## Notes From the Board Meeting

- A motion to approve using ACA Web Consulting for our website Services was tabled due to lack of a written proposal.
- The Board voted to appoint a replacement board member for Ed Hocking who resigned on January 31, 2019. A motion was unanimously approved to appoint Jean Slaughter to the term which ends in May of 2020.
- A motion to keep the kitchen locked when not in use and require members to check out a key when they need to use it was unanimously approved.
- A proposal from Trower to perform the 2020 Complete Reserve Study was discussed and approved by the Board.

### RULES ENFORCEMENT POLICY AND FINE SCHEDULE

Last Thursday all owners should have received a notice that the Board would be voting on a draft Rules Enforcement Policy and an updated Fine Schedule. Anytime the Board is going to vote on a change to the rules, a draft of the rule must be sent to all owners 30 days prior to the vote. The current Rules Enforcement Policy and Fine Schedule is over 25 years old and is being updated to reflect current law, as well as, a fine schedule which will incentivize compliance. ### Village First Aid Program

Tami is helping me reestablish a first aid program to provide emergency provisions throughout the community. The kits will include spray to address rashes and bug bites, Band Aids, eye wash kits, gauze, tape and an ace bandage. These supplies are meant to dress wounds on an emergency basis until the accident victim can address further treatment with their doctor or urgent care. These kits will be stored in 6 places throughout the community:

- Women's locker room at the Pool
- Card Room in the Village Hall
- Hallway closet in the Village Hall
- Tennis courts
- Kitchen
- Gathering Place

All these areas will be marked with green signage to designate that there are supplies stored inside that space. Once someone has opened and used these supplies contained in the clear plastic bag provided, the bag should be returned to the Office to be replenished. If the Office is closed please use the dropbox. This program is meant to keep supplies fresh and easily available. ## PROBLEMS WITH THE BACK GATE

Some residents are having issues getting in the back gate (Welk Resort) with the license plate reader. We're working with the vendor to solve the problem. If you're having continuing problems try the following:

1. Make sure your front plate is clean.
2. Remove your front license plate frame.
3. Make sure that you are driving through the **two white lines** in the middle of the parking lot and **stopping** to allow the reader to activate.
4. Please note the date and time of any malfunction and report to the Office. The vendor can view the video to see what the cause may be and work with you to correct it.
5. This may seem silly but **you must have a front plate** to use the back gate.

# we need your vote!

Our plan to drill a well and locate water for irrigating our landscaping was a success: **WE FOUND WATER!** Now, we need to complete the project by piping this water throughout the Village. This will save us at least \$12,000 each month in water bills **THIS YEAR ALONE**, and even more in the years to come. But **WE NEED YOUR VOTE** to use up to \$450,000 from our reserve account to pay for this project.

## VOTING YES means:

you authorize up to \$450,000 to be spent so that the well project can be completed.

you understand that this amount will be funded from our reserve account.

you agree that increases to our monthly assessment due to higher water bills should be avoided.

you understand that our plan is to return these funds to our reserve account over 4-5 years.

you understand that, once our reserve account is replenished, excess funds will be available to better our community.

our village will remain beautiful and **GREEN!**

## VOTING NO (or not voting at all) means:

the well project will **NOT** be completed. the water we drilled for and found will go unused.

a special assessment may be needed **ASAP** to pay for this year's budget shortage, due to excess water bills.

your monthly assessment will need an immediate \$6.00 per month increase and then another increase of more than \$10.00 per month each year thereafter, in order to pay for water.

we may need to water less - meaning that our beautiful community will turn **BROWN.**

# Well Project: Frequently Asked Questions

**HOW MUCH IS OUR WATER BILL?** In 2018, we paid \$189,000 for water. This year, we expect to pay about \$209,000.

**HOW MUCH OF THIS IS USED FOR IRRIGATION?** About 95% of our water bill is used to irrigate the common area: that's \$179,000 for 2018.

**HOW MUCH WILL OUR WATER BILL INCREASE?** Our water bills have been increasing about 17% each year. Using this estimate, we'll pay about \$245,000 in 2020; \$287,000 in 2021; \$336,000 in 2022.

**WHERE ARE WE SO FAR?** We've already hired consultants, drilled for and located water, installed and housed the pump and other equipment, and prepared an irrigation plan – all at a cost of \$148,000.

