January Board Meeting

First meeting of the year draws great turnout

Thursday, January 16th, brought a nice crowd who gathered for the Association's first Board meeting of the year. The agenda addressed the following items:

- The Board approved the purchase of a 10x12 foot Tuff Shed that will be installed behind the Board Room. This shed will provide much needed additional storage for seasonal and other items that are used in the Village Hall.
- The Board denied a request from an owner to override the A&L Committee's decision that denied the placement of a 250-gallon propane tank on his lot.
- After significant discussion and input from the membership, the Board voted to modify the Kitchen Policy to allow those individuals and clubs who use the kitchen an opportunity, after inspection, to rectify any issues found. If issues are not corrected, they will lose kitchen privileges.
- The Association's 2020 Insurance Package was unanimously approved by the Board.
- By majority vote, the Board made the motorcycle rule permanent. This rule allows residents to drive their motorcycles directly between the gate and their homes, with no stopping.

Prior to the above New Business, CFO Roger Elyea presented the monthly finance report, which included details on both current and projected savings resulting from our well-based irrigation system. In addition, Janet LeRossignol provided helpful tips and rules for using the NextDoor website (see article in this newsletter).

The next Board Meeting is Thursday, February 20th at 6:00pm in the CV Hall.

When you don't provide advance notice, Kiosk staff must take the time to phone you, sometimes causing large backups at the Gate. **No one will be granted access to the Village without advance notice or a phone call.** Please help out and let us know!

Golf Cart Drivers

Please remember that all **drivers of golf carts in CV must be at least 16 years old with a valid driver's license!**

FAST FAQs: BALLOT HARVESTING

What is ballot harvesting?

Ballot harvesting is a practice in which volunteers collect ballots from others and drop them off at a polling place or – in this case, the CVPOA office. In Champagne Village, you are permitted to assign someone to return your ballot if you are unable to do so, due to an illness or other physical disability.

How does ballot harvesting work?

Once you've filled out your ballot, placed it in the inner envelope, inserted that into your outer envelope, then filled out signed the outer envelope, you may return the ballot by:

- Mailing it to the Office.
- Dropping it off in person to the Office.
- Designating someone to bring your ballot to the Office for you.

If the individual delivering your ballot is (or has been) collecting ballots from other residents, this would be considered ballot harvesting.

Is ballot harvesting legal in CV?

Yes. Prior state laws restricted this practice to just relatives or those living in the same household as the voter, but a new law passed in 2016 now allows you to designate any person to collect your ballot and deliver it on your behalf.

Should I let someone deliver my ballot?

That's entirely up to you.

Should I be concerned about ballot harvesting in CV?

While ballot harvesting is allowed, you should know that **the following practices are NOT ALLOWED in Champagne Village:**

- If someone comes to your door unannounced to talk with you about a ballot, this is considered soliciting and is NOT permitted. Please report this activity to the Office.
- If someone claims they are from the CVPOA Office and can complete and/or deliver your ballot to the Office for you, this is NOT true: the CVPOA does not assign volunteers to collect ballots. Please report this activity to the Office.
- If you give someone your ballot to complete for you, this is considered proxy voting and is NOT permitted. Your ballot must be filled out by YOU, placed in the inner envelope and then sealed in the outer envelope that's then signed by you. Only at this point can you designate someone else to deliver your ballot.
- **No candidate in an election, or representative of any repeal, initiative or referendum can collect your ballot. This is illegal, so please report this activity immediately to the Office.**

Well / Irrigation Update

Twenty-six months ago in November, 2017, then Board President John Grubb and I discussed the increasing cost of water and what options we had available to us. That conversation culminated with the installation of a well and a new irrigation infrastructure for watering our common area.

As of January 15th, all the piping, fittings and connections have been completed. All common area landscape irrigation water is now being provided from the well! A few items still need to be addressed, including general cleanup around the Village such as picking up pieces of pipes and fittings and sweeping up dirt. Leveling and resurfacing of asphalt for all trenches cut through the streets will also be addressed where required.

