



Board Meeting Notes

Board Approves Use of Village Hall

The Board unanimously approved the use of the Village Hall by a group called the Weekenders. This approval was in full compliance with the Rules and Regulations as previously adopted by the Board of Directors.

Board Denies Request to Overrule A&L Committee

The Board unanimously denied a request by an owner to overrule a decision previously made by the A&L Committee in regard to paint colors on a Gazebo. Prior to their vote the Board heard comments from both the owner and members present as well as comments from the A&L Committee. The Board directed the Committee to continue to work with the owner to reach a compromise in this matter.

VOICE OF THE TIMES

REPAVED

The story needs telling. CV's *biggest, boldest* project ever. The Times needs to provide information, to render historical account, and to thank those who helped make this huge undertaking a winner. We'll be brief.

The rationale

Preliminary studies indicated that repaving the entire Village at once -- as compared to repaving in annual segments of say 10% -- was both feasible and preferable, resulting in

- ? a one-time expenditure of \$500,000
- ? a cash saving of some \$100,000
- and
- ? elimination of significant annual disruptions of resident traffic patterns
- but
- ? reduction of cash reserves for capital asset replacements from \$500,000 to some \$100,000. (It is planned to restore these reserves over four years, and to increase them to the 100% range during the following three years.)

The Board made the bold, informed decision to proceed, and the planning process began in earnest.

The magnitude

First, selection of a contractor competent to convert some *8,000 tons* of asphalt into *800,000 square feet* of pavement, covering *8 miles* of roads and parking. One which could commit to complete the project within say 2 weeks. The George Weir Asphalt Company was commissioned.

The implementation

On Day 1, the initial impact on us residents of this tiny village was almost scary ... seemingly, all the motor vehicles from Detroit had invaded us, manned by a cast size rivaling Ben Hur. There was a daunting challenge to merge minimal interruption of residents' basic access needs with contractor's obligation to perform within tight time and cost constraints.

Weir people did their part in a synchronized,

professional manner; the Community Management staff provided timely information and traffic coordination, and prompt responses to constant telephone inquiries.

Resident cooperation was a key element.

The result

It was, indeed, a remarkable performance.

One day a child came home from school and told his parents that upon entering one of his classrooms, he and other students saw that some anonymous person had written on the blackboard:

"I'm going to kill everyone in this class. And the teacher, too."

Soon after, a play was written named "Bang Bang You're Dead." A handful of people of conscience have seen that the tool of drama has the power to lance, heal and cleanse the soul. Following the play's performance, discussion followed that led to insight and revelation.

After the tragic shootings in 1998 and 1999, it is reasonable to assume there is a potential killer in every school. Even if we turn our schools into airtight security zones, it's what's in a person's heart that can't be detected by those of us looking from the outside. But kids seem to know who the potential killers are. After every shooting incident, someone has always come forward to say, "Oh, sure, he told me he was going to kill people, but I just thought he was letting off steam." Casual wisecracks need to be brought to the right people, even though kids don't want to be a snitch.

"Bang Bang You're Dead" is a drama to be performed by kids, for kids, directed at the potential killer - the kid in the audience who harbors homicidal feelings towards others.

He will see how horrible and tormented his life will be. It may occur to him that a three minute murder spree is not worth a lifetime in hell. If one potential killer sees himself and the dire irrevocable consequences of this fantasy, or if the victims' families should find a catharsis in the course of the evening, it's worth all the time, effort and expense of future productions. The playwright hopes that awakened senses or heightened consciousness might see tragedy before it happens.

This production is being performed in various California middle schools throughout the year. Talk to your grandchildren about it.
