Office Notes

The Office has a new phone system. For Karin, press 1 followed by the # sign. For Tom, press 2 followed by the # sign. If you're calling after business hours, our answering service will answer your call. To leave a message for the Office, press 1. If it

is a maintenance emergency, press 0 or stay on the line and someone will help you. Our on-call person will contact you or respond to the emergency. Any **life-threatening** emergency, call: **911**.

Remember May 28th: California Corporations Code and our Bylaws, which govern our Annual Meeting and Election, requires that 40% of members (183 spaces) be present at the meeting or submit a proxy.

Ballots can be cast in person on Election Day, or at the Office (**along with a proxy**) prior to 4:00 PM on May 27, 2003. Those members electing not to vote for any candidate should submit their proxies marked "for Quorum purposes only".

The Point is: A minimum of 183 members must be present at the annual meeting, either in person or by submitting a proxy. Any number less than 183 would result in **NO** Annual Meeting, and **NO** valid Election. As a result, the Association would have to bear the costs and the time to structure another Annual Meeting and Election.

Board Minutes and financial statements are available in the small card room for your reading. SAC financials are posted quarterly and may be viewed at this same location.

Getting To Know...

George "Scotty" Henderson

"Scotty" Henderson was born in Venice, not Italy but California, in 1926, but moved to Culver City when he was ten. He attended Venice High School where he was active in athletics, especially the high and low hurdles.

While attending Venice High School he became interested in a pretty student at nearby Santa Monica High School. This "interest" almost got him kicked out of his school.

After high school, Scotty joined the Navy and was assigned to an A.P.A. (amphibious personnel attack) ship. He spent two years in the South Pacific. While he was in the Navy, he married the pretty Santa Monica student named Mary Jean.

After the Navy, Scotty went to work at M.G.M. studios, where his dad worked. But the studio went on strike and left him without a job, so he worked in construction for a time. A strange turn of events led him to tag along with a buddy to take the test for the LA Police Department. He passed, but his buddy

didn't. While beginning work for the LAPD, he and his brother Tommy played semi-pro football. The PD frowned on his playing, so it was discontinued. He did motorcycle duty, and was sent to Italy for a month to test some. While there, he was able to visit with his Navy son, who was stationed on Cyprus. After 22 years, he was forced to retire as a result of a terrible accident. He was hit head-on by a car!

After some recuperation, he went to work for a Ford dealership, managing their car rental department. This was followed by going into partnership with another fellow, building a warehouse and doing some trucking for two years.

But Scotty missed law enforcement and was happy, when the opportunity came, to be back in it. He was hired by the California Department of Justice to be the bodyguard for Evelle Younger, the current Attorney general for the State. When George Deukmejian followed Younger, he became his bodyguard. While Deukmejian was governor, Scotty managed his LA office for two years. At this time, he was appointed to the State Parole Board, where he remained until nine years later, when he retired for the second time.

Meanwhile, the Henderson family increased to two boys and two girls. Now the family includes eight grandchildren and three great grandchildren. The oldest son, who recently retired, became a policeman while his dad was still on the force.

Scotty and Mary Jean moved here from Fallbrook, as a result of helping her brother, Wes Hicks, find a place to live. Wes bought one day, and they bought the next. Then later, when he saw their present home Scotty's brother Tommy, bought their first home. So now all three live in the Village. It has become a real family affair.

Scotty is the only member of his family who wasn't born in Scotland. So why did he get the nickname "Scotty"?
