BOARD MEETING NOTES

1. A PPA (Power Purchase Agreement) with Wiser Capital to provide solar power to the pool and Village Hall was approved.
2. The Board approved the purchase of two nine foot Addison pool tables with covers, for a cost of \$3853.44 which includes tax, delivery, setup and removal of the old tables.
3. By unanimous vote the Board approved placing a CC&R amendment on a ballot measure which would require any home served with propane to convert to "all electric" upon **sale** or **transfer** of the unit or by **January 1, 2020**, whichever comes **first**.
4. A Reserve expenditure in the amount of \$16,789.00 was approved to replace 7.5 ton heat pump and air handler for the Village Hall
5. May 20, 2015 was set as the date for the Annual Meeting of the Membership
6. Due to termite infestation the Board approved tenting the Village hall at a cost not to exceed \$13,716.00

Executive Session

The Board held a hearing with a resident regarding personnel matters.

The Association has recently instituted a new check scanning system which allows us to scan and deposit checks electronically. This system saves us time and money in banking fees. For this system to work correctly we need for each person who pays by check or by Bill Pay at your bank to write an account number in the memo section of your check. We no longer need the account number from Yes Energy, the billing company.

We hope we can obtain 100% compliance with this request. Enclosed with the CV Times this month (back page) is an application for Sure Pay which is an Auto Debit program that will automatically withdraw your Association fees as well as your utilities on or about the 7th of each month. There is no cost for this service and it will avoid the chance of any late fees.


RESERVING TABLES

HEALTH INSURANCE NEWS

Last year I mentioned in one of my articles that Anthem had begun to link with a telephone Doctor's service where you could call a doctor 24/7 and get consultation and/or a prescription for a flat fee for each call. If you have an Anthem policy you are only charged the insurance copay of an office visit.

Another service is also available not tied to any insurance company which costs a single monthly fee for up to six people in a household and it is under twenty dollars. One can connect by phone or Skype on the internet. They are available 24/7. It is a wonderful backup for families with small children or shut-ins. It is an especially good option for those who can only afford a high deductible insurance plan. Doctors can call in a prescription if needed and you never need to leave home. The most common treatments are for ear infections, flu, colds deciding whether or not to go to the emergency room etc.

The Wall Street Journal's January issue featured an article called "Your Smartphone Will See You Now". In the article a cardiologist from La Jolla noted that a patient had emailed him an ECG from an app on his cell phone. The message read "I'm in atrial fib, now what do I do?" The app had diagnosed the reading!

Smartphones already can be used to take blood-pressure. Soon modern technology will be aiding long distance doctor calls from wherever we have a connection. ECG apps have already been approved by the Food and Drug Administration for consumers and in use in clinical studies. According to the WSJ article as many as one in six doctor visits were already virtual in 2014. In some US cities you can use a smartphone app to request an actual doctor's house call for anything from consultation to stitches.

This trend will save us time and money. Insurance companies are just beginning to recognize and cover new avenues for Health Care services. Times are definitely changing.

Earlier in the day, the Board approved the recommendations made by Charity Chairman **John Raymond** and his committee to disburse donations to: Braille Institute, Reins Riding Program for blind and disabled children, San Diego Centers for the Blind in Vista and San Diego, Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation, Lions Optometric Clinic and Lions Camp Jack.

Ralph & Kathy Rognlie of the Escondido Host Lions Club appeared to request assistance for Marcos Olea Gomez, a 5th grade student in the Escondido School District's visually impaired program, whose eye condition requires specially made contact lenses. The club donated a total of \$6,000 to these worthwhile causes. Additional monies will be available for other donations in the spring and fall.

Lois Smith reported on her bus trip with Lions from other area clubs to help decorate the Lions float for the Rose Parade. The club gave out 30 Christmas gifts to Village shut-ins and those in need.
