Board Meeting Notes

Thursday, February 20, 2020

By unanimous vote the Board approved the new Election Policy, which complies with California's recently passed SB 323. Tom Riggs, Community Manager, briefly spoke on changes needed to our policies and – potentially – our governing documents as a result of this new law. This includes our requirement to hold elections even when the number of candidates is less than or equal to the number of available Director seats (an unfortunate expense, given that we recently modified our governing documents in 2018 to allow for elections to be bypassed in these instances in order to save time and money).

In addition, this new law will lengthen our election cycle by about 60 more days. Previously, ballots had to be sent at least 30 days before the counting of ballots, while SB 323 now requires that we announce the upcoming election and all nominees at least 30 days before the ballots are distributed. And because we are now required to announce a call for nominations at least 30 days before close of nominations, our entire election cycle will now take 90 days. (Several other changes may be required over the coming months due to the passage of SB 323: both the Board and Community Manager are continuing discussions on these issues and their impact here at CV).

In other business, the Board approved a Reserve expenditure not to exceed \$1000 to replace the computer in the Kiosk at the front gate.

A Customer Appreciation Event held by Orion Cable was also approved for February 29th in the Village Hall.

Finally, a reminder that a special Board Meeting will be held Wednesday, March 4th at 1:00pm in the Village Hall. The sole purpose of this meeting is to count the ballots submitted for repeal of the Board's decision to allow motorcyclists to park at their homes in the Village.



SAFETY TIPS

Your Garage and Shed

This is the first of a series of articles from the Emergency Planning Committee that offer tips on helping you keep your home safe. Watch for additional articles and events over the coming issues.

According to the U.S. Fire Administration, residential garage fires tend to spread faster than fires that start in other areas of a home. Consequently, they cause more injuries and financial losses than other house fires. Use these tips to help prevent fires in your garage or shed:

- Always keep items that can catch fire away from appliances that produce heat.
- Since electrical malfunction is the leading cause of garage fires, use electrical appliances or tools carefully.
- Plug only one charging appliance or major appliance at a time in a socket.
- When powering or charging appliances, avoid using extension cords if possible.
- Consider installing a heat alarm (in addition to a smoke alarm) that will sound when it detects dangerously high temperatures.
- Check all alarms once each month and replace batteries once every year.
- If you spill gasoline or any flammable liquid, soak it up with sawdust or cat litter, then dispose of it in a safe container once the spill is fully absorbed.
- Avoid using carpets, rugs, non-fire-retardant tarps or cardboard on the garage or shed floor, as these may absorb flammable liquids and cause a fire.
- Make sure your garage or shed is equipped with GFCIs (ground-fault circuit interrupters).
- Keep oily rags in air-tight containers and away from heat sources.
- Ensure that the door leading from the garage to your house is solid, with a threshold to block fire from traveling to the house and weather stripping to prevent carbon monoxide fumes from passing through.
- Overall, avoid any accumulation of long-standing trash or junk that could fuel a fire.

Considering a Run for the Board?

Board membership can be rewarding, but it's not for everyone. Before you throw your name into the hat, here are a few things to consider before running for the Board:

- The best Board members run because they're interested in supporting the overall success of the community, not just a single issue.
- While Board members do hear from happy Association members, they are more likely to deal with unhappy ones – so your ability to thoughtfully respond (and not react) will be important.
- Because your role on the Board is to consider all sides of an issue to make decisions that benefit the entire community, you need to keep an open mind, even when someone disagrees with you.
- Being on the Board is about teamwork. Individuals must respectfully work together even when they do not agree.
- While the Board typically meets once each month, a good deal of discussion and decision-making goes into the effort, and other meetings may be needed. You need to be willing to put in the time needed beyond these meetings.
- Read your governing documents! A good sense of familiarity with the CC&Rs, Bylaws, and Rules and Regulations is important, especially when you're considering a run.
- Even if you've served on other types of Boards, being on an HOA board is an entirely different effort. Because of this, it's best to talk with current and former Board members about what to expect. Their input can give you a clearer perspective of how you can contribute, as well as whether you want to run.

