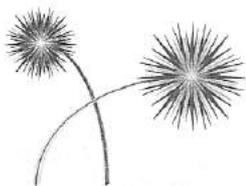

### BOARD MEETING NOTES

#### BUDGETING

Each year associations are required to prepare a budget for conducting the operations of their associations per Civil Code 5400.

As nonprofit corporations, associations must budget so that revenues do not exceed expenses, i.e., total income minus expenses should equal \$0.

There are two techniques for preparing budgets: (i) zero base budgeting and (ii) incremental budgeting.

1. **Zero Base Budgeting** starts each year's budget from a zero base, i.e., at the beginning of the budgeting process, all budget line items have a value of \$0.

a. **Advantages.** Since each line item starts at zero, the association must justify each item in the budget. This should bring to light any waste or obsolete operations.

b. **Disadvantages.** This approach can be very time consuming.

2. **In Incremental Budgeting** the current year's budget serves as a basis for next year's budget and is simply adjusted. The most common methods of adjustment are: (i) CPI adjustments and (ii) variance projections.

a. **CPI Adjustment** is the easiest and least effective method simply taking the Consumer Price Index (the measure of inflation published by the government) and applying it to all line items. The disadvantage is that not all items in a budget are affected by the CPI. This results in some line items being over-budgeted and others being under-budgeted.

b. **Variance Adjustment** is the method used by most associations. Since most line items in an association's budget are necessary rather than discretionary (utilities, insurance, maintenance, etc.), the association starts with the current year's budget and looks at variances projected through the end of the fiscal year. This gives the association an estimate of actual expenses for the year for each line item so it can adjust expenses up or down, as needed.

CVPOA uses the incremental variance method combined with the zero based methodology to generally maintain the same level of service while adjusting only the items that truly need it. By using this method we have been able to keep assessment increases below the CPI for the past 19 years.

### SHERIFF VACATION CHECK REQUEST FORM

The Volunteer Sheriff needs to have your filled out request form at least a week before the resident leaves in order to get it into the system.

The forms are available on the wall next to the right of the office counter.



### MEXICAN FAN PALM TRIMMING

For many years Champagne Village has trimmed resident's Mexican Fan Palms at our cost and billed the owners on their monthly statement. Over the years many of the small palms on private property have grown such that residents and their gardeners can no longer trim them safely. Any resident who has not been on the program in the past may contact the Office and sign up for the trimming. The work will occur in early July and you will be billed on your August HOA bill. For those who have been on the program in the past your notices have been mailed and **you do not need to contact the Office**. The cost per tree is \$60 again this year.

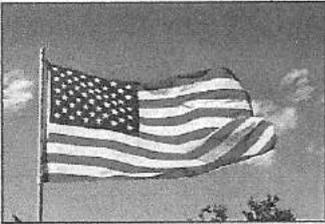

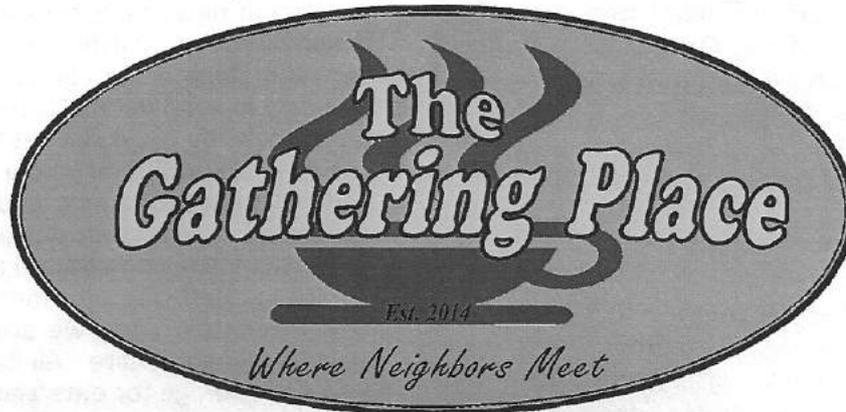

## HEALTH INSURANCE NEWS

Recent news casts highlighted a young man who was hospitalized for a jellyfish sting in Mexico. It turned out to be a life threatening condition for the 28 year old who was fully insured with a US health policy. In critical condition the family could not get him released from the Mexican hospital until they paid a \$50,000 bill. Finally through State Dept. negotiations and \$10,000 up front, he was evacuated to San Diego for treatment. This was a glaring example of how complicated a foreign health crisis can be.

When we leave our immediate locale it is so important to consider that we are also leaving access to our usual local health care. All California Health Care policies include coverage for emergencies in the US and some for emergencies during travel. An emergency is usually defined as a condition threatening life or limb. It is extreme care needed in an emergency room. However, there is no guarantee that foreign hospitals will recognize or wait for payment from a US company.

Short of that kind of need we are advised to know our health care options regarding your individual policy. Medical services for other ailments may not be covered. Medicare (A & B) with a Medigap or Supplemental plan and Drug plan travels anywhere in the US and may have some limited coverage out of the country. HMO policies, whether Medicare or Individual/family plans, are limited to your local service area. You are not covered outside your area unless you have a special travel provision in your particular policy. Even seeing a doctor in the next county would be your financial responsibility.

Also be certain you carry a list of your medications, the phone number of your pharmacy and doctor in your purse or wallet. It is also wise to use a weekly sized pill box. When we are truly on vacation and having fun, we often lose track of time and the days! Having a pill carrier marked for each day of the week really helps.

