### BOARD MEETING NOTES

#### Regular Meeting

- April 2, 2014 was set as the date for Candidate's Night. See article on page 2.
- The Board confirmed a Reserve Expenditure in the amount of \$1,139.63 for repair and maintenance to the light fixtures in the RV Area.
- Request to remove the two remaining Oaks near the laundry that have been in the same environment as the one removed last month was approved and will be funded through the operating budget.
- By unanimous vote the Board approved the purchase of 100 water meters in the amount of \$7,000.00. The meters will be charged to Water Sewer Reserve #28100.

- The Board voted to initially purchase two sets, with a possible third set, of French doors for the Village Hall lobby. The cost not to exceed \$1,500.00 for materials. Labor will be performed by staff. The purpose of the doors is to mitigate sound between the main hall and the administration office. The doors will remain open when there are no activities scheduled.
- The purchase of a replacement electric jack hammer in the amount of \$1,067.01 was approved by unanimous vote.
- In Executive session the Board approved an underage caregiver request pursuant to Civil Code Section 799.9, conducted a resident hearing and dealt with employee salary issues.



## HEALTH INSURANCE NEWS

What do I do if my health plan does not cover a drug I think I need? Or what do I do when I change plans and the drug I have been taking is not in the new formulary (drug list)? The answer is that you have the right to appeal and ask for an exception.

A few years ago I had a common issue with acid reflux but the first three medications tried did not work for me. I actually had an allergic reaction to them. Finally we found a prescription that worked, but cost \$300 a month! It was not in my insurance's list of covered drugs. So we asked for an exception. My doctor's office made the request and my insurance company covered my drug. Problem solved.

You have the right to do all of the following: Talk to your prescriber-your doctor or other health care provider who's legally allowed to write prescriptions. Ask whether the plan has special coverage rules. You can also ask your prescriber if there are generic, over-the-counter or less expensive brand name drugs that would work just as well as what you are presently taking.

Get a written explanation (called a coverage determination) from your Medicare drug plan. A coverage determination is the first decision made by your Medicare drug plan (not the Pharmacy) about your benefits. They can tell you if you have met the requirements to make an exception.

Ask for an exception if you or your prescriber believes you need a drug that isn't on your plan's formulary.

Ask for an exception if you or your prescriber believes that a coverage rule (like prior authorization) should be waived.

Ask for an exception if you think you should pay less for a higher tier (more expensive) drug because you or your prescriber believes you can't take any of the lower tier (less expensive) drugs for the same condition.

You or your prescriber must contact your plan to ask for a coverage determination or an exception. If your network pharmacy can't fill a prescription, the pharmacist will show you a notice that explains how to contact your Medicare drug plan so you can make your request. If the pharmacist doesn't show you this notice, ask to see it.

You or your prescriber may make a standard request by phone or in writing if you're asking for prescription drug benefits you haven't gotten yet. If you are asking to get reimbursed, you will need to make the request in writing and sometimes fill out the company form. Once your plan has gotten your standard request, it has 72 hours to notify you of its decision.

You or you prescriber can request an expedited request if your health is seriously jeopardized or life threatened by the delay. The expedited request has a 24 hour response time to give you their decision.



InnerDancers have put on several productions such as "Peter Pan," "The Nutcracker" and "Snow White". They are currently working on a production of "Cinderella" to be presented at the California Center for the Performing Arts. The club presented a \$200 donation to Tom to help continue their good work. Tom and Caroline moved to the Village late last year from Phoenix, where they had started working their magic with special needs children.

The next Lions meeting will be Wednesday, April 16 at 5:30 pm with the Board meeting at 4:30. The program will be Randy Stein, who will speak on the Lions Sight and Hearing Foundation, which funds eye operations as well as other great Lion charity works.
