## June News

The Board of Directors gathered for its monthly meeting on Thursday, May 27th, at the Picnic Area. About 40 members were in attendance.

It was noted by the Board President that Janet LeRossignol, our Inspector of Elections, could not be available for the counting of ballots and, as a result, he and Tom Riggs appointed Barbie Floyd as Inspector. Volunteers, under the direction of the Inspector of Elections, began the task of counting ballots immediately after the Board's roll call.

Concurrently, the Board conducted the business of the meeting, which included voting to approve the installation of a new roof the Pool Area building at a cost of \$13,440.

Greg Lorton, chair of the Emergency Planning Committee, reported that during the committee's May 26th meeting, several items were discussed pertaining to the May 22nd fire – including some recommendations to be made to the Board at its June meeting. Greg also responded to several questions and concerns voiced by residents during Open Meeting.

The results of the ballot count were announced shortly after the conclusion of Open Meeting. The new Board members (with ballot counts) are Tom Bossmeyer (199), Steve Caves (190), Greg Lorton (152) and Donna Perez (135). Ballot counts for the remaining candidates are 132 for Joanne Hansen and 89 for John Fitzmaurice.

Following the count, the new Board met to elect the following officers: Wade Steverson, President; Charolette Steele, Vice President; Tom Bossmeyer, Secretary; and Roger Elyea, CFO. Committee chairs and appointments will be assigned at the Executive Session on Wednesday, June 2nd, with notifications posted on bulletin boards.

The next Board meeting is scheduled for Thursday, June 17th at 6:00pm. Unless otherwise noted, the meeting will take place in the Village Hall.

# FUN, 50/50



## I-15 Fire Sparks on May 22nd

*Annotated from the San Diego Tribune*

Firefighters battled a brush fire that ignited on the west side of Interstate 15, directly across from Champagne Village, scorching about 25 acres and shutting down the southbound lanes of the freeway for several hours on Saturday, May 22nd. The fire, which started around 11:15am, sparked along the side of the freeway and quickly ran up a ridge in a wilderness area. At one point, flames jumped the southbound lanes, creating a spot fire in the center divide.

At the height of the firefight, three helicopters and two fixed-wing airtankers assisted ground crews. Several North County agencies, including the San Marcos Fire Department and North County Fire Protection District, assisted. Cal Fire reported that there was no threat to any structures.



### BE READY FOR A FIRE!

**MAKE SURE YOU KNOW WHEN A FIRE IS COMING AND WHEN TO LEAVE**

**Receive Emergency Alerts.** Be sure to register your cell phone with **AlertSanDiego**. While land line phones are already registered with the reverse 911 system, cell phones are not. The AlertSanDiego system notifies county residents of imminent emergency and evacuation information. Go to [readysandiego.org/alertsandiego](http://readysandiego.org/alertsandiego), then click on **Register Now**.

**Sign Up for the Emergency Communication System.** Complete the mail-in application to sign up for the Deer Springs Fire Safe Council's **Emergency Communication System (ECS)**. By way of one-call phone messages, the ECS provides information about wildfire threats in the vicinity that have the potential to threaten our community. **An application is available in the Hall Lobby.**

**Add the Deer Springs Hotline to your Contact List.** The **Deer Springs Fire Safe Council** maintains a hotline that you can call to hear recorded messages about wildfires in the area. (Note that the hotline is updated only during a wildfire). **The hotline number is (949) 472-1407.**

**Make sure you are on our One-Call System.** If you've opted out of receiving messages for our **Village One Calls**, you will not receive any calls to alert you to an emergency. **Call the Office to be placed back on the list** (you can let them know if you'd prefer not to receive non-emergency One Calls).







## Keep your Dogs OFF the Golf Greens

Dogs are NOT permitted on any of the greens area, either at the Welk resort or along Oak Shadow Drive. These areas are not the property of Champagne Village.

## PLEASE Pick Up After Your Pet

When walking your dog or visiting the Dog Park, take along a bag to pick up waste and dispose of it properly. By taking a few simple steps to clean up after your pet, you contribute not only to the beautification of our Village, but also toward the elimination of one of the most irritating nuisances in our community.

## PLEASE!! Leash your Dog!

**Champagne Village's NextDoor page has seen numerous posts over the past month of dogs being attacked by coyotes and – in some cases – taken away and not seen again.** Coyotes are highly active in the Village right now, so PLEASE keep your dog leashed, day or night, even if they're in your own yard (coyotes can jump fences as high as six feet).

Our rules and regulations require that you leash your dog at all times when on common area (which, by the way, is any sidewalk, street or property that does not belong to a resident). You could incur fines and – worse – lose your beloved dog. Be safe – and keep your pets safe too!



## Sign Up to Receive a FREE KnoxBox

When San Diego County Fire is called upon to help during emergencies, their mission is clear: reach those in need, as quickly and safely as possible. But locked doors often prevent this from happening.



