

Another great attendance at the July Board Meeting. Thank you for attending.

1. Previous minutes, financial report and manager's report were approved.
2. Jean Slaughter reported that the CV Hall solar panels are on schedule.
3. Hil Sybesma reported that there are large common areas to be cleared of brush and other dead landscaping. He also recommended that the landscaping around the CV Hall be upgraded.
4. Steve Thacker of SAC reported that 196 attended the July 4th Picnic.
5. The Reserve Study was approved.
6. SAC request for CV Hall reservations was tabled. CV Board requested more specific information about dates of requested reservations.
7. Surveillance system vote was tabled to get more quotes and to clarify what is needed.
8. Proposal to allow swim diapers in CV Pool was voted against by the Board.
9. The next Board meeting is scheduled for **August 19 at 6 pm**; please mark your calendar and plan to attend.
10. Open forum included the enforcement of the pool rules especially during the summer with grandkids visiting; CC&R's, Bylaws, and Rules and Regulations need for enforcement.



President's Message

After several years of discussion, the CVPOA is about to embark on setting up a website that will serve the needs of the residents, the Board and committee members, as well as prospective home buyers.

We have selected a vendor to host the site and provide technical assistance as needed. The ad hoc committee for Informational Technology (IT) operations will be working with the management team to determine the different items that will be included within the website. I am sure that the site will evolve over time as the owners communicate their ideas to the committee. We anticipate the site will pay for itself in several ways: having site sponsors, reduction in the use of printing supplies, and improved communication between the many entities associated with the CVPOA.

Some of the initial links will contain such items as a community calendar, a resident directory, an ability to download forms, and general information important to our daily lives. The Board and staff are very excited and we will keep you updated as site development progresses.

SECURITY DISCLAIMER

We always hope that our entry systems provide some deterrence to crime. However, no matter what steps we take the association can never be completely safe and secure. For example, it is possible for someone to enter the property under false pretenses to commit crimes, for residents to commit crimes against their own neighbors, for guests of residents to commit crimes, and for employees to commit crimes. HOW TO REPORT AN EMERGENCY

If you need to report an emergency that may endanger life or property (fire, gas leak) please call 911 immediately. To report maintenance emergencies call the Office number **(760) 749-8008** and stay on the line until you get a live person.

During office hours you will get either Karin or Tom; after hours you will get an operator who will contact us so we can determine the proper course of action for the particular emergency. One of your staff is on call 24 hours a day seven days a week 365 days a year to handle emergencies. You may leave a non emergency message on the afterhours message service.

PACKAGES



If you are notified by our postal carrier that you have a package in the Office or in one of the lockers, please pick it up as soon as you can. The Office has limited space and we sometimes have up to 20 packages at a time. Thank you.

POOL USE

- Smoking is **not allowed** in the pool area.
- As it states on the signs in the pool area, **"ONLY CHILDREN WHO ARE TOILET TRAINED MAY USE THE POOL"**. Swim diapers **DO NOT** negate or supersede this rule.



THE 2015 FIRE SEASON IS HERE - BE PREPARED!

We saw a review on KPBS recently about the disastrous fire season last year in May which destroyed more than 40 homes in Carlsbad and San Marcos. There were more than eight other fires in Southern California. This year with added drought conditions our officials have added more equipment and training, yet need our help. Fires accompanied with Santa Ana winds are the most dangerous with low humidity and dry grasses/chaparral in the 2015 fire season.

Fire officials reported residents who linger behind when there is fire in their area often are the ones to lose their homes as the firefighters cannot get in to do their jobs. Be prepared to evacuate early, having a pre-packed clothing bag with your medicine packed and ready to go, keeping at least a half tank of gasoline in your vehicle, copies of your important papers and drinking water in your car trunk at all times. Be the **first ones** to leave your neighborhood!

We urge residents to examine their own property, clearing it of dry, flammable materials away from buildings. We're in close proximity to each other and need each other's assistance for fire safety.

Several times in the past we have had fire safety meetings in the Hall where our District fire chief or marshal has explained how we can be more fire safe around our homes. If you are interested in being educated at such a meeting, contact your Board members at cvpoaboard@gmail.com.

HEALTH INSURANCE NEWS

WIFI IN THE VILLAGE HALL



After the war the large family immigrated to the U.S. They sold everything they had to raise money for the sailing. They had just \$35 when they arrived at Ellis Island.

They lived in Poway and later moved to Escondido. After a year, the father bought a small dairy where all the men worked. The women kept house, sold milk and babysat. All of the money went into the family savings. The girls never had more than three dresses; two were worn to school on alternating weeks and one for Sunday church. Through all of their efforts, the family now owns Hollandia Dairy and dairies in California, Arizona and several other states.

Despite the torrential rain and lightning, **Carol Cox, Bonnie Urso, Wanda Koehl and Alan Rings** joined with other clubs and the Lions Friends in Sight organization to conduct vision screenings and distribute glasses to homeless veterans at this year's Stand Down San Diego.

CV CHORUS

What do Francis Scott Key (1779-1843), Louis Armstrong (1901-1971), and Leonard Bernstein (1918-1990) have in common? Aside from playing an integral part of the American music scene, they were born in the hot and sunny month of August on the 1st, 4th & 25th, respectively.

Star-Spangled Banner author Francis Scott Key was born in Frederick County, Maryland. After witnessing the British bombardment of Fort McHenry in 1814, he was enthralled to see the American flag still flying over the fort at daybreak. He then wrote the poem originally entitled *Defense of Fort McHenry* which became the U.S. National Anthem in 1931.

Jazz trumpet player Louis Armstrong was born in New Orleans, Louisiana. Known as "Satchmo," he appeared in many films and is best known for his renditions of *It's a Wonderful World* and *Hello, Dolly*.

While the fireworks of 4th of July told a story of our country, the fireworks in August of 1883 told a completely different story - the eruption of Krakatoa, one of the deadliest volcanic eruptions of modern history. About 36,000 people died from the blasts and the tsunamis which created walls of water as high as 120 feet. On Sunday the 26th, the initial blast of the eruption shot a cloud of gas and debris approximately 15 miles into the air. On the morning of the 27th, four ear-splitting explosions were heard as far away as Perth, Australia, some 2,800 miles away. The explosions hurled an estimated 11 cubic miles of debris into the atmosphere darkening skies up to 275 miles from the volcano. Barographs around the globe recorded the shock waves in the atmosphere; they circled the planet at least seven times. Within 2 weeks, a layer of sulfur dioxide and other gases acted as filters affecting the amount of sunlight able to reach Earth which made for spectacular sunsets all over Europe and the United States.