The question I'm most frequently asked is whether our irrigation water bill has decreased. Well (no pun intended!), reports from the Office and our CFO are certainly positive:

2018 actual water cost for common area irrigation: \$188,720

2019 actual water cost for common area irrigation: \$151,342

Savings: \$37,378

Bear in mind that the increased use of well water was a gradual process, since we approached this project in phases that began at the end of Summer: as more of the infrastructure was completed, more well water and less municipal water was used. **From this month on, no more municipal water will be used for common area landscape irrigation.**


Our Veterans Memorial here in Champagne Village is a fitting place to pay tribute to those resident Veterans who have left us, to honor both the individual and their service in the Armed Forces. We are ready to assist with any of the following:

- Lowering our Memorial flag to half-staff on the day of the family's choosing, in honor of a resident Veteran. A small sign will be placed at the Memorial throughout the day, noting the Veteran's name. The flag will be returned to full staff at dusk.
- Coordinating a brief IN MEMORY ceremony on the morning of the family's choosing. This IN MEMORY ceremony might include any of the following:
 - A gathering of family and friends at the Memorial
 - Laying of flowers at a Veteran's paver
 - Arrangements for a bugler to play Taps
 - Arrangements for a flag-folding and presentation

We can also post a notice of the ceremony to Village residents at both the Mail Center and Hall Lobby, as well as on the NextDoor website.

Please note that no seating is provided for IN MEMORY ceremonies. In addition, we cannot cover the cost of flowers. Some elements of a ceremony, including buglers and flag foldings, are only available based on their availability.

Expecting a Package? Be sure to CHECK THE HALL!

Both the Post Office and other delivery services may leave large packages (or any size packages when the Mail Center's lock boxes are full) in the Living Room area of the CV Hall. Volunteers take the time to label these packages so they can be more easily identified, and will sometimes notify residents of these deliveries – but if you're expecting a package, be sure to stop in and check the Hall!

CV is Not an Assisted Living Community... but We Are a Caring Community

A few months ago, I (Janet) was picking up my mail when I noticed an elderly woman sitting in her running car. I asked if she needed any help. She was very confused because she couldn't find her mailbox key and didn't know what to do. When she got out of her car, I noticed right away that she could barely walk and was out of breath. I asked and she let me drive her home in her car.

I helped her climb the steps into her house and get to a chair to sit. Her dining room table was piled high with mail and who knows what! I was very worried about this poor woman. She was in no shape to live by herself, and certainly shouldn't have been driving. When I asked if she had family living close by, she told me she had four adult children, but all of them lived far away. This was not true, as I soon found out...

The next day I asked a friend to come with me to visit her. We showed up unannounced at her house and had a long serious talk with her, as if she were *our own mother*. Because she could barely walk and had an expired driver's license, we asked her to give up her car keys and she did so willingly. She couldn't remember the last names of her daughters, but through the magic of Facebook I was able to find and call one of her children living in Virginia, who then contacted her sister in San Diego. They were very thankful that we'd stepped in to help their mother. Without any supervision, she'd stopped taking her meds and her health had considerably deteriorated. The local daughter arrived the next day to begin the process of moving her to a care facility.

There are two ways we can avoid potentially dangerous situations such as this. First, we can monitor our own capabilities to safely remain independent. The other is to be aware of our neighbors, especially those who live alone. If we notice an unsafe situation and we don't know them or their family well enough to directly intervene, we can always contact the Office with our concerns.

As a reminder, although Care and Concern Committees provide caring activities for our community, they do not provide assisted living care. While Champagne Village is an active caring community, we are not an assisted living community.



2020 IS A LEAP YEAR

We need leap years to keep our modern-day calendar in alignment with Earth's revolutions around the Sun.

