NOTES FROM THE BOARD

On Thursday, September 21, the Board of Directors met to conduct the Association's monthly meeting. Six Directors were present (Sue Seebach, CFO and Secretary was absent) and about 75 Association members attended. (Please note that, on August 30, the Board convened a special meeting to fill the Director vacancy created by Susie Riley's resignation. Two members were nominated by the Board: Karen Smith and Susan Robinson. The Board appointed Susan Robinson in a 4-1 vote.)

New Business included the following:

- Approval to change billing companies from YES Energy to PayLease. This will increase the monthly fee by \$0.10 per unit per month. Once fully in place (about 60 days), this will ensure that bills are regularly sent out on time. (Unanimous)
- Approval of a quote from Timothy Ferrara (\$3880.00) to perform our annual financial review and prepare our state and Federal tax returns. (Unanimous)
- Approval (via the reserves) to purchase new street signs at a cost not to exceed \$6762.11. (Unanimous)
- Confirmation of payment (via reserves) to purchase a manual pool and spa cover (replaces the old one that is torn and worn out). (Unanimous)
- Appointment of Janet LeRossignol as Inspector of Elections for the upcoming ballot vote for the new governing documents. (Unanimous)

President's Report

The Board is gathering information needed to determine whether to establish our own water source for irrigating the common landscaping areas of Champagne Village. Our monthly average for watering these areas is currently \$10,000/month, and is certain to further increase on an annual basis. It seems imperative that we determine both the cost and feasibility of establishing our own water source (well) to lessen this financial burden. Also, in keeping with the Open Meeting Act, all Committee Chairs are asked to provide the regularly scheduled dates and times of their meetings to the Office for posting. See the separate article in this newsletter for more information on open meetings.

Open Forum

Janet LeRossignol spoke briefly about the Champagne Village Nextdoor website, explaining that she and her husband, Pat, serve as Leads (administrators) for CV Nextdoor simply because they started it here in CV. She asked those using this website to kindly adhere to the guidelines (see separate article in this newsletter for details).

COMMITTEE REPORTS, SEPTEMBER

(summary made during September's Board meeting)

The Architecture and Landscape Committee (via Wade Steverson) reported a busy month, with nearly 20 applications for improvements approved.

The Common Area Facilities Committee (via Lee Martin) reported that they will be looking into securing the kitchen, due to recent thefts. They also announced to listen for a one-call for free slices of cake in the Hall sometime next week; this will be the result of a cake cook-off, which is being conducted to test the repairs made to the kitchen's oven. Also, plans for phase 2 of the kitchen renovations will be forthcoming, with the intent of implementation in 2019.

The Common Area Landscape Committee (via Walt Zielinski) reported that several projects remain in progress throughout the community. Further discussions are underway for improvements in other areas throughout CV, including the Dog Park, Mailbox Area and Entranceway.

The Social Activities Committee (via Tom Riggs) reported that August's Western Barbeque was well attended, and thanked those who volunteered to decorate. He asked for volunteers to help decorate for the Halloween season. Those willing to help should be at the Village Hall on October 14 from 9:00 am through noon.

The Emergency Planning Committee (via Susan Robinson) reported that they recently met with the Deer Springs Fire Council, who thanked us for contributions made by CV residents. Also, an Open House will be held at the San Marcos Fire Department on Saturday, October 7.

The Communications Committee (via Susie Riley) reported that several projects are in progress and, in keeping with the Open Meetings Act, they've decided to schedule their meetings at 2:30 pm on the first Tuesday of each month in the Village Hall.

There was no Reserve Study/Capital Improvements committee report for the month.

FLU SHOTS - MONDAY, OCT. 10



Flu shots will be available at Champagne Village on Monday, Oct. 9 in the Village Hall from 12 pm to 3 pm.

The nurses will no longer be able to give shots to shut ins.

If you qualify under Medicare, the shots will not cost you anything. Everyone must bring in your Medicare card with the red, white and blue stripe at the top and any supplemental health insurance cards and \$20 just in case you don't qualify for the free shots.

You DO NOT have to sign up for the shots this year, just show up. You will fill out the form on the day of the shots. *The shots are for Champagne Village residents only.*

The flu shots are sponsored by Palomar Health. Volunteers are CV residents who are Palomar Medical Center auxiliary members. **Any questions, call Luann at (760) 739-2005.**

DON'T FORGET TO VOTE!

