### FLU SHOTS - MONDAY, OCT. 10

Flu shots will be available at Champagne Village on Monday, Oct. 10 in the Village Hall from 12 pm to 3 pm.

**The nurses will no longer be able to give shots to shut ins.**

If you qualify under Medicare, the shots will not cost you anything. Everyone must bring in your Medicare card with the red, white and blue stripe at the top and any supplemental health insurance cards and \$20 just in case you don't qualify for the free shots.

**You DO NOT have to sign up for the shots this year, just show up.** You will fill out the form on the day of the shots. **The shots are for Champagne Village residents only.**

The flu shots are sponsored by Palomar Health. Volunteers are CV residents who are Palomar Medical Center auxiliary members. **Any questions, call Luann at (760) 739-2005.**

### CV ALERT

#### **ELDER ABUSE Concerns here in our Village**

Elder abuse in any form is illegal in the State of California. When financial abuse of seniors on the part of realtors is seen in our own neighborhood, it hits far too close to home for all of us. Over the past few months, we've heard of homes here in Champagne Village selling for far below their fair market value. While we don't claim to know the details or circumstances, it worries us enough to alert you to potential elder abuse.

**If you're planning on selling your home, do yourself a favor and speak with more than one realtor** – and your family members – to help determine the fair market value of your home. A price proposed by any realtor that's too low (or too high!) can mean trouble for you.

In addition, if you're asked to sign any contract or letter with a realtor or potential buyer but you're not sure you should, **DON'T**. Instead, contact a family member or a trusted friend to help with this decision. You can also call the County's Adult Protective Services agency, which helps adults 65 years and older when they are victims of abuse, neglect or exploitation. The above area mapping system continues to re-align for better coverage.

Terry Quimby has resigned. The committee would like to thank him for the years he volunteered as an Area Coordinator for the Blue area. Carol Cox and Pat Martin continue to evaluate Village residents who may require evacuation assistance if an order is issued.

Last month Area Block Captains delivered the EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS PACKETS. If not personally, he or she placed the packet in the resident's mail delivery box. The ultimate goal is for each Block Captain to personally explain the information and requirements, but many residents were not available for the one on one. Why the one on one? The evacuation planning design is different. The information and application forms are intended to assist residents with tools for their own planning of a potential emergency. Because personal planning and readiness is paramount, a follow-up letter will be delivered titled, EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS INFORMATION to support the emphasis.

In September I attended the Deer Springs Fire Safe Council's Board meeting where the Gopher fire was discussed. In addition, Champagne Village residents were encouraged to attend the monthly Fire Safety Education classes at the Hidden Meadows Fire Station. The Annual Fire Safety Fair will be held there on October 8.

The DSFSC provides the Fire Safety News. It's a free subscription when an email address is provided on the application for their Emergency Communication System.

Pending: Evaluation of the CVPOA Emergency Plan Dated November 2011 and update as required.

THE ESSENCE OF SPEED: A DILEMMA

A dilemma is defined as "a choice or a situation involving choice between equally unsatisfactory alternatives, or, a problem seemingly incapable of a satisfactory solution". This accurately describes the issue of speed here in Champagne Village. How to resolve this has probably been the one most elusive answer confronting us, as a Village and past boards, for many years (no, that's not a typo-it's been an on-going issue for many years).



Here we have a sign, simple in nature, innocuous looking, yet it makes a strong statement: The Maximum Speed Limit is 15 MPH. Do we see it too often and therefore not "see" it? Are we above the law; that the limit only pertains to others?

SO, HOW DO WE SLOW PEOPLE DOWN?



Ahh, Speed Bumps! An abrupt 6" high bump that will knock the rust off your car, if you don't slow down. Everyone loves to see them used to slow traffic, but no one wants them in front of their house.



These two pictures show Speed "Humps". They're half the height of speed bumps and transition to the 3" apex in a 3' span. They can be spaced to allow an emergency vehicle to straddle them, yet a car or pickup cannot avoid having to run over one or the other. The Speed Humps have been installed in Murrieta with approval from the traffic manager's office, the Murrieta Fire Department, as well as the City of Laguna Niguel and the Orange County Fire Authority. The Deer Springs Fire District has agreed to work with CV if these are installed.



Here we have a tripod mounted radar gun, with a portable speed display. This type of portable device can be used anywhere and provides a display of the vehicle's speed.

How will our "DILEMMA" be resolved? With the installation of Speed Bumps or Humps (this will most likely cost around \$11,000 to install), or Radar, or do we rely on everyone to respect our speed limit? Or do we continue to watch cars racing around our streets? Stay Tuned!

## CV BASICS: RVs

For as long as we can remember, Champagne Village has been offering RV parking to its residents. Lots of people ask about how they can sign up for a space and what the process entails. This month, we'll give you the basics.

**What is the RV parking area?** Located across from the tennis courts on Ironwood View, the RV parking area is a fenced, locked area that houses a limited number of RVs belonging to Champagne Village homeowners.

**What can be parked in the RV area?** Campers, motor homes, some fifth-wheel trucks, boats and trailers, provided that the owner has a reserved space. And only one space is allowed per person.

**How many spaces are there?** There are only 45 spaces.

**What's included?** Locked parking, electrical (for temporary use only), water and a dump station. Spaces are offered on a first-come, first-served basis. Currently, all spaces are reserved, and they're in high demand (less than 10% of all CV owners at a time can use this area). Contact the Office if you'd like to be added to the current wait list.

