weather

This is the time of year when residents may get out the space heaters for extra warmth. The Consumer Product Safety Commission estimates that portable heaters are involved in about 1,700 fires per year in the US, resulting in about 80 deaths and 160 injuries annually.

If you are going to use a space heater:

1. Keep flammable materials three feet from the heater.
2. Keep children and pets at a safe distance.
3. Don't leave space heaters unattended (including while you sleep).
4. Avoid power strips and extension cords. They can overheat.
5. Use electric space heaters.
6. Never use propane space heaters indoors.
7. Protect yourself with smoke and carbon monoxide alarms.

Did you know the American Red Cross offers **FREE** smoke alarms, carbon monoxide alarms, and installation for qualifying households? (Most in CV qualify.)

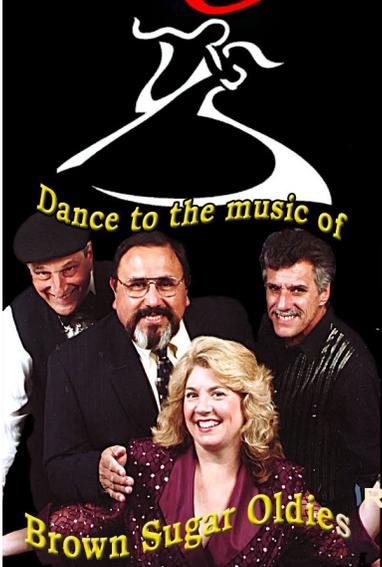

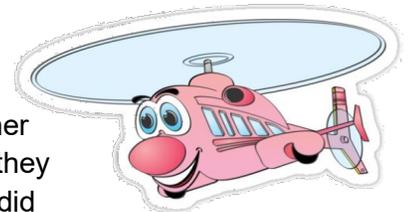
New Year Chuckles...

My Dad's Fruitcake Recipe

I grew up with this fruitcake. Happy holidays to the Villagers. Enjoy. If anyone has any questions, you can call me (760) 749-6484.

In a large pan combine:

- 2 cups raisins
- 2 cups cranberries
- 1 to 1½ cups sugar
- 2½ cups water
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1½ cloves
- ½ tsp nutmeg
- ¼ tsp allspice
- 1 Tbsp shortening

Boil for 5 to 10 minutes. Let cool.

In another bowl mix:

- 2½ cups flour
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 1 tsp baking powder

Add flour mixture to fruit (you can also add nuts if you like) Stir by hand. Put into loaf pans and bake for 45 to 60 minutes at 350 degrees.

Estate Planning

Number 1 in the December issue was:
"Instructions for care and financial affairs when you are incapacitated before you die".

Good estate planning addresses this important concern: What happens if you become incapacitated?

Each of your documents, including a will, advanced health care directive, power of attorney, and living trust can play its own role in preparing for incapacity. A knowledgeable California estate planning lawyer can help guide you through the process of drafting your plan to properly protect you.

The following is an overview of how a living trust can help you in the event you face incapacity:

- If you become incapacitated, your trust can name a successor trustee to step in and manage your assets.
- A living trust may help your loved ones to avoid a probate proceeding for a conservatorship by allowing the successor trustee to step in to control even separate property, as opposed to community property.
- A living trust avoids the expense, hassle, public nature, and court involvement of a conservatorship.
- Your living trust can provide specific instructions for how you want your affairs to be handled in the event of your incapacity.
- In the alternative, your living trust can give your successor trustee substantial flexibility with regard to how your assets are managed.
- A living trust is helpful when you are incapacitated, and your spouse has either pre-deceased you or is also incapacitated.

Generally, the advantage of the living trust when it comes to your incapacity is that it allows for a relatively easy transition of control over your assets.

Health Insurance News

Happy New Year! As we enter 2023 there are a few changes in Medicare rules that apply. However, first I want to remind those who have Advantage plans that the first three months - January through March - is an open enrollment period that allows beneficiaries to change from one Advantage plan to another. No drug plan changes qualify.

Also during this time those who have never signed up for Medicare Part B- which is your medical coverage - the rule has changed. When you sign up for Part B, it becomes effective the first of the following month instead of July 1st. This closes the gap for those making a late enrollment. Except for those still working with employer plans, those who did not sign up for Part B when they turned 65 are late enrollees. They pay a penalty and can only sign up for Medicare Part B during this three -month period.

Another new player in the Health Care arena is Amazon. Amazon, yes, the company who delivers packages to your door is launching Amazon Clinic. This Seattle tech company is offering a new virtual care platform that uses message-based interaction to connect customers with third-party telehealth providers.

Their plan is to offer a convenient way to seek treatment for more than 20 common health conditions, including seasonal allergies, acne, migraines and more. Amazon launched a pilot program for employees in the Seattle area in 2019 so the plan has been in the works for a while. The service will start in 32 states, California included. Amazon Clinic does not currently accept insurance. Health Care keeps changing all the time and certainly will look different in the years to come.

Another change for me is a plan to retire this coming Spring. After almost ten years of writing this article, this will be my last one. I have enjoyed helping new and old friends navigate the health care system through the years. Thanks for reading my articles and bringing me questions to answer. I'll be seeing you around. I'm planning to get out and about more!
