New business included the following:

Approval of the Communications Committee's proposed new Charter was tabled, pending requests for modifications.

A new Emergency One Call Message Policy was approved (see page 15 for details).

A proposed rule change regarding painting of homes was approved to be sent to the Membership for its required 28-day review (more information is on page 6).

Replacement of the pool cover's motor and pulley assembly for \$2007 was approved.

A proposal from Timothy Ferrara to perform the CVPOA's annual Financial Review and prepare state and federal taxes for the amount of \$3920 was approved.

An updated One-Call Use Policy was approved (see page 11 for details)

Calendar Reservations for Clubs

It's that time of year when all clubs and groups must complete a new 2022 calendar reservation form to reserve space for your regularly scheduled meetings, events, practices, card games, etc. for next year. Please pick up the form at the table in front of the Office window.

Issues with the Gate not Opening?

Are you having problems getting the entry gates to open? Before you contact the Office, please be sure that your license plate is clean and hasn't lost its reflective coating. If you have a license plate frame, please remove it (the frame can confuse the cameras). Also, remember that the Welk gate cameras only read the front license plate (not all cars have one!). If after trying these methods you're still experiencing problems, give the Office a call.

Call the Gate for Visitors and Vendors

Please remember to call (760-749-7723) or email (CVFrontGate@gmail.com) the front gate for vendors and guests who are not on your list. Many people show up at the gate with no space number or just a last name that's often the same as several other residents. Gate attendants will try to match a vendor to a resident who's called prior, but otherwise they may be turned away.

Take Care at the Gate!

After normal gate hours, never buzz in anyone you're not expecting: simply hang up your phone to deny access. If you encounter someone at the gate, insist that they use the keypad entry system and let the resident choose whether to allow them in. You may think letting them in is helpful, but you might be letting in an unauthorized person.

IMPORTANT SECURITY DISCLAIMER

We hope that our entry systems provide some deterrence to crime. However, no matter what steps we take, the Association can never be completely safe and secure. For example, it is possible for someone to enter the property under false pretenses to commit crimes, for residents to commit crimes against their own neighbors, for guests of residents to commit crimes, and for employees to commit crimes. As a result, the Association is not and can never be free of crime, and we cannot guarantee your safety or security. Accordingly, you should NOT rely on the Association to protect you from loss or harm. Instead, you should provide for your own security by taking common-sense precautions such as carrying insurance against loss, keeping your doors locked, refusing to open your door to strangers, asking workers for identification, installing a security system, locking your car, etc. You may also wish to check various websites and law enforcement lists to be aware of those living in your area.

DO YOU KNOW WHEN TO GO?

SIGN UP TO RECEIVE FIRE ALERTS!

Receive Emergency Alerts. Be sure to register your cell phone with **AlertSanDiego**, which notifies county residents of imminent emergency and evacuation information. While land line phones are already registered, cell phones are not. Go to readysandiego.org/alertsandiego, then click on **Register Now**.

Sign Up for the Emergency Communication System.

Complete the mail-in application to sign up for the Deer Springs Fire Safe Council's **Emergency Communication System (ECS)**. By way of one-call phone messages, the ECS provides information about wildfire threats in the vicinity that have the potential to threaten our community. **An application is available in the Hall Lobby.**

Add the Deer Springs Hotline to your Contact List.

The **Deer Springs Fire Safe Council** maintains a hotline that you can call to hear recorded messages about wildfires in the area. (Note that the hotline is updated only during a wildfire). **The hotline number is (949) 472-1407.**

Make sure you are on our One-Call System. If you've opted out of receiving messages for our **Village One Calls**, you will not receive any calls we make to alert you to an emergency. **Call the Office to be returned to the list** (you can let them know if you'd prefer not to receive non-emergency One Calls).

UP-TO-THE-MINUTE FIRE INFO

Use CalFire San Diego's Twitter Feed

For current information on significant fires, visit twitter.com/calfiresandiego. This is generally the most reliable source of information unless a formal evacuation order is issued. **You do not need a Twitter account to access this information.** Please take a few minutes to bookmark this on your mobile phone or tablet, to have with you when it's needed.

Is Our Turn Coming?

Deer Springs Fire Safe Council

More than 1 million acres of brush and timber have burned in northern California so far this year. Closer to home, the Chaparral Fire burned nearly 1500 acres in San Diego and Riverside counties north of Fallbrook last month.



In spite of our recent cooler temperatures and higher humidity, we are still in high fire danger. This danger will change to extreme with the first Santa Ana event that blows our way. Please be careful and do what you can to be ready.



WILDFIRES: Are YOU Prepared?

Preparing ahead of time is our best tactic. Use the following tips to get ready for wildfire season.

- Assemble an emergency evacuation kit (**see the checklist list on page 9 of your JULY issue**).
- Have an evacuation plan in place.
- Know where your fire extinguisher is located and how to use it. Make sure it's up to date.
- Install dual-sensor smoke alarms in your home.
- Keep a sturdy pair of shoes and a flashlight near your bed and handy in case of a sudden evacuation at night.

CVPOA Rule Changes: How It Works

At its September meeting, the Board approved that a proposed rule change regarding the painting of homes be sent to the membership for a 28-day review. What does that mean?

Rules and regulations exist as a catch-all for topics not covered under the CC&Rs and bylaws. The Rules and Regulations are the most easily changed of our governing documents because they are designed to evolve along with the community's needs.

Rules and Regulations can be changed by a Board vote following community review. It starts with a proposal (added to a Board meeting's Agenda) of the rule change, to discuss the proposal and determine if it should be sent for review. Should the Board vote to send, it then provides written notice of the proposed change to all Association members, giving them 28 days to review and comment on the change and weigh in on the decision. The Board then takes all member comments into consideration when voting to adopt or dismiss the potential new rule.

