## NOTES FROM THE BOARD

Board Notes for Special Board Meeting of February 5, 2018 and Board of Director's Meeting of February 15, 2018

Over seventy CVPOA members attended each of these meetings. Thanks to all the residents who attended; the Board appreciates your attendance, questions and input.

A Special Board of Director's Meeting was held February 5 to vote on a contract for installation of License Plate Readers and supporting software at both entrance gates of Champagne Village, for a cost not to exceed \$19,000 to be charged to Access Gate Reserve. The contract was approved and awarded to Superior Gate Company.

The monthly Board of Director's Meeting was held February 15, 2018.

1. The minutes were approved for the January 18, 2018 Board of Director's Meeting, the January 22, 2018 Organizational Meeting, and the February 5, 2018 Special Meeting.
2. Acceptance of financial statements and bank reconciliations for the period ending January 31, 2018 was approved.
3. A proposal from Dennis Drummond, in the amount of \$1,450, to design the front gate entry landscape was approved.
4. A reserve expenditure in the amount of \$5,013.88, to upgrade the Fitness Room per a previously approved proposal was approved.
5. Approval to send the proposed, modified Rules and Regulations to the CVPOA membership after review by the Board was granted.
6. Confirmation of three expenditures (an AC motor for \$450.00; paint for the Pool Room wall - \$716.86; the fee for our well consultant at \$882.50) was approved.

The next Board of Director's Meeting is scheduled for March 15, 2018 at 6:00 pm in the Village Hall.

## UPDATE ON NEW GATE SYSTEM

We are anticipating that, by the time you read this newsletter, the front gate's new license plate reader system will be in operation. But in order to make use of this new system and gain entry through it, your license plate must be provided to us. You should have received a form requesting all license plate information: this form must be provided to the Office ASAP, to assure that you're 'in the system.'

**UNTIL YOUR LICENSE PLATE NUMBER IS IN THE SYSTEM, YOU CANNOT USE THE FRONT GATE.**

If you experience any problems while gaining access, please use the back (Welk Resort) gate, which will continue reading your transponders through the end of March. If you have any questions, please contact the Office.

## CVPOA CHECKS

If you are paying with a check and putting it in the office dropbox, **PLEASE DO NOT FOLD IT**. It jams our scanner and you will need to write another one.

We do not need the remittance slip or the envelope, just the check with your KH account # on it.

## Rules and Regulations Changes Coming Soon!

One of the many duties of the Board is to periodically re-examine the governing documents, to ensure that they continue to serve the needs of the community and remain up to date. As we've recently completed the necessary modifications to both the Bylaws and CC&Rs, our next step is to update the Rules and Regulations. This month, you'll receive a copy of the proposed changes to this document.

In summary, the Rules and Regulations clarify, detail and assist in the implementation of what's covered in the CC&Rs: they do not supersede or change the CC&Rs.

Per state law, the Rules and Regulations can be changed by a vote of the Board following a 30-day review by all Association members. After 30 days, the Board will review all comments and concerns, and consider this feedback in their decision. **If you have questions, comments or potential modifications, they must be provided in writing by Friday, March 30 in order to be considered prior to the Board's vote at the April Board meeting on Thursday, April 19.**



## Organizational Meetings

Most of us are familiar with executive sessions, Board meetings and agenda workshops... but what's an *organizational meeting*?

Each year immediately following the election for open Director seats, the Board meets to select its four Officers. During that annual organizational meeting, the Board also reviews and confirms a list of committee chairs for the year moving forward. Organizational meetings may also be required throughout the year when Directors leave the Board, to appoint a replacement. This is done to ensure that the organization continues without interruption: thus the term *organizational meeting*.

Because the business conducted in an organizational meeting does not qualify as an executive session, members have a right to attend the meeting and observe the process.

## DID YOU KNOW: Meeting Notices

Per our recently approved Bylaws and in accordance with state law, all Members must be given notice of the date, time and place of all open Board meetings at least four days before the date of the meeting. For closed executive sessions, at least two days' notice is required. If a Sunday or holiday falls within the four-day period, a five-day notice is required. All notices of meetings must be accompanied by an agenda of items to be discussed.