**How long is the wait list?** Currently, there are about 8-10 people on the wait list. Given the popularity of these spaces, it's best to be prepared for lengthy wait (i.e., a few years or more).

**Once I have a space, how long can I keep it?** As they are currently written, you can keep your space indefinitely so long as your insurance and registration is active, and so long as you use your RV at least once every 18 months.

**What's the cost?** Currently, there are no fees whatsoever for parking your RV in this area. All owners at Champagne Village – whether or not they make use of it, pay for the upkeep of this area as part of their monthly fee.

**Is this RV park a Champagne Village amenity?** It is. But it's different from other amenities here, since the RV park only serves 10% of CV owners and is offered on a first-come, first-served basis. All other CV amenities are available to all CV owners at any time. In addition, other local POAs charge RV owners a monthly fee for use of their RV parking lots. Whether fees should be charged may be addressed in the future.

If you have any questions about the RV park, please refer to your CV Rules and Regulations, or contact the Office for more information.

## HOUSING FOR OLDER PERSONS ACT

By their nature, senior communities like Champagne Village engage in permissible discrimination. Such discrimination is allowed by the federal government under the "Housing for Older Persons Act of 1995" (HOPA), which is overseen by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

It is the intent of Champagne Village to continue to operate as a senior community and therefore we must meet the following HOPA criteria:

1. At least 80% of the occupied units must be occupied by at least one person 55 years of age or older; *(Per our Bylaws and CC&Rs, Champagne Village requires that at least one person in each unit be at 55 years of age or older, with all other permanent occupants being a minimum age of 45 years.)*
2. The association must publish and follow policies that demonstrate an intent by the association to provide housing for persons 55 years of age or older; and
3. The association must comply with age verification procedures designed to ensure compliance with 55+ requirements.

The Office may need a copy of one of the following forms of identification and if asked you must provide a copy:

- birth certificate,
- driver's license,
- passport,
- immigration card,
- military ID, and
- Any other local, state, federal or international documentation so long as the document contains information regarding the age of the person.



## HEALTH INSURANCE NEWS

October 1 begins the season of Medicare plans for 2017. No applications can be accepted before October 15, but plans can be presented and decisions can be made prior to the 15<sup>th</sup>. The enrollment period ends December 7.

Your annual letters should be arriving to give you a breakdown of any changes to Advantage or Drug plans. Please take the time to read your letter. It could cost you money not to read about the changes!

Drug plans will have a higher deductible at \$400 (up from \$360). The initial coverage period for out of pocket ends at \$1,225 (up from \$1,098 this year). Then the gap coverage will be 49% for generics and 10% for brand name drugs. Medicare has projected an elimination of the coverage gap by 2020. To do that they are slowly raising the deductible (what we pay before insurance kicks in) and changing the percentages covered.

Selling Medicare Advantage Plans and Drug plans are highly regulated. Agents for various plans can mail you ads but cannot initiate cold calls. Nor are they allowed to approach you even on the street to initiate a sales interview. This is meant to keep you from being harassed by aggressive agents. Agents can respond to your questions or calls and can talk to their clients.

I recently had a client call me about a free side service included with his plan. He was so pleased and excited. Some services are not allowed to be promoted as they are not contractual benefits and therefore cannot be mentioned until after one has enrolled. You should always review your plan information documents or go online to see if you are utilizing all that is offered to you. A few examples are transportation miles, nurse/doctor hot lines, sliver sneakers classes, over the counter allowances, and discounts. Check it out!

## CV LIONS CLUB

The Lions of Champagne Village have an ambitious schedule for the month of October. We begin with a second session of PlusOptix training in order to prepare additional CV Lions to become Certified Vision Screeners. Under the leadership of Lion Carol Cox, RN, our Certified Vision Screeners have begun contacting local private pre-schools to begin free vision screening of children 6 months to 6 years old using our recently purchased PlusOptix vision screening equipment. The generosity of the residents of our Village and neighbors in our community made the purchase of the equipment possible; and we thank you.

For the Lions this is an exciting project because we can detect childhood vision disorders early enough to make a difference. The equipment provides immediate *pass* or *refer* screening results. In less than one second, PlusOptix vision screening devices detect most common vision disorders including: Hyperopia or far-sightedness; Myopia or near-sightedness; Astigmatism or out of focus vision; Anisometropia or Amblyopia or lazy eye, Anisocoria and Strabismus, eyes not directed to an object simultaneously. Our program is called Lions kidsight USA and it is in association with the San Diego Lions Clubs Eye Preservation Awareness & Action Program.

Educators report that 80% of learning is visual. If a child cannot see well, he or she cannot learn. Yet most young children don't get their vision screened until they have problems learning or paying attention in school. By then, it may already be too late.

October is "White Cane Month" and October 15 is "White Cane Day". White Cane is our most important fundraiser of the year. And every penny we collect goes to local blind organizations to further their work for the blind and vision impaired. A letter asking for your tax deductible donation is being distributed to every home in the Village. Thank you for your generous support to our annual White Cane fundraiser.

On October 17 the Champagne Village Lions Club celebrates its 22<sup>nd</sup> year serving the blind and vision impaired in our Village and community. We are one of the oldest organizations in Champagne Village and we take pride in our motto "We Serve" and our sight programs aimed at preventable blindness.

November is Lions Diabetes Awareness Month. November 11 is Veterans Day. Thank you Veterans for your service!
