RESERVING SPACE FOR YOUR MEETING OR EVENT

The Village Hall, Card Room, Library, Picnic Area and Multi-Purpose Room (also known as The Gathering Place) are available for all CV group meetings and events. Karin in the Office is the **only** person who keeps the master calendar and she is the one you must contact to confirm availability. Once you know which day/time is available, then you **must** complete a **Calendar Reservation form** (kept on the wall outside her office) and turn it in to her. Without that form, there is no proof that you reserved the room. Also, remember to let her know if you need to cancel your reservation if you don't need it after all.

For Private Parties, any resident of Champagne, in good standing, may reserve the common area facilities, except the swimming pool, for a private gathering such as the celebration of the resident's or immediate family's wedding, anniversary, birthday, etc. **Immediate family is defined as spouse, brother, sister, son, daughter-in-law, son-in-law, parents, grandparents and grandchildren.**

GARAGES

- This applies to those lucky people with garages. The main purpose of garages is for the parking of vehicles, not storage. If you have a two car garage and two cars, both cars must be parked in the garage. Storage of items cannot preclude you from parking in the garage for any reason.
- Garage doors should only be open when you are entering or exiting the garage in your vehicle.

Thank you for your cooperation in this matter.


WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE?

Are We an Independent Living or Assisted Living Community?

Actually, Champagne Village is neither: Champagne Village is an active 55+ community. We're perfect for individuals who can live independently and have no need for either regular onsite assistance OR provided access to offsite assistance. And while Champagne Village offers help and support through the Care and Concern committees as well as our Friends Helping Friends service, both are voluntarily provided as a *courtesy*: they are not an *amenity*.

Assisted living is a good option for individuals who have difficulty with daily activities needed for living independently. These communities offer residents regular, daily support in the form of meals, housekeeping, transportation, on-staff medical assistance, etc. This support is part of the amenities offered in these communities.

Independent living is ideal for individuals who can still live independently but enjoy having access to assistance when it's needed. These communities provide residents with regular access to dining, medical care and other services – but they don't have it onsite. This access is also part of the amenities they offer.

I was driving with my three young children one warm summer evening when a woman in the convertible ahead of us stood up and waved. She was stark naked! As I was reeling from the shock, I heard my 5-year-old shout from the back seat, 'Mom, that lady isn't wearing a seat belt!'

HEALTH INSURANCE NEWS

In 2017 San Diego has 645,410 seniors over 60; 191,731 are over 75, and of that number 113,565 live alone. Gender ratios in long term care/assisted living facilities is 75% female. These numbers are growing everyday.

Last month I wrote just a brief article concerning Long Term Care and the need to plan for our dependent years however few they may be. Because the topic is immense and the space limited, I would like to add to that information several senior resources available in San Diego County.

Making an informed decision between different levels of elder care or insurance plans can be overwhelming to seniors and their families. Board and care homes, assisted living facilities, intermediate care and skilled nursing facilities all have a unique service to provide and their costs vary greatly. To help sort out these decisions, California has two agencies available to help find facilities that best suit one's needs. The Health Insurance Counseling and Advocacy Program (HICAP) is a free counseling service provided to answer many questions you may have regarding plans and levels of care. The statewide toll free number is (800) 434-0222.

The second agency is the California Association of Area Agencies on Aging (C4A). This agency's purpose and goal is to help keep elderly citizens or adults with disabilities in their homes and communities, delaying the need for full-time care for as long as possible. Their services provided include: home-based personal care assistance, adult day health care, Alzheimer's day care resource center, meal delivery, legal assistance, respite care registry and transportation. The San Diego Area Agencies on Aging (AAA) number is (858) 495-5885.

ROASTED CORN SALAD

Served at the Cinco de Mayo Party

Dressing

½ cup plain nonfat yogurt (I used Stonyfield brand from Sprouts; can also substitute with Greek yogurt – thin out with milk)
2 Tbsp lime juice – 30 ml
zest of 1 lime
¼ tsp cumin
¼ tsp salt

Salad

4 ears corn (roasted and kernels removed)
285 grams
1 clove garlic, minced
1 can black beans (drained & rinsed)
1 red bell pepper (seeded and chopped)
½ cup chopped red onion - 35 grams
½ cup cotija cheese (crumbled) - 88grams

Mix all dressing ingredients together and set aside.

In large bowl, combine all salad ingredients and toss together.

Add the dressing and toss to coat. Can be made the day before you plan to serve.

Eye Screening

In early May Lion Carol Cox and other members of her Vision Committee completed eye screenings at the Head Start Center where 45 young children were screened. Club screeners worked with The Escondido Host Lions Club and performed two days of screening at Community Lutheran Preschool. There is such a demand for this free service that we are hoping to purchase an additional PlusOptix eye screening machine in the near future.

On June 3 members of our Vision Committee will be at Brightwood College in Vista (formerly Kaplan College) to perform eye screening of both children and adults. This is a multi Lions Club event. Last year the event was a huge success due in part to having a volunteer doctor available to assist with free eye tests and the availability of over 18,000 pairs of graded, cleaned and inventoried glasses all available for free. Observing an adult able to read a newspaper for the first time in years or a young child able to focus and clearly see Mom and Dad for the first time is a tremendous reward for the work we do.

There are plans for several local Lions Clubs, including Champagne Village, to be on hand at the San Diego County Fair on June 24 and 25 to perform free eye screenings for children and adults.
