OFFICE NOTES

Director Jean Slaughter of DSFPD Invites Input

The Deer Springs Fire Protection District (DSFPD) is inviting community members to provide input on a "Community Wildfire Protection Plan," which is a document that evaluates the local wildfire threat and recommends strategies to mitigate that threat. The DSFPD and the Deer Springs Fire Safe Council are collaborating on this document and are seeking input from public agencies and community members to formulate the plan. As part of the process of drafting this plan, the DSFPD's Master Plan will conduct five community outreach meetings where details on the CWPP will be provided and members of the public can offer their ideas and receive information.

The **CHAMPAGNE VILLAGE** meeting will be held at **6 pm on June 18 in the Village Hall**. Deer Springs Fire Chief Chris Amestoy will make the presentation.

The ballots regarding propane use are due in the CVPOA dropbox by Tuesday, June 16 at 4 pm. No ballots will be accepted after that time.

GARAGES

- This applies to those lucky people with garages. The main purpose of garages is for the parking of vehicles, not storage. If you have a two car garage and two cars, both cars must be parked in the garage. Storage of items cannot preclude you from parking in the garage for any reason.
- Garage doors should only be open when you are entering or exiting the garage in your vehicle.

The Village Hall, Card Room, Library, Picnic Area and Multi-Purpose Room (also known as The Gathering Place) are available for all CV group meetings and events. Karin in the Office is the **only** person who keeps the master calendar and she is the one you must contact to confirm availability. Once you know which day/time is available, then you **must** complete a **Calendar Reservation form** (kept on the wall outside her office) and turn it in to her. Without that form, there is no proof that you reserved the room.

Researchers for the Massachusetts Turnpike Authority found over 200 dead crows near greater Boston in a relatively short period last fall, and there was concern they may have died from Avian Flu. A Bird Pathologist examined the remains of all the crows, and to everyone's relief, confirmed the problem was definitely NOT Avian Flu. The cause of death appeared to be vehicular impacts. However, during the detailed analysis it was noted that varying colors of paints appeared on the bird's beaks and claws. MTA then hired an Ornithological Behaviorist to determine if there was a cause for the disproportionate percentages of truck kills versus car kills. He very quickly concluded the cause: When crows eat road kill, they always have a look-out crow in a nearby tree to warn of impending danger. And while all the lookout crows could shout "Cah," not a single one could shout "Truck."

Police are called to an apartment and find a woman holding a bloody 3-iron standing over a lifeless man. The detective asks, "Ma'am, is that your husband?" "Yes" says the woman. "Did you hit him with that golf club?" "Yes, yes, I did." The woman begins to sob, drops the club and puts her hands on her face. "How many times did you hit him?" "I don't know -- put me down for a five."

WHAT THE DAVIS-STIRLING ACT SAYS ABOUT COUNTING BALLOTS

"All votes shall be counted and tabulated by the inspector or inspectors of election or his or her designee in public at a properly noticed open meeting of the board of directors or members. Any candidate or other member of the association may witness the counting and tabulation of the votes. No person, including a member of the association or an employee of the management company, shall open or otherwise review any ballot prior to the time and place at which the ballots are counted and tabulated. The inspector of election, or his or her designee, may verify the member's information and signature on the outer envelope prior to the meeting at which ballots are tabulated. Once a secret ballot is received by the inspector of elections, it shall be irrevocable [New: Civ. Code §5120(a)]"

The CV Board (that includes seven CV residents) interprets the above ruling to mean that as long as we count the votes during a meeting in a room adjacent to the meeting room, with an open door policy where any resident can view the process, we are in full compliance. We are also in compliance when the Inspector of Elections opens the outside envelope the morning of the election. The *ballots* in the inside envelope are *never* opened until the Board meeting starts and the Board President allows the Inspector of Elections to start the counting.

USE OF THE LAUNDRY ROOM

Recently, there have been numerous complaints about the Laundry Room. Issues have ranged from moldy machines to snagged clothing and washers that do not drain, leaving clothes wet with standing water in the unit. There have also been comments about the general upkeep of the machines and the facility.

One of the reported problems was due to the laundering of a rubber-backed throw rug. The weight of the rug kept the washer cycling and pieces of rubber-backing tore apart, clogging the unit. The result was a burned out pump that had to be replaced. Although our Speed Queen machines are generally reliable, the units are not built for laundering heavy throw rugs (especially those with rubber backing), pet beds, bedspreads, shoes or other bulky items.

Additionally, the large dryer has accumulated rubber 'chips' from rugs and tennis shoes that have been dried in the unit. To remove the rubber from the inside of the dryer, the unit must be dismantled because this type of debris is not caught by the lint filter. Maintenance to do so is costly.