The only exception to this rule is an emergency meeting, where unforeseen circumstances require immediate attention and possible action by the Board.

**RUMOR BUSTERS:** We've heard some confusion around the Village from new residents regarding the Men's Breakfast. To clarify, it's not JUST for men: every resident and their guests may attend, women and children included! FYI: the Gathering Place is also open to both men and women (people have been asking about that as well).

### Five Facts About the Open Meeting Act

The aim of the Open Meeting Act is to make the governance of associations more open and accessible to members. Here are five facts you should know about it:

1. **No discussion of items not on the agenda.** The Board is barred from discussing any non-emergency issue that has not been placed on posted agenda. This ensures that all members know what, specifically, will be addressed at any meeting where they may not be present.
2. **Unofficial board meetings not permitted.** Any time a quorum of the Board (four or more persons) is together discussing an item over which they have control or can vote on, it's considered a Board meeting, which triggers the Open Meeting Act.
3. **Email deliberations not allowed.** While it's okay to relay some Board information via email, any back-and-forth discussion via email is not allowed, and must be done in front of the membership at a Board meeting.
4. **Reasons for closed sessions limited.** A closed session is for a narrow category of items, such as legal, personnel and disciplinary issues, contracts with third parties, and delinquent assessments. Any other business must be conducted in front of the membership at a Board meeting.
5. **Open forum is for MEMBERS.** The Open Meeting Act's open forum requirement is primarily to give members a chance to speak to the Board. And while they may respond to any comments made by members, the Board cannot act, decide or vote on anything that was not on the Agenda. It's important to keep this in mind when considering any response from the Board.

### I have a complaint! Techniques that Get Results

Our Board and the Office welcome constructive complaints because they help them do a better job. Results-oriented complaints usually can be settled in the initial stage and the result will be fewer complaints in the future. Here are some techniques to follow to ensure results:

- Research your governing documents to ensure that what you are commenting on, suggesting or requesting is reasonable.
- If the issue is complex, put it in writing.
- Keep the tone polite and professional. Try not to get angry or emotional.
- Avoid using threats. Threats diminish productive communication. If you push others, they will likely respond emotionally and the issue will be lost in the process.
- Always keep in mind that our CV staff deserves our respect and courtesy.
- State clearly and calmly what you would like done.
- Listen carefully to all responses before you ask questions.
- Getting to YES may require that you negotiate, so be ready to suggest alternative solutions.
- If there is an agreement, confirm it.
- If you cannot agree on a solution, stay calm. Research to see what other outcomes are possible, or get help if you need it.

## What's New at the Fitness Room?

Good News: at our last Board meeting, equipment and improvements were approved for our Fitness Room! Since early last year, the Ad Hoc committee has been working on a list of recommended improvements with Tom, our CV Property Manager, and past Board member Jean Slaughter. After speaking with several residents and two fitness professionals, we chose San Diego Fitness Warehouse for the equipment. John Ridgeway, besides having the best prices and ideas, has provided quality equipment and repair services to CV for many years and offered a 20% discount. The cost will be kept down because the labor will be done by CV staff. While most equipment will remain, one weight machine will be added. The Fitness Room will be reorganized into stations to create areas for cardio, weights and stretching.

Here's what is included in this effort:

- new paint
- replacement of stained carpet tiles
- Smith weight system added
- new bench
- wall-mounted stretching system
- resistance bands, balls, small weights and mats for stretching and rehab storage for items

Our goal is to create a safe, clean, up-to-date area that will increase usability for all residents, including those who are rehabbing after surgery. If you have any questions, please ask Tom or one of the members of this committee. We wish you a healthy year, and we look forward to seeing you at our soon to be redone Fitness Room! 





## WHAT'S a 433A?

In California, most lenders need proof prior to issuing a mortgage that a manufactured home is 'real property' - meaning that it's permanently attached to the land. A 433A form is proof that your manufactured home was installed on a state-approved foundation system, which mechanically attaches the home to the land. Once joined, your home is converted from personal property to real property, thus allowing potential buyers to seek a standard mortgage for a single-family residence.


