

BOARD NOTES

Thank you to the CV members who attended the January Board meeting. We look forward to a great turnout at **6 pm on Wednesday, February 17**. Your involvement at the meetings is appreciated. The Board addressed the following:

1. Reserve expenditure of \$21,637.00 to purchase and install an Aluma-Wood covering over the park barbecue and seating area was tabled pending further study.
2. Revised architectural guidelines were approved.
3. Reserve expenditure of \$1,649.08 for replacement of Quick Pro pump head and feed control for the pool chemical system was approved.
4. Approval for the Love In Motion Choir to use the CV Hall for a fundraiser was defeated.
5. Request from the Lion's Club to use the CV van to shuttle CVPOA residents to and from Lion's Club meetings was approved.
6. Board member Jody Bennett to chair a committee to study the feasibility of tree removal from common areas to accommodate residents who wish to have solar but whose roof area is partially or wholly shaded by trees.
7. 2016 Insurance Packet was approved in the amount of \$23,607.00 to be paid out of reserves and then replaced in monthly 12 monthly payments.
8. Lien against parcel number 185-332-10-05 for delinquent assessments was approved.
9. Reserve expenditure for an 11.1 GPM LP Tank-Less water heater for the Village Hall in the amount of \$1,731.66 was approved.

COYOTE SAFETY TIPS

Coyotes are now raising their pups and can be more territorial as they guard their mates, dens, pups and food sources. Here are some coyote safety tips to keep your family [safe in the outdoors](#):

Coyotes can be found in any open space, parks, neighborhoods and even commercial areas. As people and their pets [spend more time outdoors](#), the possibility of a coyote encounter increases.

Coyotes may try to escort you out of an area to protect their pups or food sources when you encounter them on a trail. Humans may perceive this behavior as stalking, which is usually not the case. They may also view your pet as prey. To let coyotes be wild while keeping yourself and pets safe, please follow these pointers:

- Never feed coyotes—it is illegal to feed coyotes in most places. Feeding endangers your family and neighbors as it lures coyotes into neighborhoods.
- Keep unattended cats and dogs indoors or in completely enclosed runs, especially at night, and do not assume that a fence will keep a coyote out of your back yard.
- Accompany your leashed pet outside. Make sure you turn on lights if it is dark to check your back yard for unexpected wildlife.
- Keep dogs on short leashes while walking outside; the Division of Wildlife recommends a leash no longer than 6 feet.
- Leave noisemakers on hand to scare away coyotes that may enter your yard, such as whistles and horns.
- Don't run away or turn your back on a coyote.
- Do not allow a coyote to get in between you and your pet or child—keep children close to you.
- Yell, clap hands, blow a whistle and try to make yourself look larger if you have a close encounter with a coyote.

#84 Jean Scofield & George Lewis (her brother) 207-1075



HEALTH INSURANCE NEWS

With the new year there are changes to our Original Medicare benefits and deductibles. Beginning in 2016 the Part B medical deductible increases to \$166 a year (up from \$147). The premium for Part B remains \$104.90 for most seniors who are already enrolled. New enrollees will now pay a \$121.80 monthly premium. Those with annual incomes over \$85K have graduated higher premiums.

The enrollment period to drop Advantage plans and change back to Original Medicare ends February 15.

Medigap plans which are designed to compliment Original Medicare are available year round. However, if you want guaranteed issue (no underwriting for health issues) you will need to wait for your birthday anniversary to change plans. In California on your birthday for 30 days following, one can change a Medigap policy. The other opportunity is during a special enrollment period triggered by an event like a company dropping your current plan (Medigap or Advantage plan). Medigap policies are standardized so benefits are the same no matter which company you purchase the plan from.

One should not cancel a current Medigap plan until the new plan is accepted and in force. You may have to pay two premiums for one month to insure coverage. With your same company one can reduce coverage with a less expensive plan but will not be able to increase coverage at a later time without a special enrollment.





