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BOARD NOTES

A special thanks to those who came to the Open Board Meeting in the 100° heat. Even with the heat there were 40 CV members in attendance. Also in attendance was Jessica Williams, VP of Prescott Management Company.

1. Minutes of the June 23, 2016 Board of Director's meeting were approved.
2. The CFO report was delayed due to technical difficulties. CV CFO Bob Suttie and CV Manager Tom Riggs will meet with Prescott accounting to clarify and correct any accounting issues.
3. Lee Martin, CV Board Director gave the report on the CV Park development. The permits were approved and the construction is expected to be completed within the first week of August.
4. Tom Riggs gave his Manager's Report on the projects within the Champagne Village Community.
5. A quote from George Weir, Inc. for restriping in the amount of \$2,925 was approved and will be issued from the Reserve account.
6. A pay-or-lien letter and, further, to file a lien if not paid for one of the CV units was approved.
7. Removal of a California Live Oak at a cost of \$395 and replacement with two 24" boxed trees at a cost of \$1,200 was approved.
8. There was a review and acceptance of the Propane Committee Report.



OFFICE NOTES

MONTHLY POA PAYMENTS

If you either pay your monthly CVPOA bill by check or have your bank send the payment directly (bill pay, auto pay, etc.), please note the following:

YES ENERGY WILL CONTINUE TO BILL YOU ON BEHALF OF PRESCOTT. All residents will receive a new account number from Prescott Companies in the mail. Please save this new account number: it will NOT be on the YES Energy bill AND MUST BE WRITTEN in the memo part of your check, to ensure that your payment is properly credited to your account. Mail your payments to the Los Angeles address included on the bill.

Please **DO NOT** use the account number that is written on the YES Energy bill.

If you pay via ACH (Automated Clearing House), where you authorize Prescott to take funds directly from your bank account, you are not affected.

HOW TO REPORT AN EMERGENCY

If you need to report an emergency that may endanger life or property (fire, gas leak) please call 911 immediately. To report maintenance emergencies call the Office number **(760) 749-8008** and stay on the line until you get a live person.

During office hours you will get either Karin or Tom; after hours you will get an operator who will contact us so we can determine the proper course of action for the particular emergency. One of your staff is on call 24 hours a day seven days a week 365 days a year to handle emergencies. You may leave a non emergency message on the afterhours message service.

SECURITY DISCLAIMER

We always hope that our entry systems provide some deterrence to crime. However, no matter what steps we take the association can never be completely safe and secure. PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

This morning I read an article about how nearly 90% of us admit to not being able to accomplish all the tasks on our to-do list by the end of an average day. It makes me feel better knowing that I'm not alone – but it's still pretty frustrating. As soon as I cross off one item, two more to-dos are identified. It is difficult to balance them; and, the priority in which they should be approached changes each time a new item is added.

It's the same with our Champagne Village to-do list. Many of top-priority items need to be addressed as quickly as possible – and yet, a few could end up a notch or two down the list once a more formidable and critical item rears its ugly head. Not that this is really a surprise. We take care of what we must, based on critical need. But we must also not lose touch of everything else needing attention. Right now, the top to-do list includes:

- Complete the picnic area renovation
- Initiate and complete Phase One of the kitchen renovation
- Paint all buildings in the common area (using the newly approved color scheme)
- Order and install new awnings
- Implement new signage
- Continue development of the landscape master plan
- Evaluate the Village entrance area for a bit of much-needed landscaping

There are even more to-do items out there, awaiting their turn on the list. Sometimes it's overwhelming!

Last month, the list looked different. Next week, it may as well – based entirely on any critical needs that might surface. It's the nature of the beast. But I assure you that the Committees, the Board, and the Staff are all working hard to address and act on these and other items as quickly and efficiently as possible. We're also putting in place new tools and resources to help us organize the to-do list and all activities associated with each project; and that's a big help!

Of course, nothing feels better than when we complete items and cross them off our to-do list. Over the past few months, quite a few of those moments have occurred! We need to keep that progress in mind as we look ahead to what remains on the to-do list here at Champagne Village. Think of how many more items we're closer to crossing off! We'll get there!

Meanwhile, how's *your* to-do list coming along?

ARE YOU READY?

The Champagne Village Disaster Committee takes seriously the situation of looking at a five-year drought. "The wildfire potential for our region is above average."

We want to assist all CV residents in being ready for any event requiring an evacuation. In a few days a member of the committee will visit you, introduce themselves and deliver important information. Please read it and sign up to receive, "Emergency Calls" offered by the Deer Springs Fire Safe Council. The council maintains an Emergency Communication System, similar to a reverse 9-1-1 call line, which calls subscribers when a wildfire or other emergency threatens the Deer Springs Fire District. This system is for informational purposes only and is provided by volunteers.

List your cell phone with **Alert San Diego**. San Diego County operates a regional notification system, (Reverse 9-1-1) that sends telephone and email notifications when a disaster or emergency threatens. Emergency personnel use this system to issue evacuation orders when wildfire threatens.

The system uses the region's 9-1-1 database, so it is able to contact all landline telephones. However, **cell phones are not automatically registered in the reverse 9-1-1 system**. To register a cell phone number, go to Alert San Diego's website at readysandiego.org/alertsandiego/ and fill out the form. It's the best way to ensure that your cell phone number is registered in the county's reverse 9-1-1 warning system.