Serving on the Board can be a rewarding process that enables you to make a tangible impact on this community. If you're up for the job, be sure to **submit your application (you can get one from the Office) before 4:00pm Friday, March 27th**. If being on the Board doesn't feel like the right fit, there are lots of other ways to get involved and contribute! Talk with the Office to learn more about how you can participate here in Champagne Village.

What are the Qualifications for being a Board Member?

The following is required to be qualified as a candidate for the Board:

- You must be an Association member (homeowner) in good standing (fully paid up in your monthly CVPOA fees or with a Board-approved payment plan in place).
- You must have been an Association member for at least the last 12 months.
- You must have been a full-time resident of Champagne Village for at least six months in each of the past two years.
- If you've served on the Board for more than two consecutive terms, at least 11 months must have elapsed since your last term (each term is two years).
- At least 11 months must have elapsed since any co-owner of your residence has served as a Director.

In addition, recently passed legislation allows the Association to disqualify any nominee if that person discloses, or if the Association is aware or becomes aware of, a past criminal conviction that would, if the person was elected, either prevent the Association from purchasing bond coverage required by law or terminate the Association's existing bond coverage.

If you'd like to run for the Board, be sure to pick up an application in the Office. All applications must be submitted no later than 4:00pm Friday, March 27th.

Crime Prevention here in CV

Are you interested in **jump-starting the NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH PROGRAM** that was once active in CV? Though a Neighborhood Watch sign is remains posted at the front gate, this program apparently died from lack of interest (or complacency) years ago.

While our community seems relatively safe, there are some vulnerabilities we may wish to address before they become problematic. With what seems like increasing frequency, it is not unusual to find individuals who have no legitimate reason to be in our community. While our front gate helps, we know that we are not truly secure. We are all concerned about theft, scams targeting the elderly and elder abuse. A Neighborhood Watch program can help deter or prevent many of these types of problems and are nationally recognized as an effective tool in crime suppression. It may also help increase the resale value of our homes, if future buyers notice that we take crime prevention seriously.

We have been in touch with a Sheriff's Crime Prevention Specialist who is anxious to assist us in restarting our NW program if there is sufficient community interest in doing so. The program is free and will require a few volunteer meetings per year. If you'd like us to organize and run the meetings, we'll make sure they're short, fun and informative.

Securing CV Requires YOUR Help

While the gates and fences of Champagne Village deter crime in our community, but certainly they do not eliminate it. Their effectiveness entirely depends on the support and knowledge of every resident. Please follow these important guidelines:

Be careful of who you let in. After hours, calls from the front gate with claims that they need to deliver a package may not be true. Other claims – such as needing to visit someone who can't get to the phone, or a vendor who needs to access a vacant home are may also be questionable. Unless you are expecting something or know the person calling from the gate, hang up.

Let the gate staff know if you're expecting someone. You are required to notify the Kiosk staff of all guests and visitors. No one is granted access to the Village without advance notice or a phone call.

If you see something, say something. If you see a suspicious car or person and are not sure they should be there, call the Office or the Sheriff. We are all responsible for the safety of Champagne Village, so don't assume that someone else has reported it.

Report abuse. Our Board and Office are responsible for enforcing our community rules, but they rely on each of us to report unauthorized persons using the gates as well as residents who provide access to those who do not belong inside CV. You should also immediately report any gate or fence damage you see to the Office.

Deter tailgating. Once you've been provided access, proceed through and wait until the gate arm completely drops behind you; this will prevent any vehicle behind you from proceeding without having had their license plate fed through the system.



Health Insurance News

March 31st is the last day that Medicare clients can make a change from one Advantage plan to another without a special circumstance.

The Fifth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled that the individual mandate stating that everyone must carry insurance or pay a penalty for the Affordable Care Act (Covered California) is unconstitutional. The other provisions of the law were not addressed. We'll have to wait and see how this ruling affects the overall program, not to mention the new mandatory law California enacted this year. Everyone is now required to have insurance in California or pay a penalty in their state taxes next year. A lot more will certainly come up after the election in November.

