

COMMUNITY MANAGER'S MESSAGE

With summer approaching I thought it would be a good time to post the CV rules.

Pool

- Please shower before entering the pool.
- Please follow the pool hours as posted at the pool and listed in this publication.
- Children must be accompanied by an adult. Persons under 14 may not use the spa!
- No glass bottles or containers allowed. Place trash in containers.
- Please return your chairs and lounges to their proper location.
- All pool users must be potty trained - **no swim diapers allowed.**
- Please cover the ping pong tables after use.
- For safety, keep the gate closed at all times.
- Report maintenance problems to the Office.
- Resident Joe Garvey has volunteered to periodically monitor the pool during the summer months. Please give him your cooperation.**

General

- Speed limit for all of CV is **15 mph!**
- Golf carts are **not to be operated by children under the age of 16.**
- All golf carts must have space numbers affixed to them. Please check your cart; if you need numbers, please contact the Office.
- All resident vehicles must have a CV sticker placed on the driver side rear side window. These stickers are available in the Office.

Tennis Courts

- Children must be accompanied by a resident on the tennis courts.
- No black soled shoes allowed. No skates or roller blades.

Picnic Area

- Clean up after your picnic.
- Secure the trash can tops.
- Place hot coals in the ash can; do not put hot coals in trash.
- Do not leave plastic trash bags in area.
- Remove trash to the dumpster outside the Village Hall (get key from the Office).

Garages

- This applies to those lucky people with garages. The main purpose of garages is for the parking of vehicles, not storage. If you have a two car garage and two cars, both cars must be parked in the garage. Storage of items cannot preclude you from parking in the garage for any reason.
- Garage doors should only be open when you are entering or exiting the garage in your vehicle.

WE LOVE TO GO A-TRAVELING

What are the most prevalent topics of conversation among Village residents? Perhaps the weather? Maybe illness and other medical and issues? Or could it be the latest “gossip”? Certainly high on that list would be travel and trips. People just love to talk about where they’ve been or where they’re going.

It is surprising then (especially considering the vast array of activities in CV) that there is no longer a travel club here. There have been very active ones in the past. A few long-term owners met recently to reminisce about them. Doris Wright, Tom McCue, Angelo Scalise and Jeanne Hunt have many happy memories of the many trips, tours and outings that have been a part of Champagne Village travel clubs.

In fact, as many as six different travel clubs have existed over the course of the last 40 years. The original groups run by the Wrights and Darnells started the history of tour groups. But the golden days during the late 70s and 80s were run by Lloyd Leslie. He took Villagers far and wide. The travelers always started right by the CV Laundry Room and always ended up right back there. It was a convenient system in the old days.

Lloyd’s travelers signed up for cruises to Hawaii, quarterly visits to the Golden Nugget in downtown Las Vegas, paddleboat river cruises down the Mississippi River, jaunts over to Catalina, and drives up to Hearst Castle and Solvang just to name a few. On one particular river cruise the boat got lost in the fog and ended up being tied to a tree in Hannibal, Missouri (shades of Huck Finn). Lloyd also coordinated a lot of local outings like evening cruises around Newport, evening concerts on San Diego Harbor, and trips to the Palm Springs Follies, as well as days up to Santa Anita and the Rose Bowl.

Jeanne Hunt fondly recalls one particular trip to Laughlin when she put a quarter in the slots and got back \$500, and then turned around and did the same exact thing again. On a sadder note, Lloyd actually passed away on another Village trip to Laughlin of a sudden heart attack. His wife had coincidentally died earlier on one of their organized trips to Las Vegas. The Village travel clubs were taken over in the next period of years by Gladys Wilkinson and later by Edith Hale.

Gladys was especially known for her cruises to Hawaii and Alaska and bus trips up to San Francisco and Reno. She also managed arrangements for yearly trips to the Del Mar Race Track, lots of plays in San Diego at the Civic Theater, and many Balboa Park concerts. Once in a while the groups went up to Los Angeles to take in the Hollywood Bowl, the Huntington and Reagan Libraries and the Los Angeles County Museum of Art.

Angelo reported that the Village always had bus loads of at least 48 people, sometimes with standing room only. “Everyone was always ready to go!” he remembers. “In fact I can’t remember a trip ever being cancelled. We always had enough people to make the trip a go.”

