

### BOARD NOTES

Another great turnout for the Board meeting. There were 85 residents present and we appreciate the overwhelming positive support in response to the President's Report.

Following are the items of the Board of Director's meeting:

- Absent from the meeting were CFO Ken Sumner and Director Hil Sybesma.
- Minutes for the March 16 Board of Director's meeting was approved.
- In CFO Ken Sumner's absence, the CFO report was read by the CVPOA Manager Thomas Riggs III. The CFO report was approved.
- A complete reserve study from Trower in the amount of \$1,750.00 was approved.
- \$6,940.00 from the Paving Reserve to George Weir Asphalt to repair 22 locations equaling 1120 sq. ft. of grind and overlay plus 460 sq. ft. of remove and replace was approved.
- A kitchen plan not to exceed \$2,000.00 was approved.
- Confirmation of Reserve expenditure in the amount of \$399.00 for the purchase of a Denon Blu-Ray player was confirmed.
- Recording of a lien on parcel 185-332-12-91 for delinquent assessments was approved.
- A request from Mr. Williams of unit 459 to continue to have an indoor chair on his front porch for the benefit of his wife was approved.
- A quote from George Weir Asphalt to perform rubberized crack filling at \$3,000.00 per day not to exceed 3 days was approved.

There was an Executive Session of the Board on April 14, 2016 to discuss legal matters with the association attorney.

The next scheduled Meeting will be the Annual Meeting of the Members on May 18, 2016 at 11:30 am with the Board of Director's Organizational Meeting to be held immediately following.

## **CVPOA Board President's Response to Accusations and Attacks**

Last year four members of this Village were selected to the Association's Board of Directors. Some of the elected, and others on the Board, personally outlined the following goals and commitments for the membership of our community to:

- Support and improve the operational efficacy of our onsite management team
- Implement cost saving methods
- Develop short-term and long-term common area restoration plans
- Evaluate the reserves to be sure there is enough capital to face realistic present day costs for replacement and emergent situations
- Review and update the CC&R's and Rules and Regulations as necessary to comply with appropriate laws
- Assess the management company's performance and make recommendations
- Build goodwill and foster friendliness within our community
- Be transparent
- Increase the value of our valuable residences in the community

These robust goals and commitments were made knowing full well that there would be controversy and uneasiness with any change. Disagreeing with changes agreeably would certainly be understood. However, I have become patently aware we have a faction in this community that is attempting to intimidate, bully, and slanderously attack the members of this Board.

Two letters circulated to the membership from three members running for the Board are replete with lies and misrepresentations.

- The first letter states that the Board has caused a 20% loss of income to the highly valued Village Manager. How could that false information be circulated to the members of this community? Most certainly, this is a topic for another day. The Board was continually working behind the scenes, in required confidentially, to allow our Village Manager to be employed at another HOA while fulfilling his contractual commitments to the CVPOA and the Prescott/Associa© Corporation. As a result of our concerted negotiations, the Village Manager will be able to continue his employment at Rancho Monserate and all of our present staff will be made whole with the new management company. It is also quite possible their benefits may be improved.
- The second letter, written by the same group of individuals, asserted that the Board violated the CCR's in negotiating a three-year contract with Prescott Management. I reference this group to the CC&R Article 12 Section 12.9 Professional Management. The Prescott contract and all materials, including the CC&R's, have been reviewed by our CVPOA attorney. He has determined that the Board acted appropriately. Therefore, the accusations brought by the aforementioned individuals are totally false.

In all my years of service to others I have never seen such malicious and evil behaviors, not even on the playground when I was a very small child.

So what to do? If you feel members of the Board individually or collectively rightfully fulfilled the previously stated goals and commitments appropriately, then exercise your democratic rights. If we have failed your expectations and you don't agree with truths of this President's report, then exercise your dissatisfaction at the ballot box.

I am very proud of the members of the present Board who have worked tirelessly this year with no remuneration placing "service above self".

The list of SAC sponsored groups or clubs includes CV Chorus, Christmas Caroling, Game card nights, Men's & Women's breakfast, Movie nights, Christmas decorating social.