Another change on the horizon is in the area of access to care. CVS Health, Humana, Walgreens, Walmart and UnitedHealth Group are branching out to become primary care providers. These and soon others will operate hundreds of clinics that market themselves as primary care providers and provide a majority of primary care services. All plan to open more clinics this year.

There are several reasons for the move toward primary care medicine: a shortage of doctors entering general practice, and primary care is viewed as a less expensive way to lower downstream healthcare spending. Also, for pharmacies, primary care is another source of revenue as drugstore chains face competition from Amazon and other online retailers.

At the same time, fewer Americans are using primary care. Interestingly, researchers have attributed the decline to Millennials and Generation X patients who prefer convenience over visiting the same physician. I wonder if the younger generations will feel the same way when they are seniors and history begins to feel more important. Perhaps technology will solve that issue! A lot of changes are ahead.

In an era when it seems like more people are health conscious, the statistics tell another story. Currently in the US nearly 40% of all adults over the age of 20 are currently obese. Health risks go up in almost every area when obesity is an underlying factor. In 2019, the American Cancer Society found that obesity-related cancers are rising, including a third of liver cancer deaths are linked to obesity.

We need to keep moving friends and make good choices in diet. At the same time, we need to teach the next generations how to be healthy.

Where's My Refund??

The question most frequently asked of the IRS this time of year is "Where's my refund?" The Internal Revenue Service reminds taxpayers they can get fast answers to their refund questions by using the **Where's My Refund?** tool available on IRS.gov and through the IRS2Go app.

The IRS issues nine out of 10 refunds in less than 21 days, and the fastest way to get a refund is to file electronically and choose direct deposit.


The IRS reminds taxpayers that IRS customer service representatives can only research a refund's status if it has been 21 days or more since the taxpayer filed electronically or six weeks since they mailed a paper return.

All that is needed is the taxpayer's Social Security number, tax filing status (single, married, head of household) and exact amount of the tax refund claimed on the return. Alternatively, taxpayers may call 800-829-1954 for the automated phone line, which provides the same information.

Within 24 hours of filing a return electronically, the tool can tell taxpayers that their returns have been received. That time extends to four weeks if a paper return is mailed to the IRS, which is another reason to file electronically and choose direct deposit.

Once the tax return is processed, 'Where's My Refund?' will tell a taxpayer when their refund is approved and provide a date when they can expect to receive it. 'Where's My Refund?' is updated no more than once every 24 hours, usually overnight, so taxpayers don't need to check the status more often.

While the IRS still expects to issue more than nine out of 10 refunds in less than 21 days, it's possible that a particular tax return may require additional review and a refund could take longer. Many different factors can affect the timing of a refund. Also, remember to take into consideration that many banks do not process payments on weekends or holidays and it can take time for a financial institution to post the refund to a taxpayer's account or to receive it by mail.



How the 2020 Census will invite everyone to respond



What to Expect in the Mail

When it's time to respond, most households will receive an invitation in the mail.

Every household will have the option of responding online, by mail, or by phone.

Depending on how likely your area is to respond online, you'll receive either an invitation encouraging you to respond online or an invitation along with a paper questionnaire.

Letter Invitation

- Most areas of the country are likely to respond online, so most households will receive a letter asking you to go online to complete the census questionnaire (or to respond by phone).
- We plan on working with the U.S. Postal Service to stagger the delivery of these invitations over several days. This way we can spread out the number of users responding online, and we'll be able to serve you better if you need help over the phone.

Letter Invitation and Paper Questionnaire

- Areas that are less likely to respond online will receive a paper questionnaire along with their invitation. The invitation will also include information about how to respond online or by phone.

We understand you might miss our initial letter in the mail.

- Every household that hasn't already responded will receive reminders and will eventually receive a paper questionnaire.
- It doesn't matter which initial invitation you get or how you get it—we will follow up in person with all households that don't respond.