**WHAT'S NEXT?** To complete the project, we need to pipe the water to the watering zones in the Village.

**HOW MUCH WILL THIS COST?** \$393,000, plus \$57,000 available for unforeseen contingencies.

**WHY ARE WE VOTING ON THIS AMOUNT, BUT DIDN'T NEED TO VOTE ON THE \$148K SPENT SO FAR?** In order to conduct the business of running the community, our governing docs authorize the Board to spend up to 10% of the gross annual budget. Any capital expenditure in excess of that amount must be approved by a majority of the voting power of the Association.

**HOW MUCH WILL THIS WELL SAVE US?** We'll still need to pay for water used at the pool and in the restrooms, kitchen and laundry room – and we'll need to pay for electricity to pump water to the irrigation zones (about \$7200.00 per year). But after that's all paid, we'll save \$144,800 over the next year – and more in the coming 4-5 years.

**WHERE WILL THE \$450K COME FROM?** We'll use some of the funds in our reserve account. Over the next 4-5 years, we'll replenish the reserve account from the money we save, to restore it to its previous amount.

**IS IT SAFE TO TAKE THAT MUCH MONEY FROM THE RESERVES?** Yes. We calculated a worst-case scenario, and determined that the lowest our reserve account will go still allows us to care for our community, fund all projects per our reserve study, and meet FHA requirements. The CVPOA is responsible for financing our reserves, protecting those funds, and taking care of the community: all of this will continue to happen throughout both this project and the period of time we're replenishing the reserve account.

**IS THIS A LOAN?** No. We are permitted to use our reserve funds for capital improvements to our community, and this project is just that: an improvement to our existing irrigation system. And while we are not legally obligated to 'pay' these funds back to our reserve account, we believe that replenishing the reserves is important to the fiscal health of our Association.

**WHAT IF THE PROJECT GOES OVER \$450K?** The amount we're voting to approve is \$57,000 over the project's contracted cost. Having this cushion helps if we hit any snags. This assures that the work won't slow down while waiting for approval to allocate additional funds.

**WHICH SCHEDULED PROJECTS AND REPAIRS WILL NOT BE DONE AS A RESULT OF THIS PROJECT?** Everything that is scheduled for repair or replacement over the next 4-5 years will NOT be impacted by this project. We've made certain that whatever needs to be done WILL be done. The funds are available for both the well project AND all scheduled repairs and replacements.

**CAN THE WELL WATER BE USED FOR ANYTHING ELSE?** This water can't be used for swimming, drinking, washing or flushing. We're only using it to irrigate landscaping in the common areas.

**HOW DO WE KNOW OUR WELL WON'T GO DRY?** No one can guarantee that a well won't go dry. But there are strong indicators that this well will last. First, this is a deep water source: these types of wells generally don't depend on rainwater. Second, we've drilled pretty deep into the water source, so we won't be affected as the level rises and falls. The flow rate is also impressively high – which typically means that the source is robust. To test this, we pumped a very large amount of water out of the pump in a short period of time, and the flow rate remained strong. But if the unlikely occurs and this well goes dry, it would cost about \$30,000 to drill another well – and with an annual savings of almost \$145,000 we could afford this expense should it become necessary.

**WILL THIS KEEP OUR VILLAGE SAFER IN THE EVENT OF A FIRE?** The well water won't be hooked up to our hydrants, so it won't be available to fight fires. Also, electricity might be cut if a large fire is being fought, and this would render the water pump useless. But a well-irrigated landscape would help slow the spread of a fire by strengthening our defensible area.

**WHAT HAPPENS ONCE THE RESERVE ACCOUNT IS FULLY REPLENISHED?** When the reserves are fully paid back in 4-5 years or less, we'll have an additional \$145,000 each year that's available, at the Board's direction, for any number of projects to better our community.

**WHAT HAPPENS IF THIS DOES NOT PASS?** First, we'll more than likely need a special assessment of \$6.00 per month to offset a higher water bill than we budgeted for this year. In 2020 and in the future, we'll continue to be at the mercy of water rate increases. Our monthly fees will go up by more than \$10 per month next year and each year after. At some point, we may need to cut back on irrigation. This will adversely impact the beauty of our community. Property values may be affected as well, given increased dues and decreased watering.

## Red Flags and the Deer Springs Fire Protection District

During dry windy Santa Ana conditions, red flags will be posted to indicate weather conditions that create a 'critical risk' of a wildfire. The intent of these red flag warnings is to alert everyone to the potential of a wildfire, and to plan accordingly. These include being extra careful with activities that could start a fire, checking your yard and the exterior of your house to reduce the likelihood that your house could catch fire, and mentally preparing if a fire would require evacuation of the Village.

