BOARD MEETING NOTES

1. The Board approved an accounting procedure to write off \$3,346.42 of pre-foreclosure assessments for unit #258. The unit is now bank owned, for sale, and current on all assessments.

2. Reserve funds not to exceed \$6,163 for the purchase of plants, small boulders, and mulch to complete the landscape at the west end of the bocce ball area were allocated.

3. An expenditure not to exceed \$1,500 was approved to implement several of the safety/crime prevention items developed by the committee. These items include signs, cameras, and a test version of a solar street light for possible future lighting improvements.

Concerned About YOUR Safety

These past few months the Safety Committee has been working to make our Village a safer place to live. I appreciate those on the committee who gave their time. Also, Charlie Service and Tom Riggs for the encouragement and help they have given the committee. **Now it is up to each of us to do our part.** I hope you will take a few minutes of your time to read this report.

1. The lighting in the Village is improving and many lights have been replaced. Please report lights out in your area. One solar light will be tried and maybe more if they are effective in dark areas.
2. Several surveillance cameras and signs will be installed to help deter break-ins and robberies.
3. "No Trespassing" and "Neighborhood Watch" signs will be installed. You may pick up a Neighborhood Watch sticker from the Office to put in your front window.

General Reminders: Keep your doors locked; call the Sheriff if you observe suspicious activities (**SHERIFF - 1-858-565-5200**); slow down in the Village; STOP at all stop signs; don't let strangers in your home; notify the Kiosk when you have friends or workers coming to your home; help us with the gate access by not allowing cars to follow you through the gate - slow down and let the arm come down or the gate close behind you, especially at night; do not buzz anyone through the gate that you do not know.

The San Marcos Sheriff Station will be sending extra patrols through our Village at different times of the week. *You may also ask them to do vacation checks on your home when you go on vacation; pick up the form from the Office, fill it out, then give it to the Kiosk ladies before you leave town.* There is a service called **YANA (You are not alone)**. This is for seniors who live alone. The volunteer sheriff will check on you every day and make sure you are okay.

When you see these people around the Village thank them for serving on the Safety Committee: Bob Clanton, Mary Klopp, Barbara Houg, Ernie Liebman, Bob and Roberta Suttie, Michael Holder, Jerry Clifford, and Joe and Cheryl Wolowsky.

Hey there garden lovers, get ready for a Springtime Succulent Sale, a fundraising event for the Village Care and Concern Committee.

What the heck are succulents? Well, they are just about the most perfect plants in the world for our climate. They are easy, drought tolerant, beautiful, and interesting. They attract us with colorful leaves, striking spines and a penchant for the bizarre. They live forever and multiply like crazy. Even if you struggle with other plants, you are likely to find success with succulents.

There will be a garden pot at all seven homes for your voluntary contributions. This year I've asked Green Thumb Nursery in San Marcos to give all our participants a gift card. If you've never been to the Green Thumb, it's across the street from the movie theaters on San Marcos Blvd. I purchased a delicate vine that gets no sun and is still alive through this cold spell! Here are the participants this year:

Betty Mortz #28 Live Oak Lane

Betty's garden has a lush feel and is the hardiest yard I've seen with REAL GRASS! It's tenderly cared for every week by the ubiquitous Filberto. The lawn wraps around in back so check out the section behind her home by going down her driveway. On this part of Live Oak you feel as if you are living in a forest. Betty will be at a Padres game that afternoon so don't expect to see her.

Blanche and Walter Zielinski #54 Sycamore Lane

For those of you who go out the front gate (and who doesn't?), I'll bet you've been following the daily progress of the Zielinski's garden. Water Wise Botanicals has done a great job utilizing succulents and real grass! Walter and Blanche have promised to be sitting on their porch to meet you and answer any questions you might have.

Luella Guthrie #383 Mulberry Lane

The walkway leading to the back of Lue's home is lovely. Lue and Bernie moved to CV in 1990 and just three months later started their landscaping. In 2001 they decided to "landscape" their driveway also. An unusual surprise awaits you at the end. And for you naysayers who say, "What, a putting green is part of a garden tour?" - I say YES, if it gets you outside to enjoy your backyard with friends, and if it makes you happy. This is the perfect golfing garden for Lue!

Michael & Peggy Holder #139 Terrace

As if these two dynamos didn't already have enough to do! They seem to spend a good deal of time making sure their garden is just as lovely as the view they have from the top of the mountain. If you've never been to their home you're in for a treat! Here's all the "stuff" they have planted: fruit bearing loquat, dwarf cumquat trees, gardenias, geraniums, wandering jew, lavender, jasmine, and various succulents. Together they built a staircase on their hillside and planted red apple, yucca and wild cactus. For other interesting touches they put up a pergola and added deer statues (which I swear move in the middle of the night!). The wagon wheels are remnants of an authentic 1800 wagon kept on their ranch in Long Beach.

Sherry Russell #213 Camphor Lane

This is one of those "secret" gardens that you cannot see from the street. It's small yet all of the plants have a special meaning for Sherry and bring back many memories from her childhood. Among her favorites are the miniature sweet peas and alstroemeria. "Gardening is an ongoing experiment and I'm always enhancing my garden. Some plants which thrived in Coronado did not do well here. I lost my two woolly bushes from Australia. I planted them at 12 inches and they grew to 7 feet!" Sherry enjoys going to the garden shows at the Del Mar Fairgrounds.

