BOARD NOTES

The June 23, 2016 Open Board Meeting was attended by 65 CV home owners; a positive testimony for the reason the meeting was moved to 6:00 pm. Thank you for your interest in the business of Champagne Village. All Directors were present with the exception of Hil Sybesma and Jean Slaughter. Minutes from April 21, 2016 were approved. The CFO report was given by Tom Riggs who explained that a full CFO report will be presented at the July meeting.

The new business discussed follows:

1. MarCom, a committee for marketing and communication was approved as permanent.
2. A new portal on the CV website will be created to track CV projects.
3. Tom Riggs explained the Key Policy. The policy stands as before: keys needed are to be checked out through the Office before closing, the day before your event. If your event is on a weekend please get the keys on the prior Friday.
4. Because of health issues the owner of the company hired to construct park patio covers is closing his company and retiring. A new company, Patio Furniture Plus, is in the process of getting the appropriate permits after which construction will be completed in a matter of days.
5. Director Lee Martin explained the development of construction protocols.
6. The cancellation of the current CV website contract was approved upon its expiration in July. A new website contract will be obtained at a cost of approximately 1/2 the current cost.
7. Funding of the Capital Reserve Fund was discussed.
8. The Reserve Expenditure of \$1,420 for a new spa filter pump was approved.
9. Waiver of the 2 pet rule was approved for Jim and Debra Matthews. The Matthews who will be moving to CV have three pets one of which is old and expected to pass away soon. Once the pet passes then they will honor the 2 pet rule.
10. A motion to move the Board Meeting to the third Wednesday was tabled.

There will be an Executive Session of the Board on June 30 at 2:30 pm to have member hearings and to discuss legal matters and contract issues. The next Open Board Meeting will be Thursday, July 21, 2016. For those who wish to communicate with the Board please give your communication, in writing, to the Office or use the CV website.

- Next Agenda Workshop is **Friday, July 15 at 10:30 am** in the Card Room (always held the Friday prior to the board meeting).
- Next regular Board of Directors Meeting is **Thursday, July 21 at 6:00 pm.**

OFFICE NOTES

BUDGETING

Each year associations are required to prepare a budget for conducting the operations of their associations per Civil Code 5400.

As nonprofit corporations, associations must budget so that revenues do not exceed expenses, i.e., total income minus expenses should equal \$0.

There are two techniques for preparing budgets: (i) zero base budgeting and (ii) incremental budgeting.

1. **Zero Base Budgeting** starts each year's budget from a zero base, i.e., at the beginning of the budgeting process, all budget line items have a value of \$0.

a. **Advantages.** Since each line item starts at zero, the association must justify each item in the budget. This should bring to light any waste or obsolete operations.

b. **Disadvantages.** This approach can be very time consuming.

2. In **Incremental Budgeting** the current year's budget serves as a basis for next year's budget and is simply adjusted. The most common methods of adjustment are: (i) CPI adjustments and (ii) variance projections.

a. CPI Adjustment is the easiest and least effective method simply taking the Consumer Price Index (the measure of inflation published by the government) and applying it to all line items. The disadvantage is that not all items in a budget are affected by the CPI. This results in some line items being over-budgeted and others being under-budgeted.

b. Variance Adjustment is the method used by most associations. Since most line items in an association's budget are necessary rather than discretionary (utilities, insurance, maintenance, etc.), the association starts with the current year's budget and looks at variances projected through the end of the fiscal year. This gives the association an estimate of actual expenses for the year for each line item so it can adjust expenses up or down, as needed.

CVPOA uses the incremental variance method combined with the zero based methodology to generally maintain the same level of service while adjusting only the items that truly need it. By using this method we have been able to **keep assessment increases below the CPI for the past 20 years.**

NEW PAYMENT PROCEDURES

Effective July 1, 2016

Due to the change in management companies, the Champagne Village Office will **no longer accept cash** for payment of assessments, keys, locks, transponders or any form of refundable deposits. **Please be prepared to pay for these items with a check.** We will continue to accept cash for copies and faxes.

Secondly, we are requiring that any check payments for assessments be **mailed in the pre-addressed envelope** that is provided with your monthly statement. This will expedite the processing and accuracy of payments. If you do not wish to mail your payment, please sign up for ACH Payment (Auto Pay or Direct Debit). WHAT WE'RE WORKING ON

KITCHEN REMODEL COMMITTEE

Over the past two years, I've cooked for many CV events that were presented by Boomers, Care and Concern, and SAC. I love giving back to the community, and I really love to cook. But doing this has been a love/hate experience for me, since having to create a menu around the Hall's numerous kitchen issues is challenging at best. Even as a professional baker and cook, it's been beyond stressful to make a delicious meal when most of our equipment is broken, not functioning properly or downright dangerous.


Most of our kitchen's surfaces (counters, floors and ceiling) are in deplorable shape and would fail a Health Department inspection. The oven sporadically works and when it does operate, the temperature cannot be controlled and the doors do not remain shut. Some warming trays, one microwave, the disposal and other assorted items are inoperable and have been for years. Other equipment including the stove range, are dangerous when in use.

Because of this, food is mostly either prepared and/or cooked in individual homes and then brought to the Hall, or food is pre-ordered that requires no cooking at all. The bottom line is that our kitchen has deteriorated beyond a repairable status and is in desperate need of replacement.

As a result, the Board has formed an ad hoc committee that is tasked with defining what is needed, and proposing a plan for resolution. In this case the resolution is renovation, more than likely presented in stages, that involve replacing much of the kitchen and its equipment.

Many of you may not have had the opportunity to walk through the kitchen, so I've have taken a few photos, which I hope speak volumes. These show that it isn't always what you see that is the problem, it's also what you don't!

If we want to continue hosting events that involve food, it's time for us to have a kitchen in which we can safely and reliably prepare and cook that food. I'm certain that most residents have pride of ownership in our homes; we also need this pride in our common areas. So watch for updates on the results of our committee findings!

HEALTH INSURANCE NEWS

You may have read in the news recently that Health Net is being acquired by Centene. Health Net's market share has been declining in California and this merger will allow it to expand into other states and expand its networks. Aetna is acquiring Humana. This merger will form the second largest health insurance provider in the US. Both brand names will continue to operate under their current names.

We have fewer options as health insurance continues to change under the new laws and regulations. By 2020 two supplement plans for Medicare will no longer be available. The most popular plan F and plan C will no longer be available. Currently plan F allows 100% coverage of what Medicare does not cover. The next closest plan (G) will have the \$147 annual deductible for part B, then all else is covered. The current plan G will then be the maximum coverage plan available. Everyone who already has a plan F or C will be able to keep their plans.

If your supplemental plan premium has increased in the last two years it might pay you to shop. I was able to save over \$400 annually on my premiums and \$700 for another client by changing from plan F to a plan G.

A supplemental plan can be changed with guaranteed issue within 30 days of one's birthday. It pays to continue to compare your insurance options during our ever-changing market.
