BOARD MEETING NOTES

1. The Board approved the write-off of four pre-foreclosure balances as uncollectable. This is merely an accounting procedure. Efforts can still be made to collect these debts in the future.

2. A complete automatic pool chemical system to ensure that we meet all state health standards for a commercial pool was approved and will be funded from the Pool Area Reserves.

3. GBF was designated as the authorized signing agent for signing liens, in addition to any future correspondence and documentation on behalf of the Association's collection efforts, pursuant to Civil Code 1367.b

4. The Board authorized the CV Chorus to shop for a good used piano and to return to the Board with a specific proposal.

5. The Board failed to approve a rule change that would have allowed mobile home dealers to place a 24"x36" sign in the window of

the new home from delivery to 15 days after the close of escrow. This proposal may be submitted to committee, amended for future consideration or dropped.

6. In Executive session the Board discussed two collection matters and took action on one. They also approved two requests related to underage residents pursuant to Civil Code 799.9.



BOARD MEETING NOTES

BUDGETING

Each year associations are required to prepare a budget for conducting the operations of their associations per Civil Code 1363(b)

As nonprofit corporations, associations must budget so that revenues do not exceed expenses, i.e., total income minus expenses should equal \$0.

There are two techniques for preparing budgets: (i) zero base budgeting and (ii) incremental budgeting.

1. **Zero Base Budgeting** starts each year's budget from a zero base, i.e., at the beginning of the budgeting process, all budget line items have a value of \$0.

a. **Advantages.** Since each line item starts at zero, the association must justify each item in the budget. This should bring to light any waste and obsolete operations.

b. **Disadvantages.** This approach can be very time consuming.

2. In **Incremental Budgeting** the current year's budget serves as a basis for next year's budget and is simply adjusted. The most common methods of adjustment are: (i) CPI adjustments and (ii) variance projections.

a. **CPI Adjustment** is the easiest and least effective method simply taking the Consumer Price Index (the measure of inflation published by the government) and applying it to all line items. The disadvantage is that not all items in a budget are affected by the CPI. This results in some line items being over-budgeted and others being under-budgeted.

b. **Variance Adjustment** is the method used by most associations. Since most line items in an association's budget are necessary rather than discretionary (utilities, insurance, maintenance, etc.), the association starts with the current year's budget and looks at variances projected through the end of the fiscal year. This gives the association an estimate of actual expenses for the year for each line item so it can adjust expenses up or down, as needed.

CVPOA uses the incremental variance method combined with the zero based methodology to generally maintain the same level of service while adjusting only the items that truly need it. By using this method we have been able to **keep assessment increases below the CPI for the past 16 years.**

MEXICAN FAN PALM TRIMMING

For many years Champagne Village has trimmed resident's Mexican Fan Palms at our cost and billed the owners on their monthly statement. Over the years many of the small palms on private property have grown such that residents and their gardeners can no longer trim them safely. Any resident who has not been on the program in the past may contact the Office and sign up for the trimming. The work will occur in early July and you will be billed on your August HOA bill. For those who have been on the program in the past your notices have been mailed and **you do not need to contact the Office.** The cost per tree is \$60 again this year.

GRAND MARSHAL - JEANNE MAE (JOHNSON) HUNT

Jeanne was born on July 9, 1923 in Aurora, Illinois, to William and Irene Johnson. After a happy childhood with an older and a younger brother, Jeanne opted for business school instead of college as the University of Illinois was "too far away". Her career as a court reporter was interesting but in 1943 she joined the WAVES and was promptly sent to Hunter College in New York City for basic training - much farther away than Champaign-Urbana!

While serving at the Washington, D.C. Naval Cryptology Section, she met Tom Hunt and after a mostly long-distance romance they married in Pecos, Texas on May 3, 1945. Life as an Air Force wife and mother of three children was hectic, interesting, very challenging and involved many moves in the U.S., Canada and Japan.

They left the Air Force in the early 70's and settled in Rancho Bernardo where Tom opened his Enrolled Agent tax office. Their son Tommy died in an accident in the mountains in the 70's. In 1982 the office was closed and the move to Champagne Village became their final one. Jeanne and Tom played lots of golf, enjoyed the parties, traveled and made lots of friends. Tom continued to serve some tax clients and was very active during the changeover from rental to lot ownership, serving as CVPOA President from 1986 to 1988.

Jeanne, along with Jeanne Nelson and Elaine Bogan, were the decorating committee for the expanded Village Hall. She became an expert at handicaps for the Oaks Ladies Golf Club and later was Ringer Chairman for the Fountains Ladies. Life was full and they continued to travel frequently with fellow Villagers and on their own. A special six-week freighter cruise in 1995 to Australia, New Zealand and the Pacific Islands marked their 50th anniversary.