SAC provides all paper products, coffee, lemonade, desserts, popcorn, game cards and all food items needed for the breakfasts, caroling and the Christmas decorating social. In addition, we cover the costs of the decorations for each event and take care so that they can be used year after year.

For the SAC events which include the monthly dinner dances, SAC provides either a live band or a DJ. The catered dinners include Green Oaks Ranch or a buffet provided by various vendors. 




**WOW! What a bash.**

## HEALTH INSURANCE NEWS

I recently heard from someone who had an accident and was in the hospital with an injury. They were surprised that the hospital wanted \$250 copay every day that they were in! Welcome to copays and co-insurance. Many seniors are so thrilled to get on the rolls of Medicare (and out from under high insurance premiums) that they never really study what their Medicare benefits are or what options they have. Others just simply forget until the day care is needed.

The party questioned if they could buy a supplemental plan to help cover the copays and co-insurance that Medicare doesn't cover. The answer is yes. A senior on original Medicare (parts A & B) can purchase a supplemental plan anytime. However, if you did not enroll during your initial open enrollment period when turning 65 or when you lost your employer plan, then you will not have guaranteed issue-which means the premiums will probably be higher. To purchase later means that you will have underwriting for any pre-existing conditions. You may still get a policy but there will be a waiting period for any existing conditions to be covered (6 months to a year). Your premiums will also be higher than the healthy person rate (quoted for guarantee issue).

Occasionally one will qualify for a special enrollment period. One can take advantage of these events to get into a Medigap plan. It pays to be informed and let your agent know your desire to make a change.

**PET POLICY**

**EXCERPT FROM CV RULES & REGULATIONS**

**PET AGREEMENT**

Prior to bringing a permanent cat or dog into Champagne Village, the resident must obtain permission from the Association, execute a pet agreement, provide proof of vaccinations, current license and tag number, if applicable, and a photograph of the pet. All existing or replacement pets are subject to the same registration requirements.

**TWO PET RULE**

Each unit may have a maximum of two pets in any combination of cats and dogs, in addition to any domesticated birds or aquatic animals kept within an aquarium. The following pets are disapproved for occupancy within the community: Pit Bull, Pit Bull mix, Rottweiler or Rottweiler mix, Doberman Pinscher, Chow, and Wolf-hybrid.

**NO PET AREAS**

Pets are not permitted in any of the common areas including the Village Clubhouse, Recreational areas, Laundry and Multipurpose buildings, Mail Center, Golf Practice Range, Tennis Courts, Pool Area, and the grassy portion of the Picnic Area. Pets may not walk on any portion of the common areas, including streets and sidewalks, not designated as a pet area or any private property other than the pet-owner's property.

**PET-WALK AND PET-PARK AREAS**

The pet-walk area is roughly south from the car wash to the intersection of Ironwood then southeast to the RV area and northeast to the intersection of Ironwood and Sumac. A pet, being walked in the pet-walk area, must be restrained by a substantial leash, not to exceed six feet in length, and must be in the charge of a responsible, competent adult who is able to control the pet.

The fenced pet park is an off-leash area where residents and guest pets are allowed to run free. Users will abide by the posted Rules and Guidelines.

**ANIMAL WASTE**

No person owning or having charge of any pet will permit any feces from the animal to remain in the common areas or on private property. All animal waste must be picked up at the time of occurrence and deposited in one of the pet area trash receptacles or at home. Owners of pets in disregard to this policy are subject to the Rules Enforcement Policy and possible fines.

**UNDISCIPLINED PETS**

Whenever any animal, suspected of being vicious or has allegedly bitten someone, is reported to the Association, Management will report the facts to the San Diego County Department of Animal Control.

**NOISE AND BARKING NUISANCE**

Noise from a dog is considered barking or whining for more than five minutes in any one-hour period: Barking that is excessive or persistent and occurs for an extended period of time or on a repeated basis. When determining if barking is a violation, consideration will be given to the time of day, duration and frequency of barking.