In order to avoid these problems and the associated expense of repair in the future, we are asking all residents who use the laundry to adhere to following:

Do not put in washing machines or dryers: rugs, (especially those with rubber backing), pet beds, or bulky items such as bedspreads or shoes.

If you have soiled work clothes or 'pet towels', please shake them free of dirt and hair **BEFORE** bringing them to the laundry. Remember, the next user washing clothes might be you! Would you want to use a washer littered with dirt specs or animal hair?

Check pockets for coins or other items that can damage the machines or snag clothes if they become lodged behind the perforated drum. Lack of drainage and pump burn out can be caused by items as small as coins or hair pins.

After you finish using a washer, wipe the interior rubber rim and door window clean of any lint or debris left from your washing. Wiping away the remaining water inside the rim will also prevent mold build-up. As you know, front-loaders are prone to mold development. Leave the washer door open and pull out the soap tray. Letting the unit 'air' will keep the machine fresh smelling and free of mold. Finish by wiping the top of the machine and tables so they are clean for the next user.

If you use the sink, wipe up your mess please! Paper towels are available at the end of the counter and can be used for the cleanup. Kindly dispose of the paper towels in the receptacle.

If you use a dryer, please remove the lint from the filter after your load is dry.

We are fortunate to have such a useful and convenient amenity right in the Village! It is important that users take some responsibility in maintaining it - not only to avoid repairs that are preventable, but out of respect for all who use it.

Whether you frequent the Laundry Room regularly or from time to time, please consider whether the 'out of the ordinary' items you intend to wash are better suited for a commercial laundry. Also, even if you are just washing your everyday items, do your part to keep the machines clean and in good working order so the laundry mat is pleasant for all to use. Thank you!

“WHY SHOULD WE ASK QUESTIONS?”

HTTP vs. HTTPS

The main difference between [http://](#) and [https://](#) is it's all about keeping you secure. HTTP stands for Hyper Text Transfer Protocol. The S (big surprise) stands for "Secure." If you visit a website or web page, and look at the address in the web browser, it will likely begin with the following: [http://](#). This means that the website is talking to your browser using the regular "unsecured" language. In other words, it is possible for someone to "eavesdrop" on your computer's conversation with the website. If you fill out a form on the website, someone might see the information you send to that site. This is why you never ever enter your credit card number in an http website! But if the web address begins with [https://](#), that basically means your computer is talking to the website in a secure code that no one can eavesdrop on. If a website ever asks you to enter your credit card information, you should automatically look to see if the web address begins with [https://](#). If it doesn't, you should NEVER enter sensitive information such as a credit card number, social security number, etc.

HEALTH INSURANCE NEWS

Seniors often do not like change. We are comfortable just the way we are, thank you very much. However, when an opportunity comes to save some money we are more than willing to reconsider!

In the area of Medicare insurance it really does pay to compare your plan as you age. When beneficiaries (that's us) reach their mid-seventies, all supplemental plans have gradually increased in premium. This is a good time to shop around. Supplemental plans can be changed with a guaranteed issue during the open enrollment period and also during the 30 days following one's birthday. If you have had a plan since you were 65 it would be wise to check with your agent.

Another way to save is to change to a different plan. Remember Supplemental (or Medigap) plans pay in addition to regular Medicare. A plan F pays the maximum after Medicare while plan G does not pay the medical deductible of \$147 but you may save more than that in the premium. Plans N or C also can offer savings in lower premium but have less coverage. You can always lower your coverage but not increase it later, so keep that in mind when changing plans.

Not all companies offer all plans in San Diego County or California. Check with your agent for more information. *Remember the service of an insurance agent does not cost you any money.* Premiums are the same. They are paid by the companies they represent.

CUTTING DOWN UNWANTED MAIL AT THE MAILBOX



Father's Day! One of the most enduring gifts we give our fathers is a neck tie. Americans spend more than \$1 billion each year to buy a staggering 100 million ties. What is the origin of this \$1 billion industry?

A few thousand years ago China's first emperor wanted his army to be buried with him as his guardians in the afterlife. Since there was not much future in this for his army his advisers convinced him to have life sized replicas of his troops made instead. When these statues were unearthed in 1974 they were found sporting a wrapped neck cloth, the earliest known predecessor to the modern tie. Flying rapidly through history blurring many details, we land in the early 1630s. Croatian soldiers, in support of the French King Louis XIII, wore colorful, knotted neckerchiefs as a part of their uniform. Soon these ties became a fashion statement in France. As the tie's popularity spread throughout Europe lace became common as well as other designs. Some chose ties so thick they were able to stop a sword thrust.
