BOARD MEETING NOTES

1. A request from the owner of #208 to have a Pine tree removed from the common area behind his home was approved based on the recommendation of a certified arborist.
2. The Board approved an update of the croquet court area with two bocce ball courts, a golf putting area, a gazebo, a storage facility, a sitting area, landscaped areas, and an artificial turf area. This will be funded with landscape reserve funds.
3. Due to safety concerns the Board agreed to replace the old railroad tie stairs in the Picnic area with new concrete stairs. This will be paid for through the paving/concrete reserves.
4. A request by the owner of #294 for a waiver of the no motor scooter rule was approved by the Board.

MOTOR SCOOTERS

At their October meeting the Board will discuss and possibly change the Rules and Regulations to allow motor scooters in Champagne Village.

10 Tips For Making Sure Your Contractor Measures Up

1. Hire only licensed contractors.
2. Check contractor's license number at www.cslb.ca.gov or (800) 321-2752.
3. Get three references, review past work.
4. Get at least three bids.
5. Get a written contract and don't sign anything until you completely understand the terms.
6. Pay 10% down, or \$1,000, whichever is less.
7. Don't let payments get ahead of work. Keep records of payments.
8. Don't make final payment until you're satisfied with the job.
9. Don't pay cash.
10. Keep a job file of all papers relating to your project.

COMMUNITY MANAGER REPORT

The Sheriff's Department says that scam artists have been targeting Champagne Village and Lake San Marcos lately. Why? Because elderly residents are the most vulnerable and trusting. Here are some of the scams to be aware of:

Wells Fargo Scam A call from Wells Fargo introducing their new 360 Club and trying to get some of your personal information over the phone. If you have an account with Wells Fargo they already have all of your information! Tell the caller you'll call Wells Fargo *directly* about it. They will probably hang up, you hang up if they don't.

VISA Scam A call from the Security & Fraud Department at VISA telling you your card has been flagged for an unusual purchase pattern and they are calling to verify. The caller will say he needs to verify you are in possession of your card and will ask for the last 3 numbers on the back of your card which are the Security Numbers that verify you are the possessor of the card. The real VISA will never ask for anything on the card as they already know the information since they issued the card. Simply tell the caller that you'll call VISA *directly* to report a fraudulent purchase.

TOP SCAMS FROM SNOPEs

Tough economic times are, unfortunately, boom times for scammers, as people desperate for money and jobs let down their guards and are more likely to pursue questionable financial opportunities that caution might ordinarily warn them away from. And as folks become more inured to monetary woes, their charitable inclinations are more easily exploited by scammers pretending to be persons in need of sympathetic helping hands. Listed below are several pervasive forms of scams that have proven particularly alluring to potential victims when times are tough. **Do not give out your bank account or credit card number over the phone if you didn't initiate the call to a reputable, known company. Be very reluctant to do business with any outfit that calls you (telemarketer) rather than the other way around.**

Nigerian Scam

A wealthy foreigner who needs help moving millions of dollars from his homeland promises a hefty percentage of this fortune as a reward for assisting him.

Foreign Lottery Scam Announcements inform recipients that they've won large sums of money in foreign lotteries.

Secret Shopper Scam Advertisers seek applicants for paid positions as 'secret' or 'mystery' shoppers.

Work-at-Home Scam Advertisers offer kits that enable home workers to make money posting links on the Internet.

Family Member in Distress Scam Scammers impersonate distressed family members in desperate need of money.

If you know of other scams for CV residents to be aware of, please contact the Office so that we can put the word out.

FLU SHOTS

Flu shots will be available at Champagne Village on Tuesday, September 27 in the Village Hall from 1 pm to 4 pm.

If you qualify under Medicare, the shots will not cost you anything. Just bring in your Medicare Card.

If you have private insurance, the shots are \$20. They will give you a receipt to submit to your insurance company.

For all others the charge is \$20.