Doris Wright recalled a particular jaunt down to a new Mexican resort to preview a weekend golf outing for the group. They were promised free golf and free food for the weekend as an enticement to sign up, but the resort promoters failed to inform them that no plumbing had been hooked up yet!

Edith Hale continued with all these popular trips and added a few new ones of her own. Her gang visited the Pebble Beach area, Scottsdale, Arizona and Ensenada, Mexico. Her most memorable trip was when the group attended the opening of the Branson, Missouri Welk Hotel and Theater. The travelers flew into Springfield and then bused down to Branson as very special VIP guests of the Welk’s Resort.

Tom McCue has high praise for all of the travel leaders over the years. He called them kind and caring and said, “They just couldn’t do enough for you”. And, the group agreed, the prices were always quite

reasonable. The travel directors always provided soft drinks and snacks on the bus, but you had to bring your own bottle for a cocktail. There were also lots of games on board... even bingo. The group gambled on everything: how many freight cars on the train, where the wheel lug would be upon arrival, even the number of birds on the wire!

“Everything was so convenient and so safe,” Doris reported, “Even the single women always had a buddy to watch out for them.” And in all the years and all the trips, the group remembered only one flat tire.

The group later turned to the question of why there is no travel club in the Village nowadays. Resident realtor Joe Klopp did try very hard to keep the tradition going, but a general lack of interest spelled the end of his effort. “There are just too many people still working these days. Life is very different than it was for our retirement generation,” the four long-time Villagers agreed. “But,” Doris smiled, “we still have the Padre Tours to fall back on now. Both Doris and past Board president Charlie Service round up residents to partake of the many tours and trips as part of the Padre Tours sponsored by the Church of the Resurrection in Escondido. This past year, dozens of Villagers have headed on Father Ken’s buses to the Little Italy Festival, the Julian Apple Festival, the Del Mar Race Track and several Christmas light shows.

There are schedules of this year’s events available in the Copy Room.

If anyone out there has read all of this and would be interested in starting up a new travel club, the rewards are many and there would be appreciation galore! And the Padre buses are available!

Safety Check List Reminder

Please remember these safety recommendations.

- Keep your homes, cars, sheds and garages LOCKED. Do not leave valuables visible in locked cars.
- Have one or two motion detecting security lights on your property.
- Inform your neighbors, Office and volunteer security police when you will be gone for several days or more.
- Stop your newspaper or have neighbors pick it up and take papers out of your home mailbox.
- Post a neighborhood watch sign in your window and join others on reporting suspicious activities to the Office or call the police.
- Do not buzz anyone through the gate that you do not know. HANG UP.
- Do not allow cars to follow you through the gate; only one car per gate opening. Slow down and the next car will have to stop.
- Report door to door soliciting to the Office.
- Do not let strangers into your home.
- We all need to SLOW DOWN when we drive through the Village and we all need to STOP at stop signs. Please watch out for others by the mailbox area.
- If you get too HOT this summer, make sure you drink plenty of water. If necessary, you may go to the Village Hall and sit in the air conditioned rooms there.
- We all want to stay safe and help each other out, but it really "takes a VILLAGE" to do so.

Please abide by the rules and regulations, which are posted, and lock the gate when you leave. Also, please be sure your pet is registered with the Office and review the map of the areas where pets can be walked on leashes in Champagne Village.

REMINDERS WHEN WALKING IN PET AREAS:

Watch for snakes. At this time of year we need to be aware that our beautiful rural environment is also home to wildlife like coyotes, bobcats, rattlesnakes and "friendly" gopher snakes. Fish and Game suggests that you carry an air horn or pepper spray when walking at dusk or dawn.

Watch for cars. Please walk on the sidewalk along Live Oak Lane and close to the sides of Ironwood View in the Pet Park area to avoid a run in with a vehicle.

PLASTIC BAG DONATIONS! Thank you to CV residents who continue to donate their newspaper and produce bags for our use in the Pet Park. Your response is appreciated and a "green" thing to do.

REMINDER: PLEASE BE A RESPONSIBLE OWNER AND ALWAYS PICK UP YOUR PET'S WASTE AND DEPOSIT IT AT HOME OR IN WASTE CONTAINERS BY THE PET PARK OR RV AREA TRAIL, BUT NOT IN THE PICNIC AREA OR BAG STORAGE CONTAINERS!


