NOTES FROM THE BOARD

CVPOA had a great Board of Director's meeting with seventy-seven CV Members present. Thanks to Hil Sybesma, Charlie Service and Bob Suttie for very detailed explanations on the proposed well water possibilities.

The Board conducted business to address the following:

- A Reserve expenditure, in an amount not to exceed \$3,050, to purchase and install a second license plate reader camera at the west (front) gate was approved.
- The Policy for Board Member Education was approved.
- The proposed SAC Operating Guidelines with an amendment proposed by Bob Suttie was approved.
- The purchase and installation of an erosion control blanket on the Esquire slope for a cost of \$5,000 failed.
- The revised CVPOA Rules and Regulations were approved.
- The proposed Policies and Procedures for the Communications Committee were approved.
- A proposal to send a Pay or Lien Letter to a CVPOA Unit and to further file a lien if not paid was approved.
- A proposal to drill a pilot well at a cost not to exceed \$50,000 charged to the Landscape Reserve was approved.

The next scheduled Board of Director's meeting is for Thursday, May 24, at **5:00 pm**. In addition to a regular Board meeting ballots will be counted for the election of three Board seats.

The Board looks forward to you attending this upcoming important meeting.

Why "Song of the South" Became Invisible

The Walt Disney Corporation hasn't allowed "Song of the South" out of its vault since 1986. It has been pulled off the shelves worldwide. Some consider this movie very racist. However, the NAACP calls it a work of art. Disney invited NAACP president Walter White to oversee script revisions while the picture was still in production.

Today, the Disney company does not even acknowledge this movie exists. James Baskett who plays Uncle Remus received an Oscar as the

lead in Disney's first live movie. Baskett was 41 when this movie was made. He died of heart failure due to diabetes at 44. Hattie McDaniel, who was the first African-American to win an Oscar for her role in "Gone with the Wind" is also in this movie. When I first saw this as a young child I remember wishing I had an Uncle Remus.

This movie is visually stunning. It was shot at the peak of Technicolor by one of the greatest screen photographers ever, Gregg Toland.

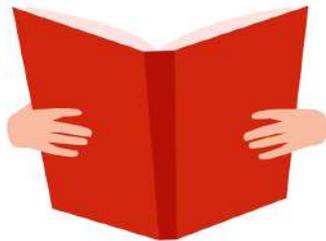

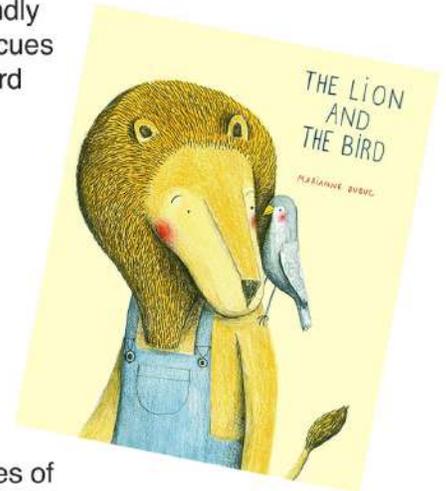

HEALTH INSURANCE NEWS

Very few seniors are aware of a financial resource they have in the use of their life insurance policy. Many older people abandon policies that they have paid into for years thinking that they no longer need the coverage. They are simply thinking that they want to cut down expenses by no longer paying a premium. What they do not know is that their policy may be sold for a percentage of the Death Benefit. To be clear, we are talking about the Death Benefit, not the cash value.

According to my broker resources, seniors allow about \$100 billion worth of policies to lapse or be surrendered annually. Consequently, 88% of life insurance policies sold will never actually pay out a death benefit because the owner will abandon it at some point before they pass away.

Many lose money because they do not know it is their legal right to settle the policy while they are still alive for the present day value and receive a significant percentage of the death benefit as a cash-out payment. Such funds can support long-term care or retirement needs.

At a time when age or poor health prohibits seniors from purchasing long term care or other insurance options, settlements pay more the sicker and older you are! As morbid as that sounds, it increases the value of your policy. Investment groups buy up life policies and become the beneficiaries. The group pays the premium until the original owner passes away.

There are two ways to handle the settlement funds for long-term care or retirement needs. Secondly, a medically underwritten immediate need annuity will provide a guaranteed income stream to help cover retirement and long-term care expenses for life.

Revving up your Metabolism - Part 1

This is called the Thermic Effect of the Food (TEF) or the Thermogenesis, which is the amount of energy expenditure that it takes to process the food for use and storage. This is also the number of calories needed to absorb, digest and process the food. Protein and high fiber foods have a positive effect on TEF. Remember that vegetables are "free foods" when it comes to calories, so eat a lot of them. I find that many people have slow metabolism because they don't eat enough food, thinking that it's controlling their weight, but it is better to eat MORE of the right foods. So eat more vegetables in salads, put them in smoothies and cut them up for snacks.

There are a few specific foods that have a positive effect on our metabolism. The one at the top of the list is hot peppers, if you can tolerate them. High fiber foods on this list are whole oats, lentils, chickpeas, beans, almonds, spinach, broccoli, grapefruit, berries, apples. Also on the high TEF list are lean fish and poultry, green tea, seaweed and spices such as cinnamon. You will notice that all these foods are nutrient dense foods and low fat.

Revvng up your Metabolism

Many are on the list of Super Foods and all are part of my regular diet. If you want to gain weight, follow these guidelines but eat more healthy fats, which provides extra calories and slows metabolism.

In case you are wondering, exercise utilizes 20% of your total energy expenditure and helps increase TEF. As the body works to break down the food you eat for use in the body, your metabolic rate increases, accounting for another 10% of total energy expenditure. So eat your vegetables and get moving. We live where great fresh food is available year round and outdoor movement is wonderful, so enjoy!

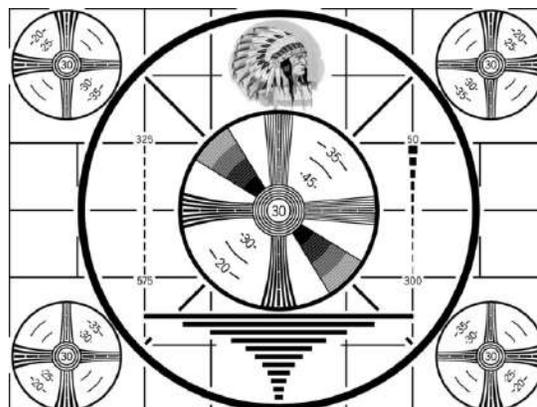
The April meeting was hosted by CV Tennis Club President Diane Hoadley. We dined on a fine pork roast and side dishes.