The National Weather Service issues Red Flag Warnings & Fire Weather Watches to alert fire departments of the onset, or possible onset, of critical weather and dry conditions that could lead to rapid or dramatic increases in wildfire activity. A Red Flag Warning is issued for weather events which may result in extreme fire behavior that will occur within 24 hours. A Fire Weather Watch is issued when critical weather conditions could occur in the next 12-72 hours.

Deer Springs Fire Protection District (DSFPD) has had a cooperative agreement with CAL FIRE since 1994. The cooperative agreement benefits the District with additional personnel and equipment at no cost to the District. CAL FIRE pays the District to staff additional fire engines. With the anticipation of a wind event, CAL FIRE will start a staffing pattern to augment additional personnel, fire engines, aircraft, and pre-position additional resources in the affected areas. What does the DSFPD do as we enter critical weather conditions? The red flags are a serious issue for the DSFPD, and DSFPD's personnel take several steps as the potential threat of a wildfire is raised. District personnel are on heightened alert and make doubly sure that their equipment is ready to go on a moment's notice. Days off are cancelled. Additional personnel staff reserve engines and utilities to fill fire line positions so they can be mobilized quickly before and during a critical risk condition.

DSFPD recommends several great websites to help residents plan for emergency situations, as well as other community services. 

## NEW POSTCARD FOR YOUR 2018 TAXES

Have you seen the new postcard for filing your 2018 tax return? What a relief! Everyone has been waiting for a simplified approach!

But wait ... not so fast. It turns out the postcard individual return includes an additional six — yes, SIX — schedules. And filling out your required new W-4 form will prove to be a nightmare.

Last December's federal Tax Cuts and Jobs Act is the biggest tax law change we've seen since 1986. This 257-page bill (77,024 words) changes (but DOES NOT SIMPLIFY) the way the federal government will tax individuals and businesses.

I have studied numerous analyses and supplemental IRS and Franchise Tax Board guidance addressing countless confusing provisions, many of which remain unclear even to the industry's top experts. Since last December, I have increased the hours of tax classes I have taken by 20 in order to keep pace with tax updates as they develop.

**Identity theft:** Tax refund fraud and identity theft are an increasing problem. Please remember these tips:

The IRS does not call you about collection or balances due. If you get one of these calls, hang up immediately.

If you receive an official looking bill for a small amount - maybe \$200 or so - **do not pay** without contacting your tax preparer first. In the most recent fraudulent letters, you are told to make out a check to 'I.R.S.' rather than to 'United States Treasury' and the return address does not match the processing center address posted on the IRS website. Check [irs.gov](http://irs.gov) for the correct address.

We need to rely on each other! Only together do we have the power to protect our neighborhood: it's up to ALL OF US to take care of each other and our community. So if you see anything and want to report something, please speak up. Thanks!

## HEALTH INSURANCE NEWS

Last month I wrote an article about the need for travel insurance outside of the United States. I would like to continue on the topic of insurance for foreign travel in this article. But first I want to remind seniors that a new enrollment period is still in effect until March 31 for those who want to change an Advantage plan to another Advantage plan or return to original Medicare. Just contact your agent.

While travel agents have reported an 80% increase in international travel in 2017 and numbers are expected to increase more for 2018 due mainly to the cruise industry, foreign travelers purchased medical travel insurance 80% of the time while U.S. travelers only purchased medical travel insurance between 38% and 46% depending on whose report you read. Most Americans will choose flight delay or trip cancellation insurance before considering medical trip insurance.

Only one credit card (American Express Black) currently covers any medical situations apart from ticket purchase and trip interruption, etc.

The situation of medical needs of foreign travelers is so great that 26 European countries (called the Schengen block) require proof of at least 30,000 Euros of medical insurance to obtain a visa to visit their countries. Ireland and the UK are considering a similar requirement, as is Australia. The U.S. is also seriously considering mandatory visitors' coverage in the near future.

While some reimbursement coverage is offered by some senior plans, currently no U.S. based health plans offer emergency medical transport, emergency medical evacuation or repatriation for foreign travel. All of which can be covered by an international medical health plan. Get a quote before you make your next trip out of the country. It can save you great financial hardship and maybe your life if needed.