Until a 433A is recorded with the County, no matter how significantly your manufactured home is supported, tied-down, strapped, or braced, it is considered personal property – which does not qualify for most standard mortgage loans.

Last month, the County of San Diego recently changed its interpretation on 433As by deciding that homeowners in communities like Champagne Village are not, in fact, land owners – and, as a result, stopped issuing them. But this month, our state legislator has fast-tracked an emergency change to the law that will define units like ours as real property. If passed, the newly modified bill would take effect immediately, and our County office will return to the business of issuing 433As.

In February, many of you signed a letter in support of this new law, which will come up for vote in the next few weeks. Because its passage is paramount to our community, we'll keep you posted on this important legislation!

## THE PROPANE PIPELINE PURPOSE AND RELIABILITY

The propane system at Champagne Village Mobile Home Park is a privately owned and operated propane distribution system supplied by Amerigas and has been in operation since 1968. The pipeline operates at a relatively low pressure of 10 psig. The pipeline is primarily constructed of coated steel and the majority of it is buried 2 feet underground. The park's qualified staff conducts periodic maintenance and repair, under the guidance of our Operations and Maintenance Plan and Operator Qualification Program, with the oversight and inspection of Federal, State, and Local regulating bodies, with the goal of providing a safe and reliable fuel for cooking and heating purposes to our residents and the public facilities available to our residents.

The maintenance activities on our propane pipeline include:

1. Periodic patrols for leaks, checks on propane meter and piping supports, evaluating corrosion on exposed propane piping, and repairs are conducted to correct any deficiencies.
2. Periodic testing of the propane odorant.
3. Annual testing and evaluation of key emergency propane valves. Additional service is conducted as needed.
4. Propane leak detection surveys of the buried and exposed pipeline are conducted every year. All hazardous leaks are repaired.
5. To extend the useful life of the pipeline and enhance its safe operation, a Sacrificial Cathodic Protection System is installed to prevent corrosion of the steel propane pipeline. This system is maintained and its effectiveness is tested periodically. Residents and vendors should avoid connecting grounds to the propane pipeline as this can deter the effectiveness of the cathodic (anti-corrosion) protection system.

## WHAT IS PROPANE GAS?

Propane gas is a non-toxic, colorless fuel, about 55% heavier than air. Propane gas burns, but only when mixed with air in the right proportion and ignited by a spark or flame. In its purified state, the propane has no smell. For your protection the propane company adds a harmless distinctive odor so you can detect and report the slightest propane leak.

## HOW SAFE IS PROPANE GAS?

1. Whenever propane leaks from a pipe or pipe fitting, there is a possibility of fire or explosion.
2. If leaking propane accumulates in a confined space, it can displace air and cause suffocation.
3. If a propane appliance is not working properly, incomplete combustion can produce carbon monoxide and other toxic gasses.
4. A pilot light or propane burner can ignite combustible materials and flammable vapors, such as gasoline, paint thinner or aerosols.

## HOW CAN YOU PREVENT PROPANE EMERGENCIES?

1. Keep all appliances cleaned, properly vented and serviced regularly.
2. Make sure everyone in your family knows how to operate propane appliances and shut-off valves.
3. Don't use an open propane oven for heating your home or drying clothes.
4. Don't use or store gasoline, aerosols or other products with flammable vapors near propane appliances.
5. Whenever changing your furnace filter be sure to replace the compartment door.
6. Never cover fresh air vents that supply air to your propane appliances.
7. Have all propane line alterations and appliance repairs performed by a qualified professional.
8. If your emergency propane valve is in an enclosure, check park rules about enclosures, make sure access doesn't require disassembly, that the enclosure is well ventilated, and that the propane regulator is vented directly to the outside. Enclosures disguising utility valves should indicate their presence on the enclosure so emergency personnel can find it quickly.
9. Keep belongings, and especially flammable materials, well away from the propane service pedestal. Do not place heavy items on the meter set assembly. Do not remove any bracing from the meter assembly.