You must register at the Village Hall office before Thursday, September 22. The sign up sheet and forms to fill out are on the table across from the office counter. ***The shots are for Champagne Village residents only.***

The nurses are offering to go to the homes of residents who cannot physically come to the Village Hall. Please call the CV Office to register for this service (749-8008).

The flu shots are sponsored by Palomar Pomerado Health System. Volunteers are CV residents who are Palomar Medical Center auxiliary members. Any questions, call Luann at (858) 675-5123.







Meet Bev & Harlan Davenport

Born in 1932 in Pasadena, Harlan was raised during the depression and he and his three siblings worked at his parents' automobile products factory. They even slept there some evenings while their parents worked. As a young boy he dreamed about being a farmer, but coming from a very conservative religious family, his life took a different path. Wanting to work with churches in rural towns, he attended Biola College where he claims he wasn't the best student, and eventually graduated from the Berkeley Baptist Divinity School with a Masters in Theology. During his seminary days Harlan worked at Tahquitz Pines Camp in Idyllwild, California along with other members of his family, acting as the summer camp director.

His first job in ministry was Minister of Education at the First Baptist Church of Visalia. During that time he married a young widow with two very young daughters (one and two years old) and eventually another daughter was born. He then transferred to Lincoln, Nebraska where he spent five years as a pastor before returning to San Joaquin, California (near Fresno) in 1968. After a period of time he was asked to relocate to Los Altos, California where he stayed only a few months. He was disappointed that the church was closed by the Denominational office and he left the ministry.

Harlan then moved to Pomona and joined the family business where he spent 13 years working with his brother. He learned to sail and had a 26 foot

sailboat. One day while driving back towards Los Angeles, he tuned in to a Christian radio program and began to think about the ministry again. He decided to call the Regional Denominational Group to ask if they could use him in their ministry. They said, "Absolutely, can you give a sermon this Sunday?" And he said yes. Shortly thereafter he was installed as the minister of the First Baptist Church in Big Bear Lake. He was there for 15 years during which time he was involved in buying a home for abused women with children, establishing an anti-drug program for kids and starting a pre school. He also served as Chaplain for the City of Big Bear. Over the years Harlan also participated in a Pulpit Exchange Program where he traveled to England and Scotland for six weeks at a time.

After retirement from his position in Big Bear he worked as an interim pastor covering southern California. Harlan's wife, Delores, had struggled through several bouts of cancer but eventually passed away in 2003.

Beverly Jean Bailey (her Dad's uncle was "Bill Bailey" of "Won't You Come Home" fame) was also born in Pasadena (1943), but was raised in Temple City, California on a mini farm where the family raised chickens, rabbits, pigeons, and guinea pigs. She made 25 cents a day grading eggs on the chicken ranch across the street. Bev was a Brownie, a Girl Scout, and played the violin as a child. Her parents owned Bailey Tire Shop in El Monte and actually did business with Davenport Automotive Products, Harlan's family's business!

After graduating from Arcadia High School Bev attended Pasadena City College for two years. Believe it or not, at that time all female students at PCC were **required** to try out for the Rose Parade Queen/Court as part of their physical education class! It was a terrible experience. After completing her education at Cal State Los Angeles, receiving her Lifetime Teaching Credential, she began teaching fourth grade in Montebello, California.

In 1967 Bev married her first husband, Doug Amsbary, who worked for Hewlett Packard and they moved to Escondido for his job. They adopted a son in 1970 and then a daughter in 1972. They also had a teenage foster daughter whom Bev still considers family.

Growing up in a Christian family, Bev always wanted to be in ministry. She said God gave her the desires of her heart when she began working at Emmanuel Faith Community Church in Escondido as the High School Activities Director. After 20 years in that position she became the Women's Ministries Director, a job she loved that lasted for 18 years. In 1999 Bev's husband, who was Business Administrator at Emmanuel Faith, passed away.