The Disaster Committee will utilize the above warning systems to notify residents of a threat and/or evacuation notification. CVPOA "One Call" and community volunteers will also provide assistance.

Champagne Village has been separated into five (5) areas. Each area has a volunteer **Area Coordinator**. The Coordinator has recruited other volunteers called **Block Captains** that will, in the event of an evacuation order, reach out and remind their neighbors to "GO". If a resident would require assistance to evacuate, please notify the Block Captain when he/she delivers your packet.

The committee hopes all of the packet information will be helpful, and we are counting on EVERY resident to take personal responsibility to be READY.

MarCom Committee Update

This month busy-ness ensues with the MarCom (Marketing & Communication) Committee! We're working on the following activities and items:

Replacement of the entrance sign. Until last week when it was removed due to its condition, this sign was located just after you entered the Village and drove over the bridge - and before you turned left to the Office and mailbox area. We're replacing it with a fresher sign, using the recently approved building colors.

Design and installation of a Village Map sign. This brand new sign will be located in the small parking area just before taking a right to the mailbox area. It will be lit, with a fresh design that will incorporate the recently approved building colors. The sign will contain a large map, making it easy for visitors and contractors to navigate throughout the Village. A short list of numbers for the Office, Gate and emergencies will also be displayed. You should see both of these new signs installed over the coming weeks.

Communications Resources and Online Tools. We're still evaluating options for more efficient communications methods between staff, the Board and committee members. This will take a bit longer to determine than we previously thought: we want to get it right, so we'll keep on evaluating!

Website. This month we received a bit of breathing room upon hearing that the current site would remain live until the end of July. This extra time allowed us to work on other items, as well as fine-tune the newer site - which will be up and running right before August 1.

The Burn Institute of San Diego offers free battery-operated smoke alarm inspections and maintenance. Inspections include vapor-testing and inspection of existing alarms, and replacement of alarms or batteries, if necessary.

There is absolutely no charge to owner-occupied residents. Sorry, this program is funded by government grants, and rental units are not covered.

We are unable to accommodate alarms located on vaulted, or other high ceilings requiring ladders.

THE GREEN THING

Checking out at the store, the young cashier suggested to the much older lady that she should bring her own grocery bags because plastic bags are not good for the environment. The woman apologized to the young girl and explained, "We didn't have this 'green thing' back in my earlier days." The young clerk responded, "That's our problem today. Your generation did not care enough to save our environment for future generations."

The older lady said that she was right -- our generation didn't have the "green thing" in its day. She went on to explain: Back then we returned milk bottles, soda bottles and beer bottles to the store. The store sent them back to the plant to be washed and sterilized and refilled, so it could use the same bottles over and over. So they really were recycled. Grocery stores bagged our groceries in brown paper bags that we reused for numerous things. Most memorable besides household garbage bags was the use of brown paper bags as book covers for our school books. Then we were able to personalize our books on the brown paper bags. We walked up stairs because we didn't have an escalator in every store and office building. We walked to the grocery store and didn't climb into a 300-horsepower machine every time we had to go two blocks. Back then we washed the baby's diapers because we didn't have the throw away kind. We dried clothes on a line, not in an energy-gobbling machine burning up 220 volts. Wind and solar power really did dry our clothes back in our early days. Kids got hand-me-down clothes from their brothers or sisters, not always brand-new clothing.

In the kitchen we blended and stirred by hand because we didn't have electric machines to do everything for us. Back then, we didn't fire up an engine and burn gasoline just to cut the lawn. We used a push mower that ran on human power. We exercised by working so we didn't need to go to a health club to run on treadmills that operate on electricity. Back then, people took the bus and kids rode their bikes to school or walked instead of turning their moms into a 24-hour taxi service. We had one electrical outlet in a room, not an entire bank of sockets to power a dozen appliances. And we didn't need a computerized gadget to receive a signal beamed from satellites 23,000 miles out in space in order to find the nearest burger joint. She was right, we didn't have the green thing in our day!

PET LOVER'S CLUB

"Yappy Hour" in the Pet Park - 3:00-5:30 daily

Residents and their dogs are invited to gather in the Pet Park to socialize and enjoy being outdoors.

According to the Humane Society of the United States "Take care when exercising your pet. Adjust intensity and duration of exercise in accordance with the temperature. On very hot days, limit exercise to early morning or evening hours, and be especially careful with pets with white-colored ears, who are more susceptible to skin cancer, and short-nosed pets, who typically have difficulty breathing. Asphalt gets very hot and can burn your pet's paws, so walk your dog on the grass if possible. Always carry water with you to keep your dog from dehydrating.

It is important to remember that it's not just the ambient temperature but also the humidity that can affect your pet. Animals pant to evaporate moisture from their lungs, which takes heat away from their body. If the humidity is too high, they are unable to cool themselves, and their temperature will skyrocket to dangerous levels—very quickly. Extreme temperatures can cause heatstroke. Some signs of heatstroke are heavy panting, glazed eyes, a rapid heartbeat, difficulty breathing, excessive thirst, lethargy, fever, dizziness, lack of coordination, profuse salivation, vomiting, a deep red or purple tongue, seizure, and unconsciousness."

Needless to say, if your pet shows any of these signs during the heat, get them to a veterinarian right away.