Cheryl & Joe Wolowsky #297 Lawrence Welk

Many of you may have driven by Cheryl and Joe's new home, but have you walked into their backyard? Seeing their front yard encouraged me to buy a variety of succulents for the first time. That, to me, is the fun of the Garden Tour, seeing what other homeowners have done and getting encouraged to do the same in my own garden.

Pat & Janet LeRossignol #435 Live Oak Lane

There's an old fashioned country charm to this garden. It's a very welcoming feel. Pat and Janet have a great view overlooking the meandering stream in their private "forest" behind them. They admit that they don't have green thumbs and have changed their garden many times when they couldn't keep plants alive. Their method is to drive around the Village to see which plants "thrive" in other yards and then plant them to see if they thrive at their house. The African Daisies are doing great, so are several tea trees and, of course, the red apple on the back hill.

MEET MARK & SANDY HENDERSON

Meet the team of CleanShine, the dynamic duo of Mark and Sandy Henderson. This married Champagne Village pair can be seen racing around from house to house cleaning everything in their path. Their little company of two was nameless until one of their clients exclaimed, "Wow, our house sure is clean and shiny now!" That was over 23 years ago.

Q: So what do you guys think about the general cleanliness in Village homes?

A: Most people are not terrible clutter bugs...with one or two major exceptions. No names will ever be revealed! We actually have a few people who spend hours cleaning for us before we arrive to clean.

Q: How much business have you enjoyed in the Village over the years?

A: Hundreds of them; at one point in time over 80 over a given period. Most of our jobs originate when someone gets sick or breaks an arm or such. Then we come in to help and end up staying on.

Q: How frequently do Villagers need your services?

A: Actually, most are only once a month. Residents are generally pretty tidy and don't need us too much. Many, however, do want us every or every other week.

Q: Do you generally keep your clients for a long time?

A: People tend to keep us forever it seems, although financial woes of late have had an impact. More generally, they stop because they have moved into assisted living or passed away.

Q: What could people do to make your job easier?

A: Get rid of the clutter; it slows us down. But then so does talking to us while we are working. Actually, most people leave while we are there cleaning. And most folks are pretty good about sticking to a schedule (except for Julie Matthews who is hardly ever at home, but we love her anyway).

Q: What strange things have happened along the way?

A: Well, so far we have not encountered a dead body, but we did pop in one day on a nude one. (Again, no names will be revealed. Clean Shine is very aware of privacy issues. No stories are ever exchanged and names are always changed to protect the guilty.)

Once we lost a client (these people don't live here anymore) because the husband accused us of stealing his pain pills. Actually, while we were cleaning and the husband was gone, the wife would flush his pills down the toilet because they were making him mean.

Other clients have had us take away and dispose of their liquor bottles so that neighbors can't count the number of their empties.

Q: So, Mirror, Mirror on the Wall, who is the cleanest Villager of all?

A: Definitely Jon and Nanette Duquesne at #269.

Q: So what is it like to work 24/7 with your mate?

A: Before we started CleanShine Mark worked nights and Sandy worked days, so we never really saw each other. This was very tough on the rela-

tionship. We are just fine being together now. We're happy ever after.

So how did this happy couple get together in the first place? They actually met right here in the



Village in 1984 when it was still owned by Welk and before it became a condominium community. Mark was the gate security officer for Welk and Sandy worked for Village Den-

tal Center and drove Welk trams at night.

Mark detained Sandy and her son at the security gate one night and asked Sandy's son to be introduced to his "sister". That great line worked and lead to a marriage on June 21, 1986 (many birthdays and important family dates all occur on the 21st).

The reception was right at the old Village Hall. Eleanor and Ken Stackhouse encouraged the young couple to invite Village residents to their wedding, resulting in over one hundred Village guests who donated to a money tree. The tree contained \$3,000 that paid for a honeymoon in Mazatlan. Sandy and Mark could not move into the Village for a few years until they turned 55.

Here are a few really interesting tidbits about the couple:

Both are native Californians. Sandy is from Long Beach and Mark is from Whittier. Sandy has two sons from her first husband. They all remained such good friends that all five of them did many vacations and family gatherings together over the years. Sandy gave one of her kidneys to her brother in 1991 at UCSD.

Mark is a classical guitarist who has performed at the Village as well as the Escondido Center for the Arts. His cousin is Eric Henderson, one of three musicians who studied personally under Segovia.

Sandy played second base, third base, and shortstop in women's softball until she was 38 when she was "cleated" and broke her cheek bone. She was also a Little League coach.

Mark was in charge of the Men's Breakfast for almost a decade in CV. He misses the camaraderie of the men and will not reveal the exciting mishaps that occurred on the job. He was also a past President of the Lion's Club and is now on the Disaster Committee.

Their living-miracle grandson Mikey turns three this summer. Before he was a year old, he had three open heart surgeries and now he runs around as a perfect, normal toddler.

Sandy and Mark marked their 25th wedding anniversary this past year, but are still waiting to celebrate when their #21 lottery ticket finally wins.






