Board Meeting Notes

Board Approves Reserve Study

The Board approved the Fiscal Year 2005 Reserve Study, which was prepared by Paul Trower, Reserve Consultant. This study is an integral part of the budgeting process, which will be completed by mid October and will be the basis for calculating the homeowner fees for next year.

On a related matter the Board approved changing the timing of the Annual Employee Performance Appraisals from April to September, which will streamline the budgeting process.

Getting To Know...Bernie Guthrie

Bernie was born and grew up in Erie, Pennsylvania. He left Erie and went to Ohio to attend college, studying to become a pharmacist. After starting his senior year, he enlisted in the army and was placed in A.S.T.P. (Army Specialized Training Program). He was put into the infantry, which was certainly not based on his hospital training and apprentice pharmacy experience. But as Bernie says, "That's the army for you."

Bernie went to Europe after D-Day, landed in France and moved up to the front lines into Germany and the Battle of the Bulge. He was captured on December 23, 1944 and spent six months as a prisoner of war.



He got out of the army in November of '45 and went back to pharmacy school in Cleveland, graduating from Case Western Reserve.

His part time work in drug stores became full time after he went to work for Strong Cobb Manufacturing as an analytical chemist doing research and development. Later he became plant superintendent. When the company built a plant in Hawthorn, California, Bernie was sent to be the general manager. Because of over-expansion the plant closed three years later.

Remaining in California, Bernie had four job offers immediately. He chose a job with Nutrilite in Buena Park, eventually becoming vice-president. At the

same time he became president and CEO of Amcon Industries that was connected to Nutrilite. As Bernie says, "I had two briefcases." Later, Amway took over Nutrilite. When he came to the process of retiring, he did so slowly, working from full time to part time to no time.

One cannot "get to know Bernie" without also getting to know his wife, Lue. Both had previously been widowed. A friend of Lue's who worked for Bernie set them up for a blind date. Bernie says he hadn't been on a date for such a very long time and he didn't know what he should do. Lue says that he couldn't stop talking. He must have talked pretty good because this September will be their 25th anniversary! They were married in the chapel on the top floor of the Crystal Cathedral Tower in Garden Grove.

Bernie and Lue have enjoyed traveling to many parts of the globe. They celebrated Bernie's 60th birthday at the Guthrie Castle in Scotland. They were in Beijing, China at the time of Tiananmen Square.

The Guthries moved to the Village in May 1990. They had become aware of Champagne Village because they owned timeshares at the Villas. Bernie served on the Villas' board for four years.

Bernie says that he came here to play tennis but he also played golf and is a past president of the Men's Golf Club. Lue is also a golfer. Both have been on the SAC committee and Bernie has been a C.V.P.O.A. board member. He is now treasurer for the Tennis Club.

They are very proud of their combined family that is made up of two sons and a daughter, nine grandchildren, three great granddaughters and a great grandson on the way!

Through a chance meeting of a fellow P.O.W. they have become active in the Vista P.O.W. Group that is part of the San Diego Group.
