

BOARD NOTES

It was a great turnout at the Open Board of Director's Meeting on August 18 with 74 CV owners in attendance. It's especially good to have the participation of CV owners who have an interest in Champagne Village and are willing to take an active part in its social and business affairs. The following is an overview of the proceedings:

1. Minutes of the July 21, 2016 Board of Director's Meeting were approved.
2. CFO Report – None given by CFO Bob Suttie. A full financial report is expected for the September meeting.
3. A quote from Sun Master for an awning for the Village Hall in the amount of \$4,850 for the awning and up to \$500 for the graphics was approved.
4. Approval for an awning for the CV laundry was amended to research the possibility of having a sign designed and made instead of an awning.
5. The letter from Bill Peltin referencing speeding in the Village was reviewed. President John Grubb recommended that if someone is speeding and/or running a stop sign there should be a written complaint containing the offending vehicle's license number, time of the event and where it happened. The complaint should then be given to the Office for action. Without the above, the Board's 'hands are tied' as to any possible action to be taken.
6. The investment recommendation from Morgan Stanley, Smith Barney was approved.
7. The quote from Economy Restaurant Equipment Supply & Co. for kitchen equipment at a cost of \$18,160 was approved and was further amended to be increased an additional \$4,000 to include air conditioning for the kitchen.
8. An increase to \$4,000 for the onsite checking account was approved.
9. The purchase of a VP-78 Presentation Scaler/Switcher to replace our existing switcher in the amount of \$1,360 from the Village Hall Reserve was approved.
10. The purchase of three signs was approved in the amount of \$2,035 to replace two old signs, plus one new map of the Village sign posted near the mailboxes.

With summer approaching I thought it would be a good time to post the CV rules.

POOL

- **Please shower before entering the pool.**
- Please follow the pool hours as posted at the pool and as listed in this publication.
- Children must be accompanied by an adult. Persons under **14** may not use the spa!
- No glass bottles or containers allowed. Place trash in containers.
- Please return your chairs and lounges to their proper location.
- All pool users must be potty trained - **no swim diapers allowed.**
- Please cover the ping pong tables after use.
- For safety, keep the gate closed at all times.
- Report maintenance problems to the Office.

GENERAL

- **Speed limit for all of CV is 15 mph!**
- **Golf carts are not to be operated by children under the age of 16.**
- **All golf carts must have space numbers affixed to them. Please check your cart; if you need numbers, please contact the Office.**
- **All resident vehicles must have a CV sticker placed on the driver side rear side window. These stickers are available in the Office.**

TENNIS COURTS

- Children must be accompanied by a resident on the tennis courts.
- No black soled shoes allowed. No skates or roller blades.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Recent developments have made it clear to me that the channels of communication between our Village residents and the Board are not as efficient as we'd thought. Effective communication is a must in our building strong relationships between you, the Board, and our Committees, in order to effectively meet our obligations for our Village. We all need to stay informed: you as owners and residents regarding our actions and activities, and we as Board members regarding your concerns and questions. It's only when we're all operating with full information that we're able to perform at our best. To this end, I'm happy to report that we've come up with several options to ensure that the lines of communication remain strong and open:

First and foremost, put it in writing. Phoning the office or stopping by to voice your concern is always an option, but we have no record that you requested any other response. In addition, your issue might require more than a brief response: if that's the case, we'll need a document to start the process of addressing your concern. For these reasons, it's important to write it all down. This assures that we have the facts - as you evaluate them - correctly. Your letter is the beginning of the process-so please provide us with the details in order for us to resolve your concerns.

Send it to us. Once you've detailed your question or concern, make sure it's dated and addressed to the Board. Then drop it in the CVPOA box at the office, send it to the Board via email at cvpoaboard@gmail.com, or write it up and send it via the CONTACT form on our website at champagnevillage.org (you'll first need to log in).

Follow up on your letter. While we're working to ensure that everyone receives a timely response, we'll admit that this is a work in progress. So your follow up – and your feedback – is a BIG help. If you don't hear back in a week regarding your letter then please call, drop in or email. And if you receive a response that you don't believe is sufficient, let us know. We want this to work – and we'll be relying on YOU to tell us that you are satisfied with the progress in resolving your issue.

What happens next in the process is a matter of who best can address your question or concern: if the Manager or staff can help, they will. If the Manager believes that your Board needs to address the matter, we'll get the process moving along. Things may not go as quickly in some cases as you might prefer; but, I can assure you that we'll be communicating with an improved efficiency. While mutual dialogue can present its share of challenges, it's truly gratifying when it's done well. Establishing clear channels of communication and keeping them open; ensuring that everyone's accountable; and following through will be paramount to our mutual and future success. So, here's to hearing from you – AND to you hearing from us!

