Thank you to all 57 CV Residents who attended the Open Board of Director's Meeting. Thanks to SAC for the birthday cake for all who are celebrating a birthday in October. All Directors were present with the exceptions of John Grubb, President and Jody Bennett, Director. Jean Slaughter, VP presided. The minutes of September 15, 2016 were approved.

1. The CFO report given by CFO Bob Suttie was approved
2. The financial statements and bank reconciliation for the period ending September 30, 2016 was tabled because the Board had not yet reviewed them.
3. The quote from Pool Safe to replace the vinyl cover of the automatic pool cover in the amount of \$3,616.05 was approved.
4. The quote from Pool Safe to replace the ropes and pulleys of the automatic pool cover in the amount of \$1,002.12 was approved.
5. The quote from Pool Plus to remove and replace the spa light at a cost \$4,400.00 was approved.

We now have the capacity to cook for the community because our oven space has doubled! Here's the list of changes:

- 6 foot range with 3 feet of flat top griddle area with thermostatic controls for even cooking surface with 6 burners and 2 full size ovens
- Standing full size double convection oven with 4 racks in each oven
- 8 foot stainless steel work table
- 4 full size warming trays
- The refrigerator was inset into the wall giving more space in the kitchen footprint
- All the floors have been professionally cleaned
- New air conditioner system was installed to help keep it cooler, especially in the summer months

Carol Repas and her Warm Afghan Hugs

Carol Repas, a member of the Champagne Village Lions Club, has been giving “warm hugs” in the form of warm afghans for the last eight years. The Lions Club provides the yarn, and Carol unselfishly provides the labor for her beautiful afghans. To date she has made more than 200 afghans for our Villagers who are ill, hospitalized, or alone. Our military are not forgotten. Carol includes our veterans in the spinal cord injury ward at the Veterans Hospital in La Jolla. Her afghans are displayed in the hospital’s chapel and the multipurpose room. One has the Soldiers Prayer and the other reads “God Bless America.” Lion President Jack McGrath described the afghans at the hospital as “spectacular and unique.” He continued, “One honors the veterans of the Army, Air Force, Coast Guard, Marines and Navy; the other is a salute to all who have served. The symbols for each branch of the service are appliquéed on the knitted background. The large USA flag on one afghan is a stunning compliment and sets off the detailed work. I have seen other afghans, but Carol’s are spectacular creations of art.”



Carol likes to customize the afghans in the recipient’s favorite colors. After the afghan is finished, she hand crochets the trim for each one. It takes her approximately four hours to complete her craft. Some have decorative emblems, like the armed forces afghans in the photo below. Others are solid colors or are woven with a variety of colors and patterns. She uses a manual knitting machine that measures 48" long by 12" wide. It’s a relaxing hobby for her while gazing out the sliding glass door and watching the birds, squirrels, and sometimes a coyote.

Carol’s first afghan was knitted in 1993 for her father. She once donated 40 afghans to the Jobs Daughters who gave them to the Police Department. The organization added a teddy bear and the police gave them to abused and abandoned children. In 2006 out of her own generosity and expense, she knitted approximately 100 afghans for the CV Care and Concern Committee and the Social Activities Committee. Since then, she began exclusively knitting more than 200 afghans in the name of the CV Lions Club. The Lions give annual Christmas presents for those in need, who are ill, or who have suffered a loss of a loved one. Carol provides several afghans at Christmas, ties each with a holiday bow, before jumping in a golf cart and lovingly delivering them to our residents.

With each afghan, the following greeting is attached: *This afghan was made just for you to bring comfort, to know you are loved, to share in your joy. This afghan is to wrap you up when you’re cold, when you’re hurting, when you need to snuggle. This afghan was knitted and crocheted with prayers, with love, and with the blessing of the Champagne Village Lions Club.*

What does she get out of her many hours of labor? “I wish everyone could experience the love when giving something of yourself. It feels so really incredible when face to face with your neighbor as they accept your gift. There have been tears, emotional long hugs, and appreciation beyond words,” expressed Carol while wiping away a few tears. Could it be that we have a Champagne Village angel in our midst for those who need a kind word, a caring hug, and a warm afghan?





HEALTH INSURANCE NEWS

November is right in the middle of Medicare's Annual Enrollment Period which ends on December 7. It's also the beginning of the enrollment period for Individual health plans for those under 65!

If you have a Kaiser Advantage Plan and want to change back to Original Medicare and a Supplement Plan, you would have a special enrollment opportunity this AEP. The rule that applies is a change of coverage which would give you a guaranteed issue (no underwriting) if you wanted to change. Kaiser's PCP's copay increased 15% which triggers the rule.

There are many restrictions on those who wish to purchase a supplemental plan. Any history of heart attack, stroke, artery or kidney issues would be an automatic rejection from an underwriter. Guaranteed issue is a prized status.


If you want to make any change in your insurance coverage it is extremely important that you keep documents/ letters you receive regarding coverage changes. Make a file. If you leave an employer always keep your insurance termination letter. Medicare's annual NOC-notice of coverage letter can save you a lot of hassle if you want to make a change. These documents are required to prove a guaranteed issue status and credible drug coverage which will save you a lot of money.

While newspaper reports state that this year's increases for Obamacare are averaging a lower amount, I've had one client tell me his premium went up 24%! The sad truth is that those with big jumps will have to change companies, change doctors, and/or lose coverage just to stay even with a premium they can afford.

This year is the end of the Federal assistance to states which subsidized the initial years of the new system. It will be interesting to see what further changes are coming to keep health insurance solvent. It may be a rocky road ahead.

The Burn Institute of San Diego offers free battery-operated smoke alarm inspections and maintenance. Inspections include vapor-testing and inspection of existing alarms, and replacement of alarms or batteries, if necessary.

There is absolutely no charge to owner-occupied residents. Sorry, this program is funded by government grants, and rental units are not covered.

We are unable to accommodate alarms located on vaulted, or other high ceilings requiring ladders.

Have You Been Petting Your Dog Wrong Your Whole Life?

Petting a dog—it seems so simple, but you could be doing it all wrong. For many people, things go bad from the start; they unknowingly make a dog nervous or scare him away just by how they approach him. A lot of dog lovers can't read a dog's body language either, so they mistake fear for friendliness. And even if it's a dog you know and love, you might be doing something against the rules. Here is a guide through the basics to approaching and petting dogs, whether it be a stray or your best friend's furry pal.

An Unknown or Stray Dog

When meeting a dog for the first time, reach your hand out gently and let the dog come to you. When you see a dog you don't know, it's important not to spook him as you approach. A mistake people make when there is a stray is to run after them to try to catch them. Almost any dog would run away from that. Even the nicest, most well-trained dog is going to be on edge and panicking because they are lost or in a strange place, so realize how scared they are." Be as non-threatening as possible, which means crouching down and even turning your body sideways. The main thing is not to stand and bend over the dog. If the dog sees you as bending over them, that is taken as dominance. If a dog does that to another dog—posturing over the other dog—the next move is humping. The dog could see bending over him as a threat and get scared. Once you are squatting down, extend your hand and **let the dog come to you**. If the dog comes forward wagging his tail, you can pet him. If he stands there, backs off, or pulls his head away, it's best to leave him alone.

It's like a handshake between people. If you're reaching for a handshake and the other person reaches back and shakes your hand, you meet midway. You never go grab the person's hand from their side.

Pay attention to the dog's body language, too. If his tail is stiff or tightly tucked, he's uncomfortable. **You can't always trust a wagging tail, either**—if hair is raised on the center of his back or his ears are pinned back and there is still some tail wagging, the dog is likely nervous and you should proceed with caution.