Jeanne's mom, Irene, came to live in CV and soon became everyone's favorite lady, dispensing charm, wonderful meals, and always a beautiful presence. Irene's death in 1989 was the beginning of some very difficult years.

In 1998 Tom became very ill, was eventually under hospice care at home, and passed away on January 27, 1999. Within a relatively short time, Jeanne also lost a favorite nephew, her younger brother Bob, a grandson, and her younger daughter Sandy. And that was just in her family.

With the help of many friends and Village neighbors and her strong faith, Jeanne survived and became the "go to" person for those of us who now need a cheering word and a sympathetic ear. While cooking may not be her thing, she possesses all the other lovely attributes of her mother. A special 80th birthday celebration was held in her home in 2003, and although it is hard to believe, it is now time to go all out for her 90th this year.

Jeanne is a loyal, patient friend to many of us and we salute this terrific lady who will be joined on this special day by her daughter and son-in-law, Sherry and Larry Collins from Ohio, and two of her grandchildren, Laura and Josh Collins.



GRAND MARSHAL - WILLARD YOUTZ

Willard Youtz was born in East Des Moines, Iowa in 1919. He was the second of five boys and one girl. The Youtz family eventually purchased an old creamery building in Wyoming which they separated, using half for the house and half for the barn. During this time they built their farm/ranch where they raised cattle on the rangeland, and grew winter wheat, corn, cane and potatoes on the cropland. As a child Will played the piano and accordion, helped daily with many chores, and played a lot of sports.

The "Great Depression" began in 1929 and lasted through the 30's, along with a climatic drought in the ten Great Plains states. It increased financial difficulty in farming and all businesses. Minimum labor rates were down to \$1 per day for a few years. Will says his wonderful parents made everything okay.


While they were all growing up Will's dad insisted that all the kids would attend and graduate from the University of Wyoming in Laramie. He worked four hours a day seven days a week at college for room and board and graduated with a B.S. degree in Agriculture with a teaching certificate from the State. His first teaching job in 1941 paid \$190 a month. It was like millions to him! Candy bars and ice cream cones were still 5 cents each. On December 7, 1941 when Will was 22 years old the Pearl Harbor attack changed his plans.


"We could hardly believe what they were saying. The Japanese were attacking and sinking a lot of our ships in Pearl Harbor." After hearing one of the news reports, Will says that his mother wept and told him "They have guns and our boys only have broomsticks to train with." Will knew what to do. Having always wanted to fly but not able to afford it, he quit his job and enlisted. After a year of training Willard Youtz had earned his Naval Aviator flight wings. "After getting my wings, all I had left to do was learn to land on an aircraft carrier!" They got a lot of training but due to the suddenness of the attack, the Navy wasn't ready for the new pilots. They were actually building more carriers for the fleet. One of those ships was the USS Liscome Bay, only 500 feet long and called an escort carrier.

On November 21, 1943 while cruising off of Tarawa in the South Pacific, Willard's airplane went into the ocean right after takeoff with a bad engine, killing the radioman while Will and his gunner escaped unharmed. Three days later on November 24 the Liscome Bay was hit by a torpedo in the middle of the night and Will and his shipmates had to make an immediate and very perilous exit before the eventual sinking of the ship, which occurred only twenty minutes after the torpedo hit. Will received only minor injuries from the attack and helped some of his shipmates while in the water. As Will was humbly quoted in a newspaper article, "I saved some people, but everybody helped if they could." All told, the torpedo attack on the Liscome Bay killed 640 crewmen and only 272 survived. This was and is a highly documented event during the war in the Pacific. After 30 days of survivor leave visiting his family in Wyoming, Will returned to the war in fighter planes, was assigned to the USS Hornet and flew in another 70 missions. He received the silver star and several other medals. Willard and his four brothers were each in the military in WWII and all five survived.

While Willard got on with his life after the war, he remained in the Navy Reserve until 1956 when he finally opted out to take care of his family. He worked for the Soil Conservation Service for 31 years. He was widowed three times and raised three children and eight stepchildren. Will and his wife, Mary, moved to CV in 2001 but she died in early 2007. He met his current wife, Ruth McClain, at one of the CV parties and married her three months later!

Will is a member of the CV Lions Club, plays golf on the Oaks, line dances, and attends all the events. He also loves to cook and play the piano.



Use caution by keeping small dogs on leashes when outside. **Watch for cars.** Please walk on the sidewalk along Live Oak Lane and close to the sides of Ironwood View in the Pet Park area to avoid a run in with a vehicle. **Drivers, please drive slowly when in pet walk areas.**