Introducing our NEW CV Website!

A few weeks back we unveiled our new website and so far, it's a hit!

The new site offers more information to potential buyers of Champagne Village, and the residents-only area offers more information by logging into the site.

If you haven't already registered, please do – it only takes a minute! Here's how:

1. Go to champagnevillage.org.
2. Scroll down to the bottom of the page and click on REGISTER.
3. Fill in the form.

Simple as that!

Once we've verified that you live in Champagne Village, we'll send you an email letting you know you're good to go. At that point, you can click on LOGIN (also located at the bottom of the HOME page).

While you're logged in, you'll find information that's accessible only to residents of Champagne Village that includes a list of upcoming events, the monthly calendar, a paperless version of the CV Times, and lists of committees, Board members, activities and clubs.

Watch for new functionality that includes a page where you can search all governing documents, a searchable resident directory, photo galleries, videos of our Village, updated calendar events and lots more!

If you're going to try cross-country skiing, start with a small country.

MarCom Committee Update

For much of August we've been kicking into high gear and completing the work we started with the new signs and website (see separate article). While neither project moved as fast as we would have preferred, we're feeling good about our progress and look forward to enjoying it all once everything's done.

Meanwhile, we've been working on other projects this month:

CVPOA Monthly Fees: What ARE they used for?

As CV owners we each share the costs of maintaining and operating the common areas, systems, equipment, buildings and amenities. But how is our monthly POA fee used? What does it pay for? Here are just *some* of what's paid for with our monthly fees:

- Landscaping, lawn care and tree removal
- Plumbing, propane lines and sewage systems
- Irrigation systems
- A/C and heating systems
- Electric systems and lighting
- Security systems and gates
- Janitorial services for common buildings
- Pest control
- Cleaning, painting and upkeep of all buildings and common areas
- Road and fence maintenance
- Maintenance of all shared amenities, such as the RV area, pool, fitness equipment, etc.
- Satellite TV and Internet in the common areas
- Insurance to protect CV buildings and common property against damage and liability
- Professional property management, including staff salaries and benefits
- Electricity, phone, water and other monthly utilities
- Administrative expenses and equipment
- Vehicle insurance and maintenance
- Contracted manpower and professional services as needed

Here's another fact: much of what's on this list is taken care of by our CV staff.

RUMOR BUSTERS!

While most of what we hear around the Village is pretty accurate, there are a few things that make us scratch our heads - and want to clarify right away!

HELP US bust any rumors you've heard: email them to cvrumorbusters@gmail.com - thanks!

Rumor: Architectural approvals will be delivered to your mailbox at your space...

Truth: You will be notified by a phone call letting you know that your architectural request was approved or denied.

Rumor: If a large map sign is installed in CV then we won't need the kiosk people anymore...

Truth: Those who work at the front gate kiosk hold a valuable spot as greeters and gate keepers. More important, they serve as ambassadors of our community. When on duty, these folks hand out maps to assure that everyone arrives at their destination. But the front gate is open only 30% of the time, and other methods are needed to guide our after-hours guests and emergency vendors. This is the primary reason we're installing a street map. Installation of this map does not in any way replace those who work at the kiosk: rather, it supplements their work after hours. We love our gate keepers!

FUN FACTS:

Did You Know that You Own AIR?

As Champagne Village homeowners, we own the space upon which our house is located. But you also own one foot of soil beneath your home and 34 feet of air above your house! (*Per Section 2.1.16 of our CC&Rs.*)

This is a common, modern-day real estate concept that dates back to medieval Roman law, and is referred to in the Latin phrase, *cuius est solum, eius est usque ad caelum et ad inferos* (which translates to, *for whoever owns the soil, it is theirs up to Heaven and down to Hell*).

Types of Meetings

In California, both POAs and HOAs must comply with numerous statutes regarding meetings. In addition, our own CC&Rs mandate the types of meetings held here at Champagne Village, as well as the frequency in which they take place:

Agenda Workshops occur the Friday prior to each Board meeting. This meeting is conducted to expedite the process of setting the agenda for business to be discussed at the Board meeting, and to allow members of the Association (CV homeowners) an opportunity to speak directly with the Board regarding these and other matters. Although Agenda Workshops are not required as part of our CC&Rs, they provide a much needed (and appreciated) exchange between members and the Board.

Board meetings occur monthly, to conduct most of the regular business of the Association. Only matters regarding Agenda items can be voted on during a Board meeting. So while other matters may be discussed, no other business may be transacted. Board meetings are conducted via the Open Meeting Act: this means that the Board can permit any Association member to speak.