When traveling with tours and on cruise ships there are often insurances offered with the package. Beware that while the ship may have an infirmary covering cases of the flu or seasickness, other care is very limited. The verbiage in most travel package policies for more serious conditions is to get you to the nearest medical facility. Any local facility will qualify. You may not have any English speaking care givers, diagnostic equipment available or access to medical evacuation unless you arrange and pay for it yourself.

When traveling outside of the state (for HMO's) or the country, it is highly recommended you purchase travel insurance. There are short and long term policies that can cover you for one trip, several trips in a year or stays up to six months. Some companies have networks around the world with English speaking, Western trained physicians and will pay for all transportation needs for care and return to the US. It's also important to know if the coverage you have pays directly to the care giver or if you pay and have to wait to get reimbursed. You are buying peace of mind and excellent care if you need it.

**COMING UP FOR AIR!**

I went to the doctor in May about a “dry” cough that had lasted too long. The last test was a “walk down the hall” to check on my oxygen level with a special device (pulse oximeter). It came up short below 90%. She sent me to the new Palomar Medical Center for a day of tests. Was it my lungs or my heart? It turned out it was my lungs.

What caused this condition? It could be allergens or exposure to some kind of chemical vapors. Spraying weed killer without wearing a mask? Unknown.

What do they call it? Take your pick. Interstitial lung disease with pneumonitis. Not something you can spread! Treat it with a steroid, cortisone (prednisone). Probably not curable, but can be put into remission.

Temporarily I’m wearing one of those “things” that lets you breath pure oxygen. In the house there is a machine that draws oxygen out of the air and lets you breath it. Outside you carry a portable tank with oxygen.

I’m sharing this for anyone who gets out of breath easily or has a dry cough. It’s a simple determination to see if you’re short on oxygen. Also a reminder to wear a mouth mask when working around chemicals!

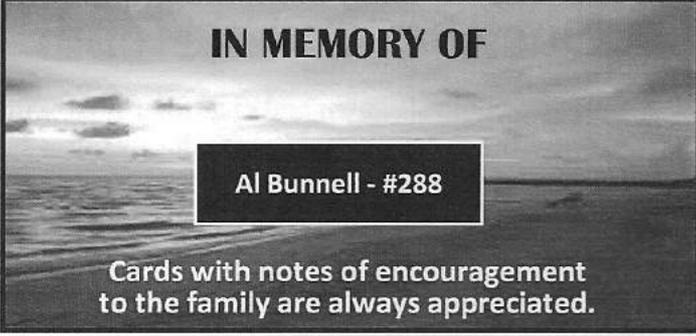

### LIONS CLUB

We said a sad goodbye to one of the founding members who helped charter this Club in 1994. Al Bunnell passed away this month.

The evening's guests were Dottie Allen and Don Ranney from the Lions Friends in Sight Foundation. Lions Friends in Sight began as a cross-border project by a single club in the late 1970's. It has grown and changed over the years and more and more Lions clubs have joined to support its efforts. Last year they gave eye exams to nearly 10,000 patients during 24 screenings in Southern California and five in Baja.

Alan, Lion Ernie Uyeda and Lion Carol Cox attended a Lions Friends in Sight vision clinic in conjunction with a health fair at Kaplan College in Vista. He shared his impressions: *"Suddenly, two vans pulling trailers appeared. Like an anthill, workers materialized to unload the trailers. They pushed, pulled and carried tables, chairs, instruments and rack after rack of eyeglasses. This chaos quickly subsided and miraculously there was an organized, professional eye clinic where only empty rooms had been minutes before. It was amazing!"*

Don Ranney and Dottie Allen showed a video presentation of their free clinics. Dottie's house is used to sort, grade and clean used eyeglasses. They have developed a computer program for tracking each pair and they bring almost 18,000 pairs of glasses to each clinic. They can examine up to 400 patients a day with a refractometer and those over 40 are checked for glaucoma. Ernie, Carol and Alan were trained and ran both pieces of equipment. All results are reviewed by a doctor and more extensive examination is made when appropriate. Most of the 125 people seen in Vista received a free pair of glasses.

The CV Lions Club has donated 181 pair of eyeglasses, 54 separate lenses from broken glasses, 65 pair of sunglasses and 117 cases. Any Villager who has unneeded glasses is encouraged to put them in the box in the Copy Room in the Hall. A \$400 donation to the Lions Friends in Sight was given by the Club. Three new residents were inducted: Larry and Lynn Campbell, #369, and Jack McGrath, #145.

President Alan reported that the Club donated nearly \$10,000 last year to various charities thanks to the success of Lion Leah's Fashion Show, and had budgeted to donate \$9,000 for the coming fiscal year. The next meeting will be July 16 at 5:30 pm.

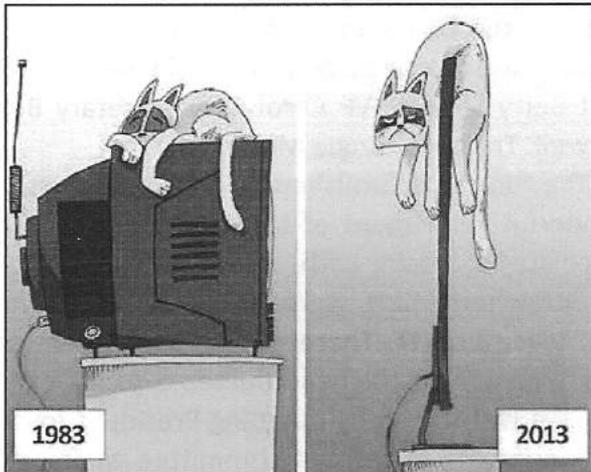