It takes Earth approximately 365.242189 days to circle once around the Sun. That's 365 days, 5 hours, 48 minutes, and 45 seconds – a difference of nearly six hours per year by today's modern (Gregorian) calendar.

Roman general Julius Caesar introduced the first leap years over 2000 years ago. His Julian calendar had only one rule: any year evenly divisible by four would be a leap year. Today's calendar follows the same principle. Leap day is an extra, or *intercalary* day and we add it to the shortest month of the year, February. If we didn't add a leap day on February 29, we'd lose nearly 24 days every 100 years!

February 29 is sometimes referred to as LEAP DAY. So Happy Leap Year – and Happy Leap Day!

Health Insurance News

We are still in an enrollment period through March 31st, for those who want to change their Advantage Plan. You have to be enrolled in plan to change to another, or you can drop an Advantage plan and go back to Original Medicare and purchase a drug plan.

Our Governor has proposed that California become the first state to establish their own generic label in order to reduce costs. As we all know, drugs have become a large part of medical costs. According to the Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development, from January 2017 to June 2019 generic drug prices increased 37.6%, while brand name drugs rose by 25.8%.

Generic drugs make up 90% of all prescriptions but account for a fraction of drug spending because they're much cheaper than brand-name prescriptions. Brand-name drugs make up the remaining 10%, but account for 70% of all drug spending according to a health data research firm. So while a state label for generics may help individual prescriptions, it may not have the desired reduction of overall state Medical costs, according to the Association for Accessible Medicines. At least someone is thinking outside the box to get drug costs under control.

Remember as you enter the new year to schedule your annual appointment for a checkup. Use your preventative care dollars to stay healthy. Many plans offer classes through Silver Sneakers or other health benefit programs. Some companies offer dollar rewards for participating in exercise classes and information classes.

Be certain to review your plan benefits for over-the-counter allowances on medical supplies. If you're in need of a walker or a wheelchair, you will need a prescription from your primary care doctor. Call Medicare for details (800) 633-4227.

A new approach to Medicine that is being offered is a Medical appointment by phone. Many Health Insurance companies are offering this service. Especially if you have a smart phone. You can call a doctor or nurse practitioner by phone 24/7. Using Facetime or by texting a picture, doctors can diagnose minor illnesses and prescribe medications without your leaving the house. They may also help you decide if you need to go to urgent care or the emergency room. This is a new version of the old-fashioned house call. Many Supplemental and Advantage plans offer this service for no cost or just a copay. Put the number in your contacts!

Reasons to File a 2019 Return

While many people are required to file a tax return, it's a good idea for everyone to determine if they should file. Some people with low income are not required to file, but will need to do so if they will receive a tax refund.

Here are five tips for deciding whether to file a tax return:

Determine the general reasons to file. In most cases, income, filing status and age determine if a taxpayer must file a tax return. Other rules may apply you are self-employed or can be claimed as a dependent of someone else. There are other reasons when a taxpayer must file.

Look at your tax that was withheld or paid. Ask yourself the following:

- Did your employer withhold federal income tax?
- Did you make estimated tax payments?
- Did you overpay last year and have the overage applied to this year's tax?

If you answered YES to any of these questions, you could be due a refund. And you must file a tax return to get your money.

Look into whether you can claim the earned income tax credit. A working taxpayer who earned less than \$55,592 last year could receive the EITC as a tax refund. You must qualify and may do so with or without a qualifying child.

Check child tax credit or credit for other dependents. Taxpayers can claim the child tax credit if they have a qualifying child under the age of 17 and meet other qualifications. Others may be eligible for the credit for other dependents. This includes people who have dependent children who are 17 or older at the end of 2019, and/or parents or other qualifying individuals they support.

Check for education credits. Two higher education credits reduce the amount of tax someone owes on their tax return: the American opportunity tax credit and the lifetime learning credit. You, your spouse or a dependent must have been a student enrolled at least half time for one academic period to qualify. You may qualify for one of these credits even if you don't owe any taxes.