OCTOBER 17 is the deadline to submit your ballot for the proposed, modified CC&Rs and Bylaws. Everyone's vote counts! **Why are the changes we're proposing to these documents so important?**

- Our documents are about 20 years old: several Federal and state laws have changed since then, but we continue to reference old, obsolete laws.
- Numerous inaccuracies and inconsistencies are found in our current documents.
- Potential buyers and new owners aren't getting an accurate idea of what they can and can't do by reading our governing documents, as they're quite outdated. At the very least, this is unfair.
- Those areas of the documents that are vastly outdated are, in many respects, not enforceable. This can be problematic when performing both the duties of the Board and the management team.
- Outdated governing documents can adversely impact property values. Lenders pay attention to these documents: problems with outdated rules and policies can sometimes affect a buyer's ability to obtain a mortgage.

HAVE QUESTIONS? Ask! Call the Office or stop in with any questions!

DON'T ASSUME WE KNOW!

If you happen to notice something not right in Champagne Village, please don't assume that the Office is aware of it. While we routinely drive our streets and check the common areas, you may see something we haven't. If you see something, please say something – call the office to let them know. Thanks!

THE BOARD'S NEW ETHICS POLICY

Below is the Ethics and Confidentiality Agreement, unanimously approved by the Board at the August 17th meeting. All Board Members must sign this pledge. It is the commitment they make to the Association and one another. If you have any questions, please speak with the office or ask any Board member.

As a volunteer Member of the Board of Directors for the Champagne Village Property Owners Association, I agree to the following commitments while serving the Association:

- To work with my fellow Board members toward fulfilling the mission of the Association.
- To place the Association's best interests above my own.
- To comply with the Governing Documents of the Association and all applicable laws.
- To attend all meetings prepared to participate and address all communications.
- To respect parliamentary procedure at all meetings, to refrain from speaking out of turn, to avoid unnecessary or unproductive verbal sparring (participating in a business-like manner instead), to keep my temper, and to excuse myself when I cannot maintain this respect.
- To accept the Board's decisions, even when I disagree.
- To maintain confidentiality with respect to the Board's Executive Sessions, discussions, and communications.
- As a fiduciary, to act honestly, in good faith and in the best interests of the Association.
- To never take improper advantage of my position as a Director to gain an advantage for myself or someone else.
- To never harass, threaten, or attempt through any means to control or instill fear in a fellow Association member, employee or contractor, whether verbally, physically or otherwise.
- To refrain from directing Management, employees or vendors without the permission of the President of the Board, who serves as the primary liaison between the Board and Management.
- To avoid any potential conflicts between my own personal or business interests and the interests of the Association, and to immediately disclose to the Board any known conflicts of interest, as described in the Association's Governing Documents and according to law.

OPEN MEETINGS!

In accordance with California State law, every Board-appointed committee must provide notice of meetings, distribute an agenda, produce minutes and conduct open meetings.

What does this mean? As an Association member, you have the right to know when and where committee meetings are taking place, and you have the right to show up and observe these meetings in action. As an observer, you are asked to remain silent and not interrupt. You can, however, ask questions at the conclusion of these meetings.

Notice of these meetings will be on the monthly calendar in this newsletter. If you have any questions, please contact the office.

In keeping with this, the Communications Committee will be holding its meetings the first Tuesday of each month at 2:30 pm in the Village Hall.

It's your right as a member of the CVPOA – and your responsibility – to attend our meetings! Please consider joining us!

This pilot test would provide insight on how prevalent speeding is within Champagne Village, without documenting specific drivers or vehicles. At this point, further discussion is needed to determine what other plans or actions to consider.

Whether or not someone's watching – whether it be radar or another means - it's important to remember that the purpose of our speed limit is to protect residents and guests in our community. We're all neighbors, and we must rely on each other to keep Champagne Village safe for everyone. Please be considerate while driving!

GUIDELINES FOR USING CV'S NEXTDOOR

The following is an annotated version of Nextdoor's guidelines describing what behaviors are - and are not - allowed on the CV page. The crux of these Guidelines can be boiled down to one simple statement: **Everyone here is your neighbor. Please treat each other with respect.**

We rely on you, the neighbors who make up the Nextdoor community, to report content that violates these Guidelines. Violating the Guidelines has consequences, which may include removal of content, suspension of posting privileges, or even a permanent ban from Nextdoor. Because of the diversity of people in any neighborhood, please keep in mind that while something may be disagreeable to you, it may not violate the Community Guidelines.

- Be helpful, not hurtful
- Don't use Nextdoor as a soapbox
- Keep it clean and legal
- Promote local businesses and commerce the right way

(All of the above are explained in detail on the website under Community Guidelines.)

