

BOARD MEETING NOTES

1. The Board confirmed a reserve expenditure in the amount of \$1,585 for asphalt replacement due to a collapsed sewer line. This cost will be charged to Paving Reserves, account #26150.
2. By unanimous vote the Board voted to approve the Draft 2013 Financial Review prepared by CPA Michael J. Ferrara.
3. May 20, 2014 at 4 pm was set as the deadline for ballots to be cast and received by the Inspector of Elections.
4. The Board approved a request by

Developers Resource Companies, Inc. for an easement in favor of VCMWD to connect a 4" sewer line to the Valley Center Water District's main trunk line near the RV Lot.

The Board met in Executive session and appointed Bob Bolt to complete Ken Hazzard's term as director. Ken and his wife Sharon are moving from Champagne Village and we all wish them well. Bob has served on the Board in the past and will serve until May of 2015.

Happy Anniversary to Mario Ruiz!

Happy Anniversary to Mario Ruiz! This month marks the date 25 years ago when Mario joined the staff of Champagne Village. He is our longest serving employee and has served us loyally and nobly. He has also saved us a lot of money over the years.

Talk about dedication! Mario has an adult daughter and a teenaged son. He lives with them adjacent to the border and does a 100 mile round trip every day to work here. And he's been making that commute for a quarter of a century.

Actually before he bought himself his first car (a little Ford Pinto), he took three different buses (2½ hours each way) just to get here. He was 19 years old and had just graduated from high school. He was working in an apartment complex and saw a an ad in the paper...and took all those buses here to apply. Lucky us!

For his first five years (back in the early 90's) Mario worked mostly as a janitor, porter and general go-fer. At that time there were 3 workers in the Village who were performing basic menial, uncomplicated tasks.

Then Tom Riggs signed on as the new CV Manager and recognized how underutilized Mario was. He also witnessed Mario's desire to save the Village money by teaching himself new trades. Before Mario, the Village had contracted out most of its functions, paying dearly for all painting, repairs, plumbing and electrical.

With the go ahead from Tom and the encouragement of the CV Board, Mario started plunging into manuals and instruction books. He was able to master important self-taught skills. He also purchased, with the approval of the Board, money saving tools and equipment. Mario started right in to do much of the Village's plumbing and electrical. And just as quickly, the Village started saving a great deal of money by not having to hire expensive outsiders for repairs and maintenance.

One of the most impressive accomplishments is Mario's complete rendering of the Utility Maps created for our substructure. He has detailed each and every high pressure/low pressure on meticulous grids. "Before him", Tom emphasizes, "we were operating like a blind surgeon who had never studied anatomy. Now we know where every access point is in the entire complex." Lucky us!

Mario also has installed all the street lights, trenched for plumbing and put in conduit around the Village. All those sewer leaks aren't any fun and they used to cost a lot to fix. Mario's experience with the electric snake has saved over \$30,000 annually from the Roto-Rooter bill.

Mario's associate Filiberto Banuelos came onto the scene about 10 years ago and his partnership with Mario has been successful from the start. "Fil is like a sponge absorbing all of Mario's self-gathered expertise," their manager reports. Together the maintenance duo have moved into additional money-saving areas like welding, concrete, lighting and pool maintenance.

A very special savings has been realized in gate repairs. It used to cost an arm and a leg to fix our two gates. But Mario and Fil can do it themselves now, saving us thousands along the way. One of the most impressive accomplishments was the painting of the Village Hall. Estimates for the work came in at \$25,000. Mario and Fil accomplished the work for \$2,500.

But here is perhaps Mario's greatest character trait...his loyalty. The fact of the matter is that he often has been offered jobs with higher wages. But he has always stayed with us. He feels like a part of this community. We are as important to him as his family. He often has saved us more annually than we have paid him...and he sticks by us no matter what. Lucky us!

HEALTH INSURANCE NEWS

During the year there are numerous occasions when clients with **Medicare Supplement plans** can make a change with Guaranteed Issue rights. Guaranteed Issue rights are important because they affect the cost of your insurance premiums. To make a change outside of the (GI) guidelines means you are subject to the underwriting process and your level of health impacts your premium.

The most common situations for change that generate a guaranteed issue are as follows:

Every year on your birthday, you are entitled acceptance to equal or lesser value plans for 30 days beginning on your birthday. You must have a Supplement plan to change to another. An example: If you have Plan F (most coverage) you can change to another Plan F (equal) or G, C, or plan N (lesser coverage). You cannot change from Plan C to Plan F (lesser to greater value).

If you lose coverage or a reduction of coverage under a group-sponsored health plan. You may have continued to work or be enrolled on a spouses plan beyond age 65. If you have never applied to Medicare for coverage, you have six months to enroll. If you have part A and never enrolled in part B, you have six months to enroll in a plan from the date your part B is effective.

If an Advantage plan (MA) is cancelled or leaves your area (ie San Diego County or California) then you are entitled to a Guaranteed Issue period beginning on the date you receive the notice of termination of your MA plan and ending 123 days after termination. You can select any Medigap–Supplement plan in the area. Any company you choose.

If you left your supplement plan for the first time and enrolled in a Medicare Advantage Plan (MA), Select, or Pace plan, you have one year to dis-enroll and return to your Medigap (supplement) policy. From the time of termination you have 63 days to re-enroll in your Original Medigap plan. You can only do this once.

If you had Medi-Cal or Medicaid benefits and have lost eligibility for those benefits, you are guaranteed acceptance into a Medicare Supplement plan provided you enroll within six months of losing eligibility.

Another common change event is if you move out of your service area. You have six months to apply for a new plan. You will need a letter from your carrier stating you have moved out of the service area.

In all of these cases you must provide proof of loss of coverage, termination, prior coverage etc. when you apply for your new plan. Hang onto your change/termination documents!

SAFETY REMINDERS:

- Keep your home & car doors locked.
- Be diligent in the neighborhood watch; report unusual things to (858) 565-5200
- Keep your evacuation checklist handy in case of fires and evacuation.
- Do not buzz anyone through the gate that you do not know. Just hang up.
- Do not allow cars to follow you through the gate. Only one car per gate opening.
- Make sure a neighbor or friend in the Village has a key to your home.
- Inform your neighbors, office and gate when you will be gone for several days or more.
