BOARD MEETING NOTES

1. Monday April 27, 2015 was set as Candidate's Night for the 2015 Board of Directors Election.
2. The Review of the 2014 Financial Statements by CPA Michael J. Ferrara was unanimously approved by the Board.
3. The Board voted to extend the deadline for return of the Solar Power Purchase Agreement ballot to April 14, 2015.
4. In Executive Session the Board approved an amendment to the Management Agreement which will reduce Management fees by more than \$5,000 annually.

If you see the same infraction of the rules after they've been sent the friendly reminder notice, the next step is to send the Office *another* email stating that you notice the abuse is still happening. The Office will then send a "Notice of Violation".

Nobody wants to be a tattletale, but *somebody* has to make the Management aware or these infractions will continue.

If you get a One Call message and you didn't understand it, below are steps to listen to the message again:

1. If you answer the phone, after the message is done, hit the # key on your phone and it will repeat the message.
2. Under any other circumstances, you can hear the message by calling their toll-free number: 877-698-3261 from the phone the message was sent to.
3. At the "To hear your group's latest message, press 1" prompt, you press 1.
4. At the prompt: To listen to the most recent message press 1. To listen to an older message press 2." Press either "1" or "2".

Their presence can cause clogs and equipment failure directly and indirectly costing you money. Disposable wipes can accumulate to block pipes leading to wastewater overflows into your yard, streets and the environment. Do not flush disposable wipes down any toilet. Discard them in a trash can, please.

HEALTH INSURANCE NEWS

Spring has sprung and so has the deadline for the Affordable Care Act! Covered California extended the deadline for this year to April 30 (it was February 15). The reason for this extension is for people who did not understand that they would receive a penalty on their taxes because they have no health insurance. So those who weren't paying attention during the debates, newscasts and advertisements have finally noticed when they go to their CPA or H&R Block that the lack of health insurance is going to cost them. Money talks. There is still time if you know someone who has not signed up for 2015.

For those of us in the Medicare age group it pays to pay attention to what the Center of Medicare Services (CMS) is saying. In 2014 it was Congress (bipartisan) insistence that the CMS drop its proposal to overhaul Part D in a way that would put preferred pharmacy plans and other benefits at risk.

As of December 2014, 15.4 million beneficiaries enrolled in preferred pharmacy plans. Enrollment information indicates that these networks are lowering costs and offering seniors convenient access to their medicines. Preferred pharmacies are networks that are tied to your insurance plan like Walmart, Costco, CVS, Walgreens, etc.

An actuarial study found that eliminating preferred pharmacy networks in Part D would increase premiums by approximately \$63 annually for over 75% of Part D enrollees and could raise program costs nearly \$24 billion over the next 10 years.

At present the networks country wide include nearly all drugstores. Clients have access to more pharmacy locations than all the McDonalds, Burger Kings, Pizza Huts, Wendy's, Taco Bells, Kentucky Fried Chickens, Domino's Pizzas and Dunkin' Donuts combined! That is huge coverage!

Keep an eye on changes and the CMS regarding Medicare plans. It could seriously affect your budget.

WHERE'S MY START PAGE?

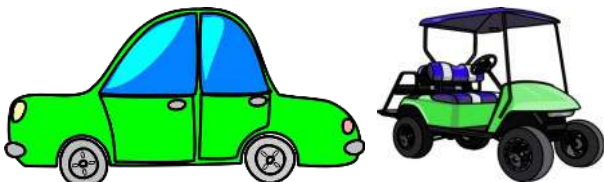