The decision of whether modifications are made based on these comments comes from the Board itself. Either way, if the Board reaches a majority vote as defined in the bylaws, the rule will come to pass. The Board must then send out a notice to all members following the adoption of the new rule.

Stamp Price Increase

Starting August 29th, the U.S. Post Office raised the price of a first-class Forever Stamp from 55 cents to 58 cents. The change means a book of stamps now cost 60 cents more.



This is the second postage rate increase of 2021; The first took place on January 24th. If you're sending out holiday cards in December, better check your stamps!



New Drop Boxes Available

Two new drop boxes have been installed in the Hall Lobby next to the Office window, for those clubs and organizations needing to collect funds for events or other paperwork from residents. They're available on a first-come-first-served basis from the Office.

Board Approves Updated One-Call System Policy

The CVPOA One-Call system is used to disseminate emergency or other information that is deemed necessary to residents. It also provides courtesy information for CVPOA-based clubs, groups and organizations, allowing them to send timely messages to residents or their members.

Last month, the Board approved updates to their one-call policy. A copy of the full policy is available from the Office and will soon be on the CVPOA website... here are some highlights:

- The organization must be identified in the message.
- Monthly or special events should be held to a maximum of three calls, regularly scheduled weekly or daily events and activities are permitted only in the event of unforeseen changes.
- All information must be accurate.
- Anyone abusing or not following the rules of the One Call system may be subject to having their privileges revoked.



The Beer Guy

As a beer geek, I am frequently asked about my favorite microbrewery (AleSmith Brewing) or beer style is (it varies!). When it comes to my favorite brewpub, Pizza Port is at the top of my list when I'm in the mood for pizza.



Pizza Port is second oldest active brewing company in San Diego County and one of the most successful. Its original brewery was shoehorned into a small surfers' pizza restaurant in Solana Beach and has grown to eight locations. Pizza Port's pizza menu is the same at each location and includes salads and pizza-related appetizers. While they have a great local reputation for their pizzas, they have an even greater national reputation for their beers. To date, Pizza Port has won over 90 medals from the prestigious Great American Beer Festival held annually in Denver. Each of their brewpubs makes its own beers and they're given considerable freedom to experiment. These different creations are shared throughout each brewpub, and the Bressi Ranch location cans beers for retail sale.

Pizza Port has been a significant contributor to San Diego's broad reputation as a top-five beer city and the growth of San Diego IPA as a sought-after beer style. IPA is India pale ale, the historical roots of which go back to England and its colonial control of India, when pale ale shipped from England to India for British expats did not fare well over the long maritime trip. India pale ale used more hops as a preservative and kept better. Contemporary brewers creatively push the limits of the hoppy character, making IPAs are popular among beer geeks and regular brewpub customers. Pizza Port's Bressi Ranch had eight different IPAs on tap in July. Swami's is their most prominent IPA and contains 6.8% alcohol. A lunch-time favorite for the customers from nearby businesses is Ponto 'session' IPA with less alcohol (4.5%); it's my normal go-to beer after a softball game at a nearby park.


Other popular Pizza Port beers include Shark Bit red ale, Chronic amber ale and California Honey, a blonde ale that's designed for those who think that Bud Light or Coors Light is a good beer. Beer geeks refer to this kind of beer as a 'training-wheels beer,' the first step in getting customers to drink better beer.

Pizza Port has continued to diversify, and they created The Lost Abbey, which focuses on funky Belgian beer styles, and Port Brewing/Hop Concept, which focuses on hoppy, bitter beers. With its 26 beer taps, the Lost Abbey, located in San Marcos, is the closest Pizza Port for beer-thirsty Champagne Villagers. This location is only a microbrewery and tasting room (no restaurant) but hosts occasional food trucks. For all Pizza Port locations, visit their website at pizzaport.com.

New Emergency Call Policy

The Emergency Planning Committee has established a policy for alerting residents to a nearby fire (or other emergency situation) using the One-Call phone system. The policy was approved by the Board at the September meeting.

These one-call alerts would be made to residents to alert them that there is a fire or smoke visible from the Village. The purpose is to alert residents who might not otherwise be aware of the situation, giving them time to respond based on their own plans or needs. These calls would NOT be an order to evacuate, but rather make residents aware of a nearby situation.

Using this policy, a few selected residents (established by the Emergency Planning Committee and the Office) will receive training on the one-call system so they're comfortable using it. Should a fire or smoke become visible to some or all portions of the Village, a one-call would be made to alert residents. Prior to making the call, at least two persons on the Committee must agree that the call should be made. A pre-approved script will be used, to ensure that all calls are made consistently.

PLEASE KEEP THE FOLLOWING IN MIND:

- **These calls are for informational purposes only: they are NOT an order to evacuate.** The decision of whether to leave the Village prior to an official evacuation is entirely up to each of us.
- These calls will be made ONLY when the Committee is made aware of a situation. As a result, **fire or smoke that's visible from the Village during late-night hours will not likely result in a call.**
- If you have opted out of receiving calls from the one-call system, you will not receive these notices.

A copy of this new policy is available from the Office and will soon be on the CVPOA website, ChampagneVillage.org. Contact the Office or Greg Lorton, Emergency Planning Committee Chair, with any questions.

DON'T FORGET!

If you opt out of the ONE-CALL system, you will not receive any calls **made in the event of an emergency**. To receive emergency calls, contact the Office.

While Champagne Village offers help and support through Care and Concern, this volunteer group provides their help as a courtesy only, not a paid amenity.