Neighborhoods Leads (Pat and Janet LeRossignol for our CV page) do not work for Nextdoor and are not compensated in any way. They are simply neighbors like other members, who have been granted additional capabilities to help their neighborhood run more smoothly. Those capabilities include access to features to remove messages that they believe violate Nextdoor Guidelines, verify new members, and edit the About section of the neighborhood page. Leads cannot remove members, place members in read-only mode, or affect a member's account in any way (only Nextdoor can take those actions).

POSTING NOTICES

If you'd like to post a notice to everyone's attention in the Village, bring your posting to the Office for placement on one of the bulletin boards in the Mailbox area. Please keep in mind the following when preparing these posts:

- Any posts taped on the glass over the bulletin boards will be removed.
- Anonymous posts will not be added to the bulletin board, so be sure to add your name and space number to all notices.
- Posts are removed after a designated period of time or if additional space is needed for newer posts.
- Posts, notices, signs and posters placed elsewhere in Champagne Village could be a violation of the Rules and Regulations. Always check with the office prior to posting anything, anywhere.

If your post involves some level of dissatisfaction regarding CVPOA business or conditions, we encourage you to speak directly with the office, or submit a letter to the Board. As always, we encourage you to use CV Nextdoor. It's the perfect venue to post your notices!



HEALTH INSURANCE NEWS

October 15 is the beginning of the Annual Enrollment Period for Medicare. This is the time to make changes in Medicare HMO Advantage plans or stand-alone Drug plans. This enrollment period ends December 7.

Most seniors experience an abundance of mail during this time in hope of winning your business. It can pay you to read some of the new features plans are offering. Both SCAN and United Health Care are increasing their coverage for hearing aids. Trip coverage for these plans has been adjusted. Drug coverage has been changed for insulin as well as new drugs added. SCAN has added both acupuncture and chiropractic to its added benefits.

The new 2018 drug deductible has risen only \$5 which is good news. The new initial coverage limit before one enters the drug coverage gap is \$1,241.25. This is the out of pocket amount you spend before the percentages change. During the gap period the plan pays 56% for generic and 15% for brand name drugs. Drug manufacturers discount brand named drugs 50%. The enrollee pays 44% of generic drugs and 35% of brand name drugs.

For those under 65 there are new services being offered by our local provider networks. ARCH Health Partners, Graybill Medical Group and Sharp Health Plans are offering coordinating services for their patients. These services are designed to track multiple doctor care, make appointments, offer guidance and nurse hot lines in between doctor's appointments. Look for the flyers currently being mailed. These services do have a nominal fee.

It also helps remind people that a person using it is blind or visually impaired and alerts drivers to give white cane users the right of way.

White Cane Day is our most important fundraiser of the year for the blind and the organizations that serve them. Our members will once again be at the local Vons stores on October 14 asking shoppers to donate to help the blind. In late September, a letter and envelope was delivered to each resident of CV asking you to help us serve the blind and to help us with our eye screening program for local children. Juvenile diabetes is at an epidemic rate and our children are losing or having reduced sight at an alarming rate. White Cane Day is a time for all Lions to focus on support of youth in their community and to help prevent future cases of unnecessary blindness through vision screenings and educational events.

This year, the centennial year of Lions International, I am asking for your support of our vision and hearing projects through your contribution. Together we can give the gift of sight through projects that benefit those who are blind or living with low vision. All monies raised in the White Cane Campaign support our youth vision screening program and community organizations serving the blind. Some Autumn Questions:

1. You spy a woolly bear caterpillar crossing the sidewalk. It's black bands are wider than the brown band. What weather does this predict?

The wider the black band is, the more severe the winter, the wider the brown band, the milder the coming winter will be.

2. Chickadees gather and store seeds to prepare for winter. What is this "storing" behavior called? **It is called caching.**

3. Some people think that weather changes in the fall cause deciduous trees to lose their leaves. Why do deciduous trees lose their leaves each fall? **The process of shedding leaves is called abscission and occurs when leaves are cut-off of the tree by specialized cells. Trees reabsorb valuable nutrients from their leaves and store them for later use in their roots, then a thin bumpy line of cells develop that pushes the leaf away from the stem.**

2 pkg microwave popcorn , popped

4 tbsp butter, 3 tbsp water

3/4 c. sugar, 1 -1/2 tsp cinnamon

Combine butter, water and sugar in

heat. Boil 3-4 minutes. Add cinna-

mon. Pour over popcorn and stir. Bake at 200° for 10 minutes.