SD county's Residential KnoxBox Program gives you a backup plan during a crisis by letting first responders reach you if you're unable to get to the door.

**CV residents can receive a FREE KnoxBox (installation included) if you are 62 or older.**

Inside, a spare house key can be stored for access by County Fire during emergencies. County Fire will install the box. To apply, fill out an application online at the following address:

Nomadland, the Best Picture of 2020, is about a woman who chooses to live on the road, hopscotching across the country while working odd jobs and discovering a welcoming community of others like herself. Surprise, surprise, we have a couple in CV who's lived this story!

They spent 12 of their 40 married years working a mobile vendor's booth at state fairs across California, Texas and as far east as Minnesota – and they have lots of interesting stories to tell!

They began the nomadic life in 1998 after years planted in San Diego running a printing business. Dissatisfied and wanting to travel, they sold both their business and their home and started a moveable printing business. They began in California fairs and were encouraged by vendor friends to expand to other states. While each fair ran for 10-12 days, they'd park their RV there; between fairs, they'd stay at various RV parks across the country and tour the area. When they would return home to SD, they'd park at their son's home Alpine.

While the couple learned the business as they went, they got advice from their 'road family' and other vendors. They would see the same vendors as they moved around and made many good friends. Many of their customers would also return every year. People helped one another, especially if someone was hurt or sick.







## FAQs about the National DO NOT CALL List

You've probably already learned that shouting "Don't call this number!" and hanging up doesn't do much to stop unwanted calls. What could help is registering for the National Do Not Call List that the Federal Trade Commission created 16 years ago. Well over 200 million phone numbers are registered. But how does it work – and for which types of calls?

**The DNC List only prohibits SALES calls.** This means that you may continue to receive political calls, charitable calls, informational calls and survey calls. And you may still get sales calls from companies with whom you've recently done business. To stop these calls, you'll have to ask the company not to call you again—preferably in writing.

**Not all companies are operating legally.** Most legitimate companies will observe the DNC List. But since 2009, the FTC has seen a significant increase in the volume of illegal sales calls from companies that flat-out ignore the DNC List. This includes robocalling, which is permitted only by political candidates and charities.

**What to do if you still get unwanted calls.** Hang up immediately. In addition to the call being illegal, it's likely a scam. Don't speak. Don't press buttons. Don't follow any directions, and don't give them permission to remove you from their list (it won't work). If you receive the call on your mobile phone, consider blocking the number.

**How to register.** The easiest way to register for the National Do Not Call List is to call (888) 382-1222 from the phone you want to register. You can also register by visiting [donotcall.gov](http://donotcall.gov). If you register online, you'll receive an email containing a link you'll need to click on within 72 hours, or your registration will not be completed. You can also register up to three phone numbers at a time.

**The FTC your needs email address.** But it's collected only to confirm your registration. They do not keep, store it with your phone number, or sell it to a third party.

**Expect a Delay.** The FTC says that although your registration will be completed on the spot, the info can take up to 31 days to reach companies and for companies to stop calling.

## Why we Need Green Food!

Only a dad, but the best of men.



## Health Insurance News

Springtime brings sun shiny days and wide smiles. And every smile is enhanced by healthy teeth. Every year I try to include one article about dental care. This month I am repeating some information I've shared before because its relevance has not changed.

Recently a dental insurer did a study of employer groups to see how well beneficiaries were utilizing their dental benefits. They found that one in four adults failed to have an annual checkup, much less two in a year. Millennials are among the least likely to visit a dentist even though most of them have some level of dental coverage. Baby boomers grew up during an era when we were having a national epidemic of tooth decay and tend to seek more dental care.

Boomers have had more experience with tooth decay and lost teeth. More importantly periodontal (gum) disease is now believed to be correlated with certain systemic diseases such as diabetes and heart disease among others. Inflammation is not good for overall health on any level.

The Wall Street Journal reported a study by a hospital group on the East coast that had patients brush their teeth twice a day. This practice reduced their incidence of pneumonia by 92%. When you get sick, do not neglect to brush your teeth no matter how badly you feel!

The best defense for dental health and health in general is good hygiene and preventive care, which means regular checkups and daily brushing and flossing.

If you do not have dental coverage, it's worth the cost. Advantage plans have optional packages for as low as \$12 to \$40 a month. These packages can be purchased at the time of enrollment or during open enrollment. Other standalone dental plans can be purchased any time of the year. HMO and PPO plans can be purchased starting at \$25 up to \$100 a month depending on the coverage (the average is \$50 for a comprehensive PPO). All plans cover one or more annual preventive cleaning and x-rays. Some new plans now cover implants-after a waiting period.

Neglecting your teeth can shorten your life or seriously reduce your quality of health. Make certain you have and use your dental policy annually.