## PROPANE SAFETY PUBLIC AWARENESS MESSAGE

10. Do not park vehicles near the pipeline and meter assemblies that are unprotected by barriers. Report any pipeline and/or meter assemblies you believe are inadequately protected.
11. Before digging in your yard, be sure to consult with park staff concerning the location of underground propane lines and other utilities. Current required depth is 18". Early systems may be shallower in depth.
12. Write your local fire and police department emergency numbers and our emergency service number in the front of your phone book.

### HOW SHOULD YOU ACT IN A PROPANE EMERGENCY?

Propane leakage may occur from faulty appliances, loose connections, service lines inside or outside your home, or from propane mains. Leaks can be caused by poor construction, damage due to corrosion, outside force, natural events, improper/unauthorized excavation, or equipment failure. Leaks can be dangerous and should be dealt with promptly by qualified experts. If you ever smell propane - even if you do not use it in your home - take these precautions promptly.

1. **Call 24hr 760-749-8008 from a phone well away from the source of the propane odor.**
2. **If odor is very strong and you are indoors, go outside. Don't forget your pets!**
3. **Do not turn any electrical switches on or off, operate phones (including cell phones), or any other device which may cause a spark.**
4. **Do not light matches, smoke or create any other source of combustion.**

However slim the chances of danger, it doesn't pay to take needless risks. At the first sniff of propane, play it safe. Call us! The park has staff trained to respond to emergencies.

### YANA Program (You Are Not Alone)

YANA is an outreach program for citizens living alone, who, for whatever reason, are homebound. Members of the Senior Volunteer Patrol Program (SVP) monitor the welfare of Y.A.N.A. participants with personal calls and/or visits at their homes regularly. This service is provided *free* of charge.

The SVP is a group of concerned senior citizens, 50 years and older, who volunteer their time to patrol business and residential areas. They are clearly recognizable by their blue and white Sheriff's department uniforms.

It takes only a few minutes to enroll yourself or a loved one in the Y.A.N.A. Program. You will gain peace of mind knowing that the trained men and women of the Senior Volunteer Patrol will be looking out for you or someone you care about.

If you are interested, pick up an application in the Office lobby, complete it, and then return it to the kiosk workers who will pass it on to the Senior Volunteers.

### Wanted: Senior Patrol Volunteers

The San Diego County Sheriff's Department is looking for Senior Volunteer Patrol members. If you are over 50 years of age and you have at least 6 hours a week to serve others, call **(760) 510-5290** and see if you qualify to be on the Senior Volunteer Sheriff Patrol. A complete background check is done on all applicants.

Duties range from traffic control, patrolling the neighborhoods, home vacation checks, clerical work and checking on the welfare of elderly or disabled people. This just might be what you are looking for in your retirement years.

## HEALTH INSURANCE NEWS

This April you will be receiving a new Medicare Card from the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS). It will be mailed to all current Medicare Card holders automatically. You will not need to do anything unless your address is not up-to-date. If you need to make an address change, go online at [ssa.gov](http://ssa.gov) and update your account. Or call your local Social Security office for help.

Your new card will have a different number specific to you. The new cards will no longer have your Social Security number on them. This will give more identity protection.

The new "cards" will apparently be paper. According to Medicare this makes it easier for Providers to copy and use. It might be advisable to make a few copies of your new card to file away in case it gets worn out or torn with use.

It is recommended that you carry this new card with you even if you have an Advantage Card because your medical providers will need to update their files and will be asking for a copy of your new Medicare Card.

***As soon as you receive the new card, destroy the old red, white and blue card and start using the new card right away.***

Only give your new number to doctors, pharmacists and other health care providers or insurance agents that require your card. These providers are all regulated by the Health Information Privacy law which protects you.

WATCH OUT for scams. Medicare will not be phoning you (uninitiated by you) to ask for your private information. If anyone does call and threaten you for money or loss of coverage, hang up and call 800-633-4227 immediately to report it.


Residents and their dogs are invited to gather in the Pet Park to socialize and enjoy being outdoors.