Bev served on the Board of Directors for the Tahquitz Pines Camp in Idyllwild for many years as did Harlan's brother. One day, thinking of the old days when she knew Harlan as the summer camp director when she was there as a young adolescent (she's 11 years younger than Harlan), Bev asked his brother, "How's Harlan?" When he mentioned that Harlan's wife had passed away the previous year and he was very lonely, Bev said, "Why don't you have him call me?"

Harlan had her number for over six months, but one day he was watching his grandson in a sailboat race and it motivated him to get on with his life. After many aborted attempts to call Bev (he kept hanging up after dialing her number) they finally talked and made a date. On that date they had a great time, talking for over four hours about old times. They were married in 2005. Coincidentally, not only did their parents know each other, but at their wedding, Bev's brother and Harlan's sister reconnected after many years and got married four months later!

The Davenports were living in the Country Club area of Escondido when in 2006 Bev, invited by a friend from church, came to the Champagne Village Holiday Home Tour. She loved the Village and subsequently brought Harlan to CV to look at homes. After several months of looking at lots and homes, in 2007 they moved into a new home in the Village.

Bev is the Chairman of the Care & Concern Committee and VP of the Chorus. She also plays Shanghai and is learning to play golf. Harlan is a newly elected member of the CV Board and they both attend Game Night and most of the Village events. Harlan has three daughters and four grandchildren and Bev has two daughters, one son, and five grandchildren.

They say they love living in Champagne Village and know that the Lord brought them here for this time of their lives. Though they don't dance now, when they get to heaven they'll be dancing nonstop!

Older Adult Drivers: Get the Facts

In 2009, there were 33 million licensed drivers ages 65 and older in the U.S.

Driving helps older adults stay mobile and independent. But the risk of being injured or killed in a motor vehicle crash increases as you age. An average of 500 older adults are injured every day in crashes. Thankfully, there are steps that older adults can take to stay safer on the roads.

How big is the problem?

In 2008, more than 5,500 older adults were killed and more than 183,000 were injured in motor vehicle crashes. This amounts to 15 older adults killed and 500 injured in crashes on average every day. There were 33 million licensed older drivers in 2009, which is a 23% increase from 1999.

Who is most at risk?

Per mile traveled, fatal crash rates increase starting at age 75 and increase notably after age 80. This is largely due to increased susceptibility to injury and medical complications among older drivers rather than an increased tendency to get into crashes. Age-related declines in vision and cognitive functioning (ability to reason and remember), as well as physical changes, may affect some older adults' driving abilities.

Across all age groups, males had substantially higher death rates than females.

How can older driver deaths and injuries be prevented?

Existing protective factors that may help improve older drivers' safety include:

- High incidence of seat belt use: More than three in every four older motor vehicle occupants (drivers and passengers) involved in fatal crashes were wearing seat belts at the time of the crash, compared to 63% for other adult occupants (18 to 64 years of age).
- Tendency to drive when conditions are the safest: Older drivers tend to limit their driving during bad weather and at night and drive fewer miles than younger drivers.
- Lower incidence of impaired driving: Older adult drivers are less likely to drink and drive than other adult drivers. Only 5% of older drivers involved in fatal crashes had a blood alcohol concentration of 0.08 grams per deciliter or higher, compared to 25% of drivers between the ages of 21 and 64 years.

Older adults can take several steps to stay safe on the road, including:

- Exercising regularly to increase strength and flexibility.
- Asking your doctor or pharmacist to review medicines—both prescription and over-the-counter—to reduce side effects and interactions.
- Having eyes checked by an eye doctor at least once a year. Wear glasses and corrective lenses as required.
- Driving during daylight and in good weather.
- Finding the safest route with well-lit streets, intersections with left turn arrows, and easy parking.
- Planning your route before you drive.
- Leaving a large following distance behind the car in front of you.
- Avoiding distractions in your car, such as a loud radio, talking on your cell phone, texting, and eating.
- Considering potential alternatives to driving, such as riding with a friend or using public transit, that you can use to get around.
