Getting To Know...Bob & Ruth Humphrey

Bob Humphrey and his wife, Ruth, moved here from La Mirada, which is a little north of Disneyland, on June 1, 1982. While living in La Mirada, Bob had two Mobil Service Stations in nearby La Habra and Downey. As a young married couple, they lived in Culver City, and bought their first house in Norwalk, which is next to La Mirada. They increased their family with a son and a daughter through private adoptions. Their son, Robert, lives near Seattle, and has 3 boys. Their daughter, Renee, lives here. "Ruthie" as Bob affectionately calls his wife wrote a lot of letters to various cities to find out about retirement in their area. They went looking in Prescott, Phoenix, Santa Barbara and quite a few other places, but kept coming back here. He says that they did the right thing when they chose to move to Champagne Village.

An outside source revealed that Bob is an avid golfer and is the perennial scorekeeper. He sets the pace for his foursome by always starting first. The "19th" hole is the deli, for coffee and re-hashing the game. For a number of years he was a marshal at the Welk courses. In fact he was such a dedicated one, that he was known at the local Home Depot as "The Marshal".

Bob was born in Akron, Ohio. Sadly, his parents separated before he was a year old. As a result he and his sister were raised in an orphanage in West Palm Beach, Florida. When he was 7 years old, he and his sister were sent back to Detroit to be with their father. At 14 years old, he was surprised to find he had an older brother, who was 19. His sister was placed in a convent, and later Bob decided to run away from home. He "rode the rails" and hitchhiked all through the mid southern states. He said that people were kind, and would help him with food or train directions. At 17, he went back to Detroit as a "butter and egg man", delivering eggs and butter to grocers and bakers for \$14 a week. He also sold papers. Then at 19, which was during the depression, he delivered for a kosher

butcher for \$10 a week, and room and board. He slept in the basement. He joined the National Guard in February of 1941 just after he turned 21. (Now you can figure out how old he is.) He spent five years in the 33rd Infantry Division as a medic, going to Australia, New Guinea, Dutch New Guinea and the Philippines. He was on board ship, ready to invade Japan, when the Japanese surrendered. His unit eventually landed at Kobe, Japan, as occupational troops. After being discharged from the army in California, where his sister lived, Bob worked for Pontiac, a division of General Motors, in Los Angeles. They sent him to school to learn to be a mechanic. Later, he had a garage, at Normandy and Manchester, in Los Angeles. Now this doesn't mean that you can ask Bob to fix your car, because he takes his car to the shop. He says there's been just too many changes made since then. It was during the time he was working in Los Angeles that he met Ruthie. She had been a weather observer in the Women's Air Force, and was visiting in Los Angeles. She had plans to return to Pennsylvania and go to school on the G.I. Bill. Actually, he met her on a Saturday, and two weeks later they were married! He said, "Ruth had nobody and I had nobody." So, I said to her, "Let's get married and spend our life together." That was 55 years ago!
