3. RVs should use the North Gate (Welk Resort) since the Main gate does not remain open long enough to let RVs in.



BUDGET PREP

Each year, associations are required to prepare a budget for conducting the operations of their associations.

As nonprofit corporations, associations must budget so that revenues do not exceed expenses, i.e., total income minus expenses should equal \$0.

There are two techniques for preparing budget, zero base budgeting and incremental budgeting.

1. Zero Base Budgeting. This approach starts each year's budget from a zero base, i.e., at the beginning of the budgeting process, all budget line items have a value of \$0.

a. *Advantages*. Since each line item starts at zero, the association must justify each item in the budget. This should bring to light and waste and obsolete operations.

b. *Disadvantages*. This approach can be very time consuming.

2. Incremental Budgeting. In incremental budgeting, the current year's budget serves as a basis for next year's budget and is simply adjusted. The most common methods of adjustment are: (i) CPI adjustments and (ii) variance projections.

a. *CPI Adjustment*. The easiest and least effective method is to simply take the Consumer Price Index (the measure of inflation published by the government) and apply it to all line items. The disadvantage is that not all items in a budget are affected by the CPI. This results in some line items being over budgeted and others being under-budgeted.

b. *Variance Adjustments*. This is the method used by most associations. Since most line items in an association's budget are necessary rather than discretionary (utilities, insurance, maintenance, etc.), the association starts with the current year's budget and looks at variances projected through the end of the fiscal year. This gives the association an estimate of actual expenses for the year for each line item, so it can adjust expenses up or down, as needed.

CVPOA uses the incremental variance method combined with the zero-based method to generally maintain the same level of service while adjusting only the items that truly need it. By using this method, we have been able to keep assessment increases below the CPI for the past 16 years.

Cracked Signs

New signs have been ordered to replace the cracked signs. They will be made from much more appropriate material provided from a vendor with a history of excellent product durability.

They will be installed by Labor Day and are expected to have a long life.





The map and chart below show the progress being made in the installation of the well irrigation system.



The current status of each phase is shown in the map, below. Note that those labeled "COMPLETED" are now all on well water. Although completely on well water, additional work in the way of "fine tuning" or clean up may still continue on. The contractor has begun work on phases 5 & 7, as of the middle of August. They have advised us they're working on completing the project by the end of November.

The workers have expressed their appreciation of the friendliness and kind words directed towards them by many residents. Your patience is appreciated as well, especially while navigating detours and sand filled trenches.



The chart below, is a good visual showing how much water the well is producing. It represents a time span of from July 16 through August 17. In that span of one month, note the increase of well water used for irrigation. The low spots will fill in as the remaining phases are completed. Each gallon of well water is that much less we have to purchase from Valley Center

HEALTH INSURANCE NEWS

Next month (October) we will begin another annual enrollment period for Medicare plans. During this time changes can be made to Seniors' drug plans. I am referring specifically to stand alone drug plans that are commonly sold with Original Medicare and/or Supplemental plans.

Between 1997 and 2007 total spending for drugs tripled nationwide. To address the rising costs and problems that caused seniors, Congress signed an agreement to provide Medicare prescription drug benefits. Medicare part D recipients pay for prescription drug coverage which is provided by private insurers approved by the federal government. (This coverage may also be provided within an Advantage HMO Plan (MAPD).

Since 2006 Part D coverage has steadily increased. By 2018 six in 10 seniors (58%) enrolled in stand-alone PDPs, while (42%) enrolled in MA-PD plans. Drug plans are a significant part of our Senior health care plans.

Not signing up for a Part D drug plan when eligible comes with a cost. Unless one is still on a credible employer drug plan, penalties are incurred for every month not enrolled after the age 65. When enrollment does occur at a later date, the penalty is added to the drug premium. Even if you do not take any prescriptions at 65, sign up for a minimum cost drug plan. It will save you money in later years when you need it the most.

Those who have limited income may qualify for a program called Extra Help in California. In 2018 nearly two million people are estimated to qualify for premium and drug subsidies but do not check to see if they qualify. If you think this may apply to you, you should call 1-800-633-4227 Medicare for help.

It is important to know that every year, drug companies adjust their formulary (drug list). The coverage for your drug can change, be dropped, or substituted by another drug. It is important that you check your annual change letter to see what may have changed regarding your coverage. If you do not check, you may be stuck with a plan for the coming year that no longer meets your needs. These letters are sent out around the first of October. Do Not Ignore your letter. Read it carefully or have someone help you discern if you have any changes. You can change your drug plan from October 15-December 7th for 2020.

Seniors who turned 70½ in 2019 must start receiving retirement plan payments by April 1, 2020

Monday, April 1, 2020, is the date by which persons who turned age 70½ during 2019 must begin receiving payments from Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs) and workplace retirement plans.

Two payments in the same year

The payments, called [required minimum distributions](#) (RMDs), are normally made by the end of the year. Those persons who reached age 70½ during 2019 are covered by a special rule, however, that allows first-year recipients of these payments to wait until as late as April 1, 2020, to get the first of their RMDs. The April 1 RMD deadline only applies to the required distribution for the first year. For all following years, including the year in which recipients were paid the first RMD by April 1, the RMD must be made by Dec. 31.

A taxpayer who turned 70½ in 2019 (born July 1, 1948, to June 30, 1949) and receives the first required distribution (for 2019) on April 1, 2020, for example, must still receive the second RMD by Dec. 31, 2020. To avoid having both amounts included in their income for the same year, the taxpayer can make their first withdrawal by Dec. 31 of the year they turn 70½ instead of waiting until April 1 of the following year.

Some can delay RMDs

Though the April 1 deadline is mandatory for all owners of traditional IRAs and most participants in workplace retirement plans, some people with workplace plans can wait longer to receive their RMD. Employees who are still working usually can, if their plan allows, wait until April 1 of the year after they retire to start receiving these distributions.



DISPOSAL OF MEDICINES YOU NO LONGER NEED

If your medicine cabinet contains expired prescription medications or any you no longer take, the best way to dispose of them is through the drug take back program. The nearest DEA authorized kiosk is next to the CVS Pharmacy at El Norte which is open 24/7. There is also a kiosk at the Escondido Police Department on Center City Parkway, which is open during regular business hours.

It is recommended that you obliterate your name on the label to protect your privacy. Flushing medications down the drain is not recommended as some might be harmful to ocean creatures and our soil. Vitamins and over-the-counter medicines can be safely disposed in the trash.


