It apparently involves a plot of land on the west side of HWY 15 between Deer Springs Rd. and Old Castle Rd., with plans to develop a new residential community. It is realistic to expect that that land, as well as other land around Champagne Village, will or should never be developed and be subject to the approval of Champagne Village.

Who and what is "Force"? Do they speak officially on behalf of Champagne Village? Does the CVPOA officially endorse and support this organization? Did the CVPOA approve the group's soliciting petitions throughout the Village recently? Do we residents of Champagne Village really have a "God given right" to deprive others from setting up residence in this wonderful area that we live in? Are there not zoning regulations in force for this area? If they are undesirable, is "Force" doing anything to go thru the legal process to have these issues changed?

We're here now, so let's lock the gates behind us and prevent any further growth or progress...

### THE THREAT TO ALL OF US---

If you've read the material in the FORCE display at the mailbox area, you know of the massive project in the works at the County level. This update is to tell you of the result regarding the "density" element which was discussed at the Planning Commission meeting, and which was voted upon.

Briefly, in an area which at present allows 250 dwellings, an Orange County group is requesting permission to site 2,391 dwellings! This would put at least 10,000 more cars on our roads. There is also an option to allow up to 5,480 at build out. This was discussed by the Planning Commission with spokespersons from both the Stonegate Merriam Mountains LLC (the proponent), and a number of local residents, and also the group

headed by the FORCE Coalition. (F.O.R.C.E. is short for: For an Orderly Rural Controlled Environment. Its members start from Escondido City line north to Bonsall.) The vote was 3-2 in favor of 1 dwelling per 20 acres. At this time, it's 1 in 40. Still, this was a positive vote in our favor.

However, we found out that this project is in the "pipeline", which means it is being fast-tracked to the Board of Supervisors. We know that one of these Supervisors is pushing this project, so we **MUST** continue gathering signatures in opposition, and we **MUST** have a tremendous presence at the Board of Supervisors meeting on September 24, 2003.

## VIALS OF LIFE

### **SEPTEMBER 10<sup>TH</sup> WILL BE THE LAST TIME TO GET YOUR VIAL OF LIFE.**

The July 10<sup>th</sup> turnout for the Vials of Life project here in Champagne Village was well received, **BUT FORGOTTEN BY MANY RESIDENTS.** We gave out 150 Vials, and feel it is worth repeating in September.



**MARK YOUR CALENDARS FOR SEPTEMBER 10<sup>th</sup>, FROM 1:00 PM TO 3:30 PM.** This could be a lifesaver for you!!!

The Vials of Life is a county-wide project to have vital medical information immediately available for paramedics in an emergency situation. Paramedics will know to look on the front door of your refrigerator for this vial.

You will be given a small plastic box which attaches magnetically to the refrigerator door in which you have recorded all of your personal medical information such as medications, names of your doctors, allergies, etc. We also take a photo which you place inside the box so the paramedics know they are working with the correct person.

These boxes are provided **FREE OF CHARGE** by the Palomar-Pomerado Health System.

Members of the Palomar Medical Center Auxiliary, who live in the Village, will be distributing the boxes.

**SPECIAL NOTICE: If you are a shut-in and unable to come to the Village Hall please call Connie Bentley (749-3450), and she will arrange to come to your home with a vial.**

### **DEER SPRINGS FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT**

The Deer Springs Fire Protection District is offering BLS (basic life support) CPR (Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation) classes at NO CHARGE to the residents of Deer Springs Fire Prevention District. Minimum 5 students for a class. The course is an approved American Heart Association (AHA) basic life support CPR and AHA textbook and face shields. The course is intended to be taught in a 4 hour block and will include skills practice and testing. If we get at least 5 interested residents the course can be taught right here in the Village. ## **Getting To Know...Gertrude Conca**

Gertrude is a member of our "From Chicago" group. She is not only from there, but she was actually born there.

In January of 1942, she joined the Army Nurses Corps, and was part of the 108th General Hospital Unit. They were sent to England, and later to France, where she spent two years at Cleche, just outside Paris. They took over a hospital which was well built and already established. Their patients were French, American and even some Germans. Because of a shortage of nurses, the ambulatory were asked to help with the others. However, there was one high-ranking German Officer who didn't quite agree, but Gertrude pressed him into helping anyway.

She returned home in September of 1945, and went back to work for Western Electric, where she was a visiting nurse.

Convair advertised in Chicago, wanting people to work in San Diego. Gertrude's husband was hired and they were moved here by Convair.

They lived in Pacific Beach for thirty years, and for one of those years Gertrude worked part-time at Scripps Hospital as a nurse.

In 1964, they bought a "Mr. Frosty" on Garnet

Street in Pacific Beach. After ten years with Convair, her husband retired to join Gertrude in running the frosty shop. After her husband had a heart attack, they switched roles. Gertrude ran the shop and her husband did the home cooking.

In the late 1970s, Lawrence Welk advertised in a local paper that for a special price of \$29, you could have two days and one night at the Welk Resort. This also included a free bottle of champagne with your dinner. Because she was now a widow, Gertrude came with a lady friend.

They liked what they saw, so Gertrude bought a house. She and her friend moved here in September, 1981. The friend now lives in the Good Samaritan Retirement Home in El Cajon.

After a while, Gertrude put her experience at "Mr. Frosty's" to good use by running the yogurt shop at the Welk Resort Shops. This she did for ten years.

Currently, Gertrude is again volunteering to do the blood pressure checking here in the club house the first Friday morning of each month. She says that the numbers have dropped drastically since she first did it some years ago. Then there were four to five nurses doing an average of two hundred! She attributes the drop to the availability of electronic blood pressure checking equipment.

Gertrude and her husband gave their Mr. Frosty to their son, who still runs it today after twenty years. He has five children, four boys and a girl. The girl is following in her grandmother's footsteps. She joined the R.O.T.C. and graduated from University of San Francisco. She has passed her State Boards and is now waiting to go to Texas for officer training.

Remember if you are in Pacific Beach, and get a yen for a frosty, head for Garnet Street.