Annual meetings are required by our CC&Rs, which specify when they are to be conducted and how and when members are to be notified about the meeting. This is the main meeting of the year when Association members typically receive the budget, elect a board, hear committee reports and discuss items of common interest.

Executive Session meetings are permitted by both state law and our own CC&Rs. Sometimes humorously referred to as *secret meetings*, the Board will go into executive session when discussion is required on topics of a sensitive nature such as legal, personnel issues, contracts or delinquent assessments. Executive sessions keep these matters discreet, to respect and assure everyone's right to privacy. While in executive session, Boards are permitted to vote on matters as needed. Any actions taken during an executive session are then *generally* noted in the minutes of the next open Board meeting (such as: "The board discussed issues related to the pending mediation....")

Although it doesn't occur often, **emergency meetings** can be held in cases where circumstances that couldn't have been reasonably anticipated require immediate attention or possible action by the Board. Emergency meetings can be held in person, by phone, or even via email if all Directors agree in writing. Any matters voted on are discussed and noted at the next monthly Board meeting.

Are We an Independent Living or Assisted Living Community?

Actually, Champagne Village is neither:

Champagne Village is an active 55+ community. We're perfect for individuals who can live independently and have no need for either regular onsite assistance OR provided access to offsite assistance. And while Champagne Village offers help and support through the Care and Concern committees as well as our Friends Helping Friends service, both are voluntarily provided as a *courtesy*: they are not an *amenity*.

Assisted living is a good option for individuals who have difficulty with daily activities needed for living independently. These communities offer residents regular, daily support in the form of meals, housekeeping, transportation, on-staff medical assistance, etc. This support is part of the amenities offered in these communities.

Independent living is ideal for individuals who can still live independently but enjoy having access to assistance when it's needed. These communities provide residents with regular access to dining, medical care and other services – but they don't have it onsite. This access is also part of the amenities they offer.

HOA vs. POA: What's the Difference?

Homeowners associations (HOAs) and property owners associations (POAs) are easy to confuse because they're similar in nature - but they do have key differences. Here's some information to help you better understand.

With an HOA, homeowners own the property on which their house sits, but the Association – not the homeowners – typically owns the common area. Owners are granted the right to use the common area through an easement, but they have no vested interest in common areas.

With a POA, each owner typically owns an equal share of the common area. This combination of owning your space and interest in the common area is known as a *unit*. Per our CC&Rs: *the ownership of each Condominium shall include the ownership of a Unit and of a 1/457th undivided interest in the Common Area as tenant in common and membership in the Association.*







Coyotes: What You Need to Know

These days, both wild and urbanized coyotes live in practically every suburban neighborhood across the United States. At Champagne Village, it's not at all surprising to see coyotes: in Gopher Canyon, we share the same 'back yard.'

While their presence in our community is often troubling and looked at as a bad thing, coyotes actually play an important role in our ecosystem by keeping rodent populations under control. In addition to fruits, leaves and berries, the California Department of Fish and Wildlife tells us that coyotes predominately consume rabbits, snakes, voles, gophers, rats, mice, insects and carrion. In fact, studies have shown a substantial increase of rodents in areas where coyotes are removed.

But coyotes are opportunistic omnivores and will consume trash, cats and small dogs when they're conveniently available. They are easy, favored prey. The best way to prevent losing your beloved pet is to keep pets on a leash when they're outdoors: don't allow them to run free at any time. And never assume that a fenced-in area means you can leave pets unattended. Coyotes can easily leap over, dig under and even climb up a fence if they see a food source. Take care!

Did you ever notice that when you blow in a dog's face he gets mad at you? But when you take him for a car ride, he immediately sticks his head out the window.

HEALTH INSURANCE NEWS

I thought this would be a good time to review enrollment periods for Medicare plans since next month brings another Annual Election Period (AEP) which is October 15 - December 7. During this time one can change between Original Medicare or Advantage Plans, change between Advantage Plans or change, drop or join a drug (Part D) plan. All changes take effect January 1 of the new year.

January 1 - February 14 is another Medicare disenrollment period. If you are in an Advantage plan you can disenroll and return to Original Medicare. With Original Medicare (A&B) you will have until February 14 to join a Prescription Drug Plan. Each will be effective the first of the following month of enrollment.

Important to dollar savings is a review of your Annual Notice of Change letter. Every company is required to send you one. On this sheet you will find any changes in your coverage benefits or your drugs. Another important mailing is called The Evidence of Coverage. It's more detailed in costs, rights and responsibilities. These letters usually go out around the first of October.

You need to be diligent to review your medications to see if they are still covered the same. Know where you stand regarding your drug coverage and benefits before October 15 so you have plenty of time to compare your options.
